DAY EIGHT FAST FACTS

- Three-time US Open champion **Rafael Nadal** meets 2014 US Open champion **Marin Cilic** on Monday in the second match of the fourth round between past champions. On Sunday, three-time champion **Novak Djokovic** faced 2016 champion **Stan Wawrinka**. All five past champions in the field reached the fourth round (also **Roger Federer**).
- Cilic faces No. 2 Nadal seeking his biggest win since defeating then-No. 1 Nadal in 2018 Australian Open QF. Additionally, Croat tries to win 4 matches at a tournament for 1st time since doing so to reach 2018 US Open QF.
- No. 6 **Alexander Zverev** and **Diego Schwartzman** are both seeking 3rd Grand Slam QF of respective careers. Argentine is 5-22 vs. Top 10 and trying to match his biggest career win (d. No. 6 **Kei Nishikori** in 2019 Rome QF).
- **Matteo Berrettini** and 2017 US Open quarter-finalist **Andrey Rublev** have split two prior ATP Tour meetings. They also met in juniors, with 16-year-old Rublev defeating 18-year-old Berrettini 4-6 6-3 14-12 in 2014 Wimbledon 2R.
- Berrettini bids to become second Italian man in history to reach US Open QF (also **Corrado Barazzutti** in 1977).
- Three-time US Open quarter-finalist **Gael Monfils** faces fellow 33-year-old **Pablo Andujar**, who entered 2019 US Open with 32-79 career record on hard courts. Andujar is trying to win 4 matches at a hard-court event for 1st time.
- Andujar bids to become the oldest player in the Open Era to reach his first Grand Slam men's singles quarter-final.

ALEXANDER ZVEREV

2019 US Open

- Bidding to become 1st German in US Open QF since Haas in 2007. Germans have lost 6 straight US Open 4R matches.
- Appearing in US Open 4R for 1st time. Attempting to reach 3rd Grand Slam QF (2018-19 Roland Garros).
- Played 14 sets and 9 hours, 55 minutes thus far at US Open. All 3 matches have exceeded 3 hours.
- Won 5-setters over Albot in 1R and Tiafoe in 2R. Improved to 13-6 in 5th sets with 5-match win streak. Owns 10-1 record in 5th sets since losing to Chung in 2018 Australian Open 3R.

2019 in Review

- Saved 2 championship points vs. Jarry to win 11th ATP Tour title at Geneva. Earned 30+ wins in 4 straight seasons.
- Finished as Acapulco singles runner-up (l. to Kyrgios) and doubles champion w/M. Zverev (d. Krajicek/Sitak).
- Reached Roland Garros QF for 2nd time (l. to No. 1 Djokovic) and Australian Open 4R for 1st time (l. to Raonic).
- One of 5 men under 23 to reach Australian Open 4R -- most at a Grand Slam since 2009 Roland Garros (5).
- Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 QFs at Madrid (d. Ferrer in 2R, l. to Tsitsipas) and Montreal (l. to Khachanov).
- Blew 1 MP vs. Jarry in Barcelona 2R, 2 MPs vs. Garin in Munich QF and 2 MPs vs. Basilashvili in Hamburg SF.
- Won 2nd and 4th rubber of Germany's 5-0 win over Hungary in Davis Cup Qualifiers (d. Nagy and Borsos).
- Withdrew from Rotterdam due to ankle injury.

Career Highlights

- > Reached career-high No. 3 on 6 November 2017. Achieved new career-high ranking 8 times in 2017 and 14 times in 2016. Youngest player in year-end 2018 Top 10, 2017 Top 20, 2016 Top 50, 2015 Top 100 and 2014 Top 200.
- > Captured biggest title of career at 2018 Nitto ATP Finals (d. No. 1 Djokovic for biggest career win). First German to win title since Becker in 1995. Also qualified in 2017 (1-2 in RR).
- > Beat Wawrinka at age 19 for 1st of 11 titles at 2016 St. Petersburg, becoming youngest ATP Tour champion since Nishikori, 18, at 2008 Delray Beach. Won singles and doubles titles w/M. Zverev at 2017 Montpellier -- 1st brothers to sweep titles since Murrays at 2011 Tokyo. Rallied from 2-sets-to-1 down in 3 straight matches to reach 1st Grand Slam QF at 2018 Roland Garros.
- > From May 2017 to November 2018, became youngest Top 3 player, Nitto ATP Finals champion and ATP Masters 1000 champion since Djokovic in 2007-08. Only active player besides Big Four to win 3+ ATP Masters 1000 titles (2017 Rome, 2017 Montreal, 2018 Madrid). Fought off 3 MPs vs. Gasquet before beating Federer for 2017 Montreal title. Saved 1/1 BP en route to 2018 Madrid title -- fewest BPs faced by an ATP Masters 1000 champion since stats started being kept in 1991.
- > Finished 2013 as No. 1 junior. Went 96-35 on ITF Junior Circuit, including wins over future Top 50 ATP players Chung, Djere, Edmund, Fritz, Norrie and Rublev. Ended junior career at age 16 by winning 2014 Australian Open boys' singles title. Also reached 2013 Roland Garros boys' singles final.

DIEGO SCHWARTZMAN

2019 US Open

- Appearing in US Open 4R for 2nd time. Attempting to reach 3rd Grand Slam QF (2017 US Open, 2018 Roland Garros).
- Yet to drop a set or play a 2-hour match thus far at US Open. On court for 5 hours, 32 minutes (4:23 less than Zverev).
- Trying to equal biggest win of career vs. No. 6 A. Zverev (d. No. 6 Nishikori in 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Rome QF).

- Captured 3rd ATP Tour title of career at Los Cabos (d. Fritz). Earned 30+ wins in 3 straight seasons.
- Saved 1 MP vs. 2-time champion Thiem to reach final in hometown of Buenos Aires (l. to Cecchinato).
- Beat No. 6 Nishikori for biggest win of career and to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF at Rome (l. to No. 1 Djokovic).
- Defeated fellow 5-foot-7 player Nishioka in Sydney QF (l. to Seppi in SF), Barcelona 1R as Q (l. to Thiem in 2R) and ATP Masters 1000 Rome 1R. Shortest matches since 5-foot-8 Lisnard vs. 5-foot-6 O. Rochus in 2011 US Open 1R.
- Advanced to London/Queen's Club QF (d. Cilic, l. to Medvedev). Squandered 3 MPs vs. Berrettini in Wimbledon 3R.
- Reached doubles finals w/Thiem at Buenos Aires (l. to M. Gonzalez/Zeballos) and ATP Masters 1000 Madrid (l. to Rojer/Tecau). Also advanced to Roland Garros doubles SF w/Pella (l. to Krawietz/Mies).
- Retired in Rio de Janeiro 1R vs. Cuevas due to right leg injury.

Career Highlights

- > Achieved new career-high ranking 9 times in 2017 and 8 times in 2018, peaking at No. 11 on 11 June 2018. Highest-ranked player to stand 5-foot-7 or shorter since 5-foot-6 Solomon was No. 10 on 27 July 1981.
- > Snapped 5-match losing streak with 5 straight wins at 2016 Istanbul en route to 1st ATP Tour title. Saved 1 MP to beat Dzumhur in QF before rallying from a set and 5-2 down to defeat Dimitrov in final. Added titles at 2018 Rio de Janeiro and 2019 Los Cabos.
- > Defeated 2014 champion Cilic en route to 1st Grand Slam QF at 2017 US Open. Shortest Grand Slam quarter-finalist since fellow 5-foot-7 South American Yzaga at 1994 US Open. Reached 2018 Roland Garros QF by rallying from 2 sets down against Anderson. Advanced to 2019 Roland Garros doubles SF with countryman Pella.
- > Beat No. 6 Nishikori for biggest win of career and to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2019 Rome. Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 QFs at 2017 Monte-Carlo and 2017 Montreal, where he saved 4 MPs vs. Thiem. Doubles runner-up at 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid w/Thiem.
- > Reached QF-or-better at 11 tournaments in 2017, earning career-high 39 wins. Owns 100+ victories on ATP Tour (136-120, 3 titles) and ATP Challenger Tour (128-69, 8 titles).

MARIN CILIC

2019 US Open

- Appearing in US Open 4R for 5th time (5-0 record). Attempting to reach 14th Grand Slam QF (6th at US Open).
- Defeated [14] Isner on Saturday in only US Open 3R match between seeded players.

2019 Highlights

QF (2): ATP Masters 1000 Madrid (W/O vs Djokovic); Washington (I Medvedev)

2019 in Review

- Saved 4 MPs vs. Klizan in 1R en route to ATP Masters 1000 Madrid QF (W/O vs. No. 1 Djokovic - gastroenteritis).
- Also advanced to Washington QF (d. Auger-Aliassime, I. to Medvedev).
- Rallied from 2 sets down and saved 2 MPs vs. Verdasco to reach Australian Open 4R (I. to Bautista Agut in 5 sets).
- Owns 30 wins in 5th sets – tied with Djokovic and Federer for most among active players.
- Squandered 1 MP vs. Cuevas in Budapest 2R.
- Fell to No. 23 in ATP Rankings on 19 August – lowest since No. 29 on 30 June 2014.
- Withdrew from Pune and Rotterdam due to right knee injury.

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 3 on 29 January 2018 after reaching Australian Open final. Ended 4 of last 5 seasons in Top 10 (2014, 2016-18). Broke into Top 10 on 1 February 2010 after run to Australian Open SF. Became No. 1 junior on 2 January 2006.
- > Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 2014 and 2016-18. Owns 2-10 tournament record.
- > Won a title in 11 straight years (2008-18), including 2014 US Open. Earned only win in 10 meetings with Federer, then beat Nishikori for 1st Grand Slam title and 300th career win. Fell to Federer in finals at 2017 Wimbledon and 2018 Australian Open. Captured 2005 Roland Garros boys' singles title.
- > Won 1st ATP Masters 1000 title at 2016 Cincinnati. Also reached ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2016 Paris, 2017 Shanghai, 2018 Rome and 2018 Cincinnati. Beat No. 1 Djokovic in 2016 Paris QF and No. 1 Nadal in 2018 Australian Open QF.
- > Clinched 2018 Davis Cup title for Croatia with wins over Tsonga and Pouille in final (CRO d. FRA 3-1). Went 2-1 in 2016 final, but fell to Del Potro after leading by 2 sets (ARG d. CRO 3-2). Owns 30 wins in 5th sets – tied with Djokovic and Federer for most among active players.

RAFAEL NADAL

2019 US Open

- Appearing in US Open 4R for 11th time (8-2 record). Attempting to reach 40th Grand Slam QF (9th at US Open).
- Reached 4R-or-better at 13 straight Grand Slam events since missing 2016 Wimbledon due to left wrist injury.
- Attempting to reach 9th straight Grand Slam QF since 2017 Wimbledon (l. to Muller in 4R).
- Defeated [Q] Chung on Saturday for 60th US Open win. Owns 60+ wins at 6 tournaments (Roland Garros 93, ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo 71, Australian Open 61, ATP Masters 1000 Rome 61, Barcelona 61, US Open 60).
- Yet to drop a set thus far at US Open. On court for 4 hours, 7 minutes (4 hours, 19 minutes less than Cilic).

2019 in Review

- Captured 12th Roland Garros and 18th Grand Slam title overall (d. Federer and Thiem). Improved to 24-0 in Roland Garros SFs and finals, 93-2 overall at Roland Garros and 118-2 in best-of-5-set matches on clay.
- Became 1st men's or women's player to win a Grand Slam event 12 times. Margaret Court won Aus. Open 11 times.
- At age 33, became oldest Roland Garros champion since 34-year-old Gimeno in 1972.
- Captured ATP Masters 1000 titles at Rome (d. No. 1 Djokovic) and Montreal (d. Medvedev).
- Now owns ATP Masters 1000 records for titles (35), finals (51) and wins (381).
- Set an Open Era record by winning title for 16th straight season (2004-19) -- breaking tie with Federer (2001-15).
- Ranked in Top 10 for 750 consecutive weeks (25 April 2005-9 September 2019) -- surpassing Federer's longest run from 2002-16. Connors holds record of 789 consecutive weeks in Top 10 (23 August 1973-3 October 1988).
- Did not drop a set en route to 5th Australian Open final. Did not win a set for 1st time in 26 Grand Slam finals (l. to No. 1 Djokovic). Defeated #NextGenATP players de Minaur in 3R, Tiafoe in QF and Tsitsipas in SF.
- Five weeks after defeating Federer in Roland Garros SF, lost to him in Wimbledon SF. Owns 24-16 H2H lead.
- Squandered 3 MPs and lost 3rd-set TB to eventual champion Kyrgios in Acapulco 2R.
- Conceded walkover in ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells SF vs. Federer due to right knee injury. Withdrew from Brisbane (thigh strain), ATP Masters 1000 Miami (right knee) and ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (fatigue).

Career Highlights

> Finished 2008, 2010, 2013 and 2017 as World No. 1. Ranks 6th all-time with 196 total weeks at No. 1. Spent 750 consecutive weeks in Top 10 since 25 April 2005, including record 160 straight weeks at No. 2 before passing Federer for No. 1 on 18 August 2008.

> Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 15 straight seasons (2005-19). Made 8 appearances and still seeking 1st year-end title after finishing as runner-up in 2010 and 2013. Owns only 1 indoor hard-court title (2005 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid).

> Captured 83 titles, including unprecedented 12 at Roland Garros, 11 at ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo and 11 at Barcelona. Greatest of all time on clay with 59 titles and .918-win percentage (436-39). Owns 118-2 record in best-of-5-set matches on clay (.983). Enjoyed record win streaks on a single surface of 81 matches (2005-07) and 50 sets (2017-18). Boasts most ATP Masters 1000 titles of all time with 35. Only player to sweep Roland Garros and all 3 clay-court ATP Masters 1000 events in a single season (2010).

> Second all-time with 18 titles and 26 finals at Grand Slams, trailing only Federer's 20 titles and 31 finals. As 24-year-old at 2010 US Open, became youngest man in Open Era to complete career Grand Slam. One of 3 men to win a Grand Slam title in teens, 20s and 30s (also Sampras, Rosewall). Captured 1st of 12 Roland Garros titles as 19-year-old in 2005 and remains youngest Grand Slam champion since Chang, 17, at 1989 Roland Garros. Earned 900th win of career in 2018 Roland Garros 3R en route to title (d. Gasquet).

> Won Olympic gold medals in singles at 2008 Beijing and doubles at 2016 Rio w/M. Lopez. One of 2 men to win all 4 Grand Slams and Olympic gold medal in singles (also Agassi). Led Spain to Davis Cup titles in 2004, 2009 and 2011. Owns all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.

ANDREY RUBLEV

2019 US Open

- Appearing in US Open 4R and Grand Slam 4R for 2nd time. Advanced to 2017 US Open QF (l. to No. 1 Nadal).
- Defeated fellow former World No. 1 juniors Tsitsipas in 1R and Kyrgios in 3R.
- Beat No. 8 Tsitsipas for 3rd Top 10 win since 26 July. Only other Top 10 win was 2017 US Open 2R (d. No. 9 Dimitrov).

2019 in Review

- Advanced to 3rd ATP Tour final of career at Hamburg (d. Thiem in QF, l. to Basilashvili).
- Earned biggest career win over No. 3 Federer in 62 minutes to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at Cincinnati as Q (l. to eventual champion Medvedev). Quickest loss by Federer since 2003 Sydney 1R (l. to Squillari in 54 minutes).
- Also qualified at ATP Masters 1000 events in Miami (l. to Shapovalov in 3R) and Monte-Carlo (l. to eventual champion Fognini in 1R). Reached ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 3R as LL (l. to Khachanov).
- Did not drop a set en route to Indian Wells, USA Challenger final (l. to Edmund).
- Teamed with Donskoy in Russia's 3-1 Davis Cup win over Switzerland (l. to Kym/Laaksonen in 3rd-set TB).
- Withdrew from Roland Garros and Stuttgart qualifying due to wrist injury.

Career Highlights
