DAY THREE HIGHLIGHTS

The 2018 US Open is a tournament of anniversaries, marking 50 years since opening to professionals, 40 years since moving to Flushing and 15 years since an American won a Grand Slam men's singles title. Andy Roddick, the 2003 US Open champ, is also the last American man to reach a Grand Slam final at 2009 Wimbledon and a US Open semi-final in 2006. All three droughts are the longest for American men in Grand Slam history (since 1877).

- Five Americans are in action on Wednesday led by No. 11 seed **John Isner**, the nation's No. 1 player for a seventh straight US Open. Much has changed in Isner's life of late. After getting married last December, Isner and his wife Madison are expecting their first child next month. On the court, Isner won his first ATP Masters 1000 title at Miami and reached his first Grand Slam semi-final at Wimbledon. The 6-foot-11 Isner takes on 6-foot-6 Nicolas Jarry.
- It has also been a year of change for American No. 2 **Jack Sock**. Last fall, Sock won the ATP Masters 1000 Paris title, advanced to the Nitto ATP Finals semi-finals and reached a career-high No. 8 in the year-end ATP Rankings. Sock is 6-15 in 2018 and seeking two straight wins for the first time this season. He bids for his biggest win of the year when he plays World No. 37 **Nikoloz Basilashvili** of Georgia under the lights on Louis Armstrong Stadium.
- After rallying from two sets down for his first five-set win on Monday, #NextGenATP American Taylor Fritz faces Australian wild card Jason Kubler. Both Fritz and Kubler are former World No. 1 juniors trying to reach the third round of a Grand Slam event for the first time. Kubler broke into the Top 100 on 20 August despite being unranked as recently as April 2017 following a string of knee surgeries. The Brisbane native, who played exclusively on clay from March 2012 through May 2015, is 35-14 on the ATP Challenger Tour this season with two hard-court titles.
- Americans Denis Kudla and Steve Johnson will be underdogs in their second-round matches against No. 3 seed
 Juan Martin del Potro and No. 9 seed Dominic Thiem respectively. Following an 11-month absence and a fourth
 wrist surgery, Del Potro made his return to the ATP World Tour against Kudla. Ranked 1,042nd at the time, Del
 Potro did not face a break point in his 6-1, 6-4 win over Kudla in the 2016 Delray Beach first round. Though Thiem
 is 2-1 against Johnson, the American earned the biggest win of his career over the Austrian at Tokyo last October.
- Del Potro, who won the 2009 US Open title, is one of four former champions on the order of play Wednesday.
 Three-time champion Rafael Nadal continues his title defense against Vasek Pospisil of Canada on Arthur Ashe Stadium, 2016 champion Stan Wawrinka faces 20-year-old French qualifier Ugo Humbert on Grandstand and 2012 champion Andy Murray is 13-1 against No. 31 seed Fernando Verdasco of Spain, whom he meets on Ashe.

2018 in Review

- After missing 4 straight Grand Slam events, defeated [PR] Duckworth in his return 6-7(5) 6-3 7-5 6-3 on Monday.
- Earned 3-set wins over McDonald, Edmund and Copil to reach Washington QF (w/o vs. de Minaur)
- Defeated fellow 3-time Grand Slam champion Wawrinka at Eastbourne as WC (I. to Edmund in 2R).
- Returned following 11-month hiatus and lost 3-setter to Kyrgios in London/Queen's Club 1R.
- Fell to No. 839 in ATP Rankings on 16 July -- lowest since ATP Rankings debut at No. 774T on 21 July 2003.
- Passed by Edmund in ATP Rankings on 5 March, ending reign as No. 1 Brit since 10 July 2006.
- Underwent right hip surgery by Dr. John O'Donnell on 8 January in Melbourne, AUS.
- Withdrew from Wimbledon, where he is 2-time champion, due to hip injury.
- Conceded walkover to de Minaur in Washington QF and turned down ATP Masters 1000 Toronto WC due to fatigue.

Career Highlights

- > First British World No. 1 in ATP Rankings history. Rose to top on 7 November 2016 and spent 41 straight weeks at No.
- 1. At age 29, became 2nd-oldest player to debut at No. 1 behind only 30-year-old Newcombe on 3 June 1974. Debuted at No. 2 on 17 August 2009 and owns record for most time between becoming No. 2 and No. 1 (7 years, 82 days).
- > Defeated Djokovic at 2016 Nitto ATP Finals to clinch year-end No. 1 and ATP-best 9th title of season. Went 5-0 at event and set a record by reaching 1st final in 8th appearance.
- > Owns 45 singles titles, including 1+ each year from 2006-17, trailing only Federer's 98, Nadal's 80 and Djokovic's 70 among active players. Won 14 ATP Masters 1000 titles, including 7 of 9 events (all but Indian Wells and Monte-Carlo). Boasts tournament-record 5 titles at London/Queen's Club. Earned 25+ wins in 12 straight seasons (2006-17), beating Anderson for 500th win in 2015 ATP Masters 1000 Miami 4R and 600th win in 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 3R.
- > Captured titles at US Open in 2012 and Wimbledon in 2013 and 2016 to become 1st British Grand Slam champion since Perry at 1936 US Championships. One of 10 men in Open Era to play in all 4 Grand Slam finals.
- > First player to win 2 Olympic gold medals in singles (2012 London, 2016 Rio). Also earned mixed doubles silver medal w/Robson in 2012. Led Great Britain to 2015 Davis Cup title by becoming 1st player since introduction of World Group in 1981 to go 8-0 in singles.

2018 in Review

- Making 62nd straight Grand Slam appearance and earned 1R win over Lopez, who played in his 67th straight Slam.
- Reached Rio de Janeiro final (d. Thiem in QF, I. to Schwartzman) and Bastad SF (d. Carreno Busta, I. to Fognini).
- Celebrated 500th ATP World Tour win in hometown of Madrid on 8 May (d. Lorenzi, I. to L. Mayer in 2R).
- Also at ATP Masters 1000 events, defeated Dimitrov to reach Indian Wells 3R (I. to Fritz), advanced to Miami 4R (I. to Carreno Busta) and saved 3 MPs vs. Cuevas in Monte-Carlo 1R (I. to Cilic in 2R).
- Beat Dimitrov again in Roland Garros 3R, but fell to 0-7 in Roland Garros 4R matches (I. to Djokovic).
- Captured 8th doubles title -- 1st since 2013 ATP Finals -- at Rio de Janeiro w/Marrero as LL (d. Mektic/Peya).
- Withdrew from Barcelona due to left calf injury.

- > Finished 14 straight seasons in Top 50 (2004-17), highlighted by Top 10 year-end rankings in 2009 and 2010. Broke into singles Top 10 after reaching 2009 Australian Open SF and doubles Top 10 after winning 2013 Nitto ATP Finals title w/Marrero.
- > Also appeared at 2009 Nitto ATP Finals in singles, losing all 3 RR matches in 3 sets. Only player to qualify in singles and doubles since Bjorkman (1997 singles; 1994, 1996 and 2003-08 doubles).
- > Winner of 7 singles and 8 doubles titles, with 1st in both coming in 2004. Earned 20+ singles victories in 15 straight seasons (2004-18), celebrating 500th win in 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid 1R (d. Lorenzi). Clinched 2008 and 2009 Davis Cup titles for Spain.
- > Upset Murray and Tsonga en route to 1st Grand Slam SF at 2009 Australian Open (I. to No. 1 Nadal in 5h14m). Beat Nadal in 2016 Australian Open 1R after 4h41m. Reached QFs at 2009 US Open, 2010 US Open and 2013 Wimbledon. Played at 62 straight Grand Slams, 2nd-longest active streak (Lopez 67).
- > Defeated No. 2 Djokovic twice in 3 weeks to reach 2010 ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo final and 2010 ATP Masters 1000 Rome SF. Also a doubles finalist at 2013 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai w/Marrero.

2018 in Review

- Improved to 14-0 in US Open 1R by beating Ferrer 6-3 3-4 ret. in countryman's final Grand Slam match on Monday.
- Won record 11th title at 3 events: Monte-Carlo (d. Nishikori), Barcelona (d. Tsitsipas) and Roland Garros (d. Thiem).
- By winning Roland Garros, tied Margaret Court at Australian Open for most titles won at a single Grand Slam event.
- Improved to 111-2 in best-of-5-set matches on clay and earned 900th career win in Roland Garros 4R (d. Marterer).
- Also won record 8th Rome title (d. A. Zverev) and 33rd ATP Masters 1000 title at Toronto (d. Tsitsipas).
- Passed Federer for most ATP Masters 1000 wins (362) and tied him for consecutive seasons with an ATP title (15).
- Swept 50 straight sets on clay -- Open Era record for any single surface -- before losing to Thiem in Madrid QF.
- Reached 1st Wimbledon SF since 2011 (d. Del Potro in 5 sets after 4h48m, I. to Djokovic in 5 sets after 5h15m).
- Advanced to 10th Australian Open QF, retiring vs. Cilic in 5th set due to right hip injury.
- Ranked No. 1 from 1 January-18 February, 2 April-13 May, 21 May-17 June and 25 June-present.
- Swept Kohlschreiber and A. Zverev in straight sets to lead Spain to 3-2 win over Germany in Davis Cup QF.
- Broke all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.
- Withdrew from Brisbane (knee), Acapulco (right hip), ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells (right hip), ATP Masters 1000 Miami (right hip), London/Queen's Club (knee) and ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (fatigue).

- > Finished 2008, 2010, 2013 and 2017 as World No. 1. As 31-year-old in 2017, became oldest year-end No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings. Ranked No. 1 for 188 total weeks through end of 2018 US Open. Spent every week since 25 April 2005 in Top 10, including record 160 straight weeks at No. 2 before passing Federer on 18 August 2008.
- > Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 14 straight seasons (2005-18). Made 8 appearances and still seeking 1st year-end title after finishing as runner-up in 2010 and 2013. Owns only 1 indoor hard-court title (2005 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid).
- > Captured 80 titles, including unprecedented 11 each at ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo, Barcelona and Roland Garros. Greatest of all time on clay with 57 titles and .920-win percentage (415-36). Owns 111-2 record in best-of-5-set matches on clay (.982). Enjoyed record win streaks on a single surface of 81 matches (2005-07) and 50 sets (2017-18). Boasts most ATP Masters 1000 titles of all time with 33. Only player to sweep Roland Garros and all 3 clay-court ATP Masters 1000 events in a single season (2010).

- > Second all-time with 17 titles and 24 finals at Grand Slams, trailing only Federer's 20 titles and 30 finals. As 24-year-old at 2010 US Open, became youngest man in Open Era to complete career Grand Slam. One of 3 men to win a Grand Slam title in teens, 20s and 30s (also Sampras, Rosewall). Captured 1st of record 11 Roland Garros titles as 19-year-old in 2005 and remains youngest Grand Slam champion since Chang, 17, at 1989 Roland Garros. Earned 900th win of career in 2018 Roland Garros 4R en route to title (d. Marterer).
- > Won Olympic gold medals in singles at 2008 Beijing and doubles at 2016 Rio w/M. Lopez. One of 2 men to win all 4 Grand Slams and Olympic gold medal in singles (also Agassi). Led Spain to Davis Cup titles in 2004, 2009 and 2011. Owns all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.

- Advanced to 2nd ATP World Tour QF since 2015 at Newport (I. to Ramanathan).
- Qualified at Australian Open (I. to Cilic in 1R) and ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells (I. to Auger-Aliassime in 1R).
- Captured ATP Challenger Tour titles at Rennes, FRA (d. Berankis) and Budapest, HUN (d. Kuhn).
- Reached back-to-back Challenger finals at Gimcheon, KOR (I. to Nishioka) and Busan, KOR (I. to Ebden).
- Went 0-2 for Canada in Davis Cup 1R (CRO d. CAN 3-1). Owns 0-5 doubles record this season.

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 25 on 27 January 2014 after reaching Australian Open 3R. Broke into Top 50 on 12 August 2013 following run to ATP Masters 1000 Montreal SF. Reached doubles career-high No. 4 on 27 April 2015.
- > Played in 1st All-Canadian final of Open Era at 2014 Washington (I. to Raonic). Earned career-high 25 singles victories in 2015. Won 4 of his 6 doubles titles w/Sock. Made ATP World Tour debut as doubles WC at 2010 ATP Masters 1000 Toronto w/Raonic, defeating Djokovic/Nadal in only match as a team for 30-time Grand Slam singles champions.
- > Broke through to 1st Grand Slam singles QF at 2015 Wimbledon with 5-set wins over Millot, Ward and Troicki. Captured 2014 Wimbledon doubles title w/Sock, becoming 1st duo since Hewitt/Mirnyi at 2000 US Open to win a Grand Slam in team debut. Reached junior doubles finals at 2007 US Open w/Dimitrov and 2008 Australian Open w/Ramirez.
- > Advanced to 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF and SF at 2013 Montreal as WC (I. to Raonic in 3rd-set TB). Earned biggest win of career by beating No. 1 Murray in 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 2R as 129th-ranked Q. Reached 6 ATP Masters 1000 doubles finals w/Sock, winning lone title at 2015 Indian Wells.
- > Owns records of 112-67 on ATP Challenger Tour (7-4 in finals) and 107-41 on ITF Futures Circuit (10-2 in finals). After losing last 7 tour-level matches of 2017, captured Challenger titles in early-2018 at Rennes, FRA and Budapest, HUN.

2018 in Review

- Defeated [Q] Young 6-0 6-3 6-4 in 1R, earning a bagel for just 2nd time at US Open (d. Mahut 6-0 6-4 6-2 in 2007 1R).
- Achieved career-high No. 3 in ATP Rankings on 13 August -- 4 wrist surgeries and 8+ years after becoming No. 4.
- Saved 3 championship points to defeat No. 1 Federer for 1st ATP Masters 1000 title at Indian Wells.
- Now owns 9 wins over World No. 1 -- most among all players who've never been ranked No. 1 themselves.
- Defeated Raonic in Indian Wells SF on 17 March for 400th win of career.
- Earned straight-set wins over No. 6 Thiem, No. 5 A. Zverev and No. 8 Anderson en route to Acapulco title.
- Won 15 straight matches before falling to eventual champion Isner in ATP Masters 1000 Miami SF.
- Advanced to Roland Garros SF (I. to No. 1 Nadal) and Wimbledon QF (I. to No. 1 Nadal in 5 sets after 4h48m).
- Reached ATP World Tour 250 finals at Auckland (I. to Bautista Agut) and Los Cabos (I. to Fognini).
- Retired in Rome 3R vs. Goffin (groin strain). Withdrew from London/Queen's Club (adductor) and Toronto (left wrist).

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 3 on 13 August 2018 more than 8 years after becoming No. 4 on 11 January 2010. Finished in Top 10 and qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 2008-09 and 2012-13. Ended 2 other seasons at No. 11 (2011, 2017). Rose 200+ spots in 2011 and 500+ spots in 2016 to finish each of those seasons as No. 1 Argentine.
- > Winner of 22 singles titles, capturing 1st 4 during 23-match win streak in 2008: Stuttgart, Kitzbuhel, Los Angeles and Washington. Saved 3 championship points to beat No. 1 Federer for 1st ATP Masters 1000 title at 2018 Indian Wells. Also upset Federer in Swiss' hometown of Basel for 4th title of season in both 2012 and 2013.


