DAY FOUR FAST FACTS

- Due to inclement weather on Wednesday, there will be a total of 27 second round singles matches on Thursday's order of play. There are 11 singles matches in the top half of the draw and 16 singles matches in the bottom half.
- Three of the Top 6 players are in action with No. 2 and three-time US Open champion **Rafael Nadal**, No. 5 **Daniil Medvedev** and No. 6 **Alexander Zverev**. Nadal and Zverev, who are the two highest seeds remaining in the bottom half of the draw after four Top 10 seeds lost on Tuesday, are projected to meet in the quarter-finals if they win their next three matches.
- Nadal takes on Aussie wild card **Thanasi Kokkinakis**, who is trying to reach the 3R in a Grand Slam tournament for the first time since 2015 Roland Garros. Nadal is 12-2 in US Open 2R matches, losing in this round in his first two appearances in 2003 (l. to El Aynaoui) and 2004 (l. to Roddick). The 33-year-old Spaniard is 26-3 against Aussies since May 2007 with all three losses coming to Nick Kyrgios.
- The No. 203-ranked Kokkinakis is 2-4 lifetime against Top 10 opponents and last year he beat No. 1 Federer at ATP Masters 1000 Miami. Kokkinakis is trying to reach the 3R in a Grand Slam tournament for the first time since 2015 Roland Garros. He broke a seven-match 1R losing streak in Grand Slam events with his 1R win
- Medvedev, the hottest player on the ATP Tour this summer with a 15-2 record, tries to reach the 3R at the US Open for the second straight year. The 23-year-old Russian takes on Bolivian **Hugo Dellien**, who is trying to reach his first career Top 10 win (0-3). Medvedev leads the ATP Tour with 45 overall wins and 32 on hard courts.
- Zverev brings a 3-1 head-to-head record against #NextGenATP American **Frances Tiafoe**, who is trying to reach the 3R in Flushing Meadows for the first time. Zverev opened with a five-set win over Radu Albot and he is looking to reach the 3R for the second straight year. Tiafoe has a 3-14 career record vs. Top 10 opponents (1-4 in Grand Slam events) with his last win over No. 9 Anderson in 2R at Australian Open in January. His first Top 10 win came over No. 7 Zverev in 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 2R. He also beat No. 10 Del Potro in 2018 Delray Beach
- In addition to Tiafoe, there are four other American men in action on Thursday with World No. 14 **John Isner**, 18-year-old qualifier **Jenson Brooksby**, **Denis Kudla** and **Tennys Sandgren**.
- Isner, who is the No. 1 American at the US Open for the 8th straight year, takes a 3-0 head-to-head record against No. 2 German **Jan-Lennard Struff**. Isner has never lost in the US Open 2R (11-0) and he is trying to register his 30th career win in Flushing Meadows (29-12).

2019 in Review

- Saved 2 championship points vs. Jarry to win 11th ATP Tour title of career at Geneva.
- Finished as Acapulco singles runner-up (l. to Kyrgios) and doubles champion w/M. Zverev (d. Krajicek/Sitak).
- Reached Roland Garros QF for 2nd time (l. to No. 1 Djokovic) and Australian Open 4R for 1st time (l. to Raonic).
- One of 5 men under 23 to reach Australian Open 4R -- most at a Grand Slam since 2009 Roland Garros (5).
- Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 QFs at Madrid (d. Ferrer in 2R, l. to Tsitsipas) and Montreal (l. to Khachanov).
- Blew 1 MP vs. Jarry in Barcelona 2R, 2 MPs vs. Garin in Munich QF and 2 MPs vs. Basilashvili in Hamburg SF.
- Won 2nd and 4th rubber of Germany's 5-0 win over Hungary in Davis Cup Qualifiers (d. Nagy and Borsos).
- Withdrew from Rotterdam due to ankle injury.

Career Highlights

- > Reached career-high No. 3 on 6 November 2017. Achieved new career-high ranking 8 times in 2017 and 14 times in 2016. Youngest player in year-end 2018 Top 10, 2017 Top 20, 2016 Top 50, 2015 Top 100 and 2014 Top 200.
- > Captured biggest title of career at 2018 Nitto ATP Finals (d. No. 1 Djokovic for biggest career win). First German to win title since Becker in 1995. Also qualified in 2017 (1-2 in RR).
- > Beat Wawrinka at age 19 for 1st of 11 titles at 2016 St. Petersburg, becoming youngest ATP Tour champion since Nishikori, 18, at 2008 Delray Beach. Won singles and doubles titles w/M. Zverev at 2017 Montpellier -- 1st brothers to sweep titles since Murrays at 2011 Tokyo. Rallied from 2-sets-to-1 down in 3 straight matches to reach 1st Grand Slam QF at 2018 Roland Garros.

> From May 2017 to November 2018, became youngest Top 3 player, Nitto ATP Finals champion and ATP Masters 1000 champion since Djokovic in 2007-08. Only active player besides Big Four to win 3+ ATP Masters 1000 titles (2017 Rome, 2017 Montreal, 2018 Madrid). Fought off 3 MPs vs. Gasquet before beating Federer for 2017 Montreal title. Saved 1/1 BP en route to 2018 Madrid title -- fewest BPs faced by an ATP Masters 1000 champ since stats started being kept in 1991.

> Finished 2013 as No. 1 junior. Went 96-35 on ITF Junior Circuit, including wins over future Top 50 ATP players Chung, Djere, Edmund, Fritz, Norrie and Rublev. Ended junior career at age 16 by winning 2014 Australian Open boys' singles title. Also reached 2013 Roland Garros boys' singles final.

2019 in Review

- Has a 3-14 career record vs. Top 10 opponents (1-4 in Grand Slam events) with last win over No. 9 Anderson in 2R at Australian Open in January. Has lost last four straight since his win over the South African. Also has wins over No. 7 Zverev in 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati and No. 10 Del Potro in 2018 Delray Beach.
- Defeated 2017 semi-finalist Dimitrov on 21st birthday to reach 1st Grand Slam QF at Australian Open (l. to Nadal).
- Became youngest American Grand Slam quarter-finalist since Roddick, 20, at 2003 Wimbledon.
- Upset No. 6 Anderson in Aus. Open 2R for biggest win of career and beat Seppi in 3R for 1st win in 5 sets (1-7).
- Achieved career-high No. 29 in ATP Rankings on 11 February.
- Advanced to 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at Miami (l. to Shapovalov), becoming youngest American in Miami QF since his former coach Ginepri, 20, in 2003. Also reached QFs at Estoril (l. to Cuevas) and Winston-Salem (l. to Hurkacz).
- Squandered 4 MPs vs. Sousa in ATP Masters 1000 Rome 1R.
- Withdrew from ATP Masters 1000 Montreal due to right foot injury.

Career Highlights

> Set a new career-high ranking 11 times in 2017 and 7 times in 2018 before peaking at No. 29 on 11 February 2019. Improved year-end ranking in 4 straight seasons (2015-18). Earned 1st ranking point on same date (10 February 2014) and at same tournament as countryman Fritz (Palm Coast, USA Futures). Captured 2013 Orange Bowl title at age 15 and reached No. 2 in junior rankings on 14 April 2014.

> Qualified for 2018 Next Gen ATP Finals and went 1-2. Earned 28 wins in 2018 after entering season with 9 career wins.

> Enjoyed 1st ATP Tour SF, final and title at 2018 Delray Beach. As 20-year-old, became youngest American champion on tour since Roddick, 19, at 2002 Houston. First WC to win Delray Beach title in 27-year tournament history. Saved 3 MPs vs. Sandgren en route to 2nd final at 2018 Estoril.

> Defeated Dimitrov on 21st birthday to reach 1st Grand Slam QF at 2019 Australian Open. Became youngest American Grand Slam quarter-finalist since Roddick, 20, at 2003 Wimbledon. Upset No. 6 Anderson in 2R for biggest win of career and edged Seppi in 3R for 1st win in 5 sets.

> Beat former finalist Ferrer en route to 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2019 Miami. Became youngest American quarter-finalist at Miami since his former coach Ginepri, 20, in 2003.

2019 in Review

- Trying to reach 3R of a Grand Slam tournament for first time since 2015 Roland Garros (l. to Djokovic). Broke a seven-match 1R losing streak by defeating [Q] Ivashka in 1R on Tuesday.
- Has a 2-4 career record vs. Top 10 opponents with wins over No. 6 Raonic at 2017 London/Queen's Club and No. 1 Federer at 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Miami.
- Advanced to 2nd ATP Tour QF of career at Los Cabos as WC (d. Pouille, l. to Albot). Had not won a tour-level match since defeating No. 1 Federer in 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R as Q.
- Qualified at Brisbane (l. to Tsonga in 1R) and Australian Open (ret. vs. Daniel in 1R due to right shoulder injury).
- Played doubles at Surbiton, GBR Challenger with countryman Kyrgios (l. to Evans/Glasspool in QF).
- Withdrew from Delray Beach qualifying, Indian Wells qualifying and Monte-Carlo due to right shoulder injury.
- Withdrew from Roland Garros qualifying and Wimbledon qualifying due to right pectoral injury.
- Conceded W/O to Mager in Barletta, ITA Challenger 3R and Kubler in Winnetka, USA Challenger SF (right pectoral).

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 69 on 8 June 2015 following run to Roland Garros 3R. Finished 2015 as 1 of 4 teenagers in Top 100 (also Coric, Chung and A. Zverev). Unranked from 12 Sept. 2016 until 12 June 2017 due to injuries. Earned 1st ranking point 8 days after 15th birthday on 18 April 2011. Peaked at No. 10 in junior rankings on 9 December 2013.
- > Upset defending champion and World No. 1 Federer in 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R as 175th-ranked Q. Became lowest-ranked player to beat World No. 1 since No. 178 Clavet beat Hewitt in 2003 Miami in same round.
- > Qualified at 5 ATP Masters 1000 events overall. Reached 2015 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 4R as No. 124 WC.
- > Advanced to 1st ATP Tour QF, SF and final at 2017 Los Cabos as 454th-ranked WC. Captured 1st ATP Tour doubles title as 2017 Brisbane WC w/Thompson. Lost to Hewitt in ATP Tour debut at 2014 Brisbane as Q. Secured 1st win at 2014 Australian Open as WC (d. Sijsling).
- > Reached 2015 Roland Garros 3R, rallying from 2 sets and 3 MPs down against countryman Tomic. Advanced to 3 Grand Slam boys' finals in 2013, winning Wimbledon doubles title with countryman Kyrgios and finishing as singles runner-up at Australian Open (d. Coric, l. to Kyrgios) and US Open (d. Garin, l. to Coric).

2019 in Review

- Captured 12th Roland Garros and 18th Grand Slam title overall (d. Federer and Thiem). Improved to 24-0 in Roland Garros SFs and finals, 93-2 overall at Roland Garros and 118-2 in best-of-5-set matches on clay.
- Became 1st men's or women's player to win a Grand Slam event 12 times. Margaret Court won Aus. Open 11 times.
- At age 33, became oldest Roland Garros champion since 34-year-old Gimeno in 1972.
- Captured ATP Masters 1000 titles at Rome (d. No. 1 Djokovic) and Montreal (d. Medvedev).
- Now owns ATP Masters 1000 records for titles (35), finals (51) and wins (381).
- Set an Open Era record by winning title for 16th straight season (2004-19) -- breaking tie with Federer (2001-15).
- Ranked in Top 10 for 750 consecutive weeks (25 April 2005-9 September 2019) -- surpassing Federer's longest run from 2002-16. Connors holds record of 789 consecutive weeks in Top 10 (23 August 1973-3 October 1988).
- Did not drop a set en route to 5th Australian Open final. Did not win a set for 1st time in 26 Grand Slam finals (l. to No. 1 Djokovic). Defeated #NextGenATP players de Minaur in 3R, Tiafoe in QF and Tsitsipas in SF.
- Five weeks after defeating Federer in Roland Garros SF, lost to him in Wimbledon SF. Owns 24-16 H2H lead.
- Squandered 3 MPs and lost 3rd-set TB to eventual champion Kyrgios in Acapulco 2R.
- Conceded walkover in ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells SF vs. Federer due to right knee injury. Withdrew from Brisbane (thigh strain), ATP Masters 1000 Miami (right knee) and ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (fatigue).

Career Highlights

> Finished 2008, 2010, 2013 and 2017 as World No. 1. Ranks 6th all-time with 196 total weeks at No. 1. Spent 750 consecutive weeks in Top 10 since 25 April 2005, including record 160 straight weeks at No. 2 before passing Federer for No. 1 on 18 August 2008.

> Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 15 straight seasons (2005-19). Made 8 appearances and still seeking 1st year-end title after finishing as runner-up in 2010 and 2013. Owns only 1 indoor hard-court title (2005 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid).

> Captured 83 titles, including unprecedented 12 at Roland Garros, 11 at ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo and 11 at Barcelona. Greatest of all time on clay with 59 titles and .918-win percentage (436-39). Owns 118-2 record in best-of-5-set matches on clay (.983). Enjoyed record win streaks on a single surface of 81 matches (2005-07) and 50 sets (2017-18). Boasts most ATP Masters 1000 titles of all time with 35. Only player to sweep Roland Garros and all 3 clay-court ATP Masters 1000 events in a single season (2010).

> Second all-time with 18 titles and 26 finals at Grand Slams, trailing only Federer's 20 titles and 31 finals. As 24-year-old at 2010 US Open, became youngest man in Open Era to complete career Grand Slam. One of 3 men to win a Grand Slam title in teens, 20s and 30s (also Sampras, Rosewall). Captured 1st of 12 Roland Garros titles as 19-year-old in 2005 and remains youngest Grand Slam champion since Chang, 17, at 1989 Roland Garros. Earned 900th win of career in 2018 Roland Garros 3R en route to title (d. Gasquet).

> Won Olympic gold medals in singles at 2008 Beijing and doubles at 2016 Rio w/M. Lopez. One of 2 men to win all 4 Grand Slams and Olympic gold medal in singles (also Agassi). Led Spain to Davis Cup titles in 2004, 2009 and 2011. Owns all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.

2019 in Review

- Captured tournament-record 4th title at Newport as WC (d. Bublik). Improved Newport record to 23-5.
- Did not drop a set and went 9-0 in TBs en route to 2nd straight ATP Masters 1000 Miami final (l. to Federer).
- Lost 3-set SFs in 3 straight weeks at New York (l. to Opelka after holding 6 MPs), Delray Beach as WC (l. to Evans) and Acapulco (l. to Kyrgios). Hit 38 aces and was aced 43 times vs. Opelka -- most combined aces in Best-of-3-set match since stats started being tracked in 1991.
- Beat Mannarino for 400th win in Acapulco 1R. Ended 6-match losing streak by beating Tomic in New York 2R.
- Squandered 1 MP vs. Carreno Busta in ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 2R.
- Broke left foot in 2nd set of ATP Masters 1000 Miami final and did not play in April, May and June.

Career Highlights

- > Earned 30+ wins and finished 9 straight seasons in Top 20 (2010-18). Achieved career-high No. 8 on 16 July 2018 after Wimbledon SF run. Tallest Top 10 player in history at 2.08m/6-foot-10.
- > Owns 15 ATP Tour titles, including 5 in Atlanta, 4 in Newport and 2 in Winston-Salem (all tournament records). Posted 1st 5 wins all in 3rd-set TBs to reach 2007 Washington final. Earned 400th career win over Mannarino in 2019 Acapulco 1R. Hit 10,000th ace in 2018 Houston QF, becoming 4th player to reach milestone since 1991 (also Ivanisevic, Karlovic, Federer).
- > Saved 2 MPs vs. Bemelmans en route to 1st Grand Slam SF at 2018 Wimbledon, losing to Anderson 26-24 in 5th after 6h36m. In 2010 Wimbledon 1R, won longest match ever over Mahut 70-68 in 5th after 11h5m. Hit record 113 aces over 3 days. Did not hit an ace in next round (l. to de Bakker 6-0 6-3 6-2).
- > Won biggest career title at 2018 Miami. Became oldest 1st-time ATP Masters 1000 champion in history at age 32 and lowest-ranked Miami champion at No. 17 since No. 18 Courier in 1991. Returned to Miami final in 2019.
- > Beat No. 1 Djokovic en route to ATP Masters 1000 finals at 2012 Indian Wells and 2013 Cincinnati. Also reached 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Paris final. Won 3 ATP Masters 1000 doubles titles, including 2016 Shanghai and 2018 Indian Wells w/Sock.

2019 in Review

- No. 2 German achieved career-high No. 33 in ATP Rankings on 1 July and has won a personal-best 29 matches, surpassing his previous wins total (28) in 2017.
