## DAY THREE FAST FACTS

- **Federer** is 18-0 in 2R matches at the US Open and the last time he lost in the 2R at a Grand Slam tournament came at 2013 Wimbledon (l. to Stakhovsky).
- Federer is 2-0 against **Damir Dzumhur**, winning both matches in 2015 Roland Garros and Wimbledon. The top player from Bosnia-Herzegovina is ranked No. 99 and he has a 4-15 career record vs. Top 10 opponents. He is looking to break a nine-match losing streak since his last Top 10 win over No. 4 A. Zverev in 2017 Shenzhen QF. He is 0-6 in Grand Slam tournaments.
- World No. 1 and reigning US Open champion **Djokovic** is 34-1 in his last 35 Grand Slam tournament matches. He is 13-0 in US Open 2R matches and the 32-year-old Serb takes on Argentine **Juan Ignacio Londero**, who is looking for his first career Top 10 victory (0-3). Londero is one of 14 first-time ATP Tour winners this season.
- Djokovic is also attempting to tie Pete Sampras for the fifth-most US Open wins (71) in the Open Era:

- No. 5 **Daniil Medvedev**, the hottest player on the ATP Tour this summer with a 15-2 record, tries to reach the 3R at the US Open for the second straight year. The 23-year-old Russian takes on Bolivian **Hugo Dellien**, who is trying to reach his first career Top 10 win (0-3). Medvedev leads the ATP Tour with 45 overall wins and 32 on hard courts.
- There are four Americans in action, led by **Reilly Opelka**, who celebrates his 22nd birthday on Wednesday. The others are 18-year-old qualifier **Jenson Brooksby**, **Bradley Klahn** and **Denis Kudla**. All four are trying to reach the 3R at the US Open for the first time.
- No. 23 seed and 2016 US Open champion **Stan Wawrinka** is also on the schedule along with No. 7 and 2014 finalist **Kei Nishikori**.

## ROGER FEDERER

### 2019 in Review

- Won 10th Halle and 102nd title at age 37 (d. Goffin). Oldest champion since Rosewall, 43, at 1977 Hong Kong.
- Also won 4th Miami, 28th ATP Masters 1000 and 101st overall title (d. Isner). Played in 50th ATP Masters 1000 final.
- With addition of 4 wins from Laver Cup (2017-18), earned 1,200th win of career in Miami QF (d. Anderson).
- Captured 8th Dubai and 100th overall title (d. Tsitsipas). Trails only Connors' 109 titles and 1,274 wins in Open Era.
- Win over Tsitsipas marked 1st title of career as World No. 7 and 50th different opponent defeated in a final.
- Defeated Nadal to reach 12th Wimbledon final (l. to Djokovic after holding 2 championship points).
- Beat Nishikori in QF for 100th Wimbledon win of career. Became 1st player with 100 wins at a Grand Slam event.
- Did not drop a set en route to 9th ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells final (l. to Thiem).
- Returned to Roland Garros for 1st time since 2015 and reached 8th SF at tournament (l. to Nadal).
- Saved 2 MPs vs. Monfils in ATP Masters 1000 Madrid 3R (l. to Thiem in QF after holding 2 MPs).
- Saved 2 MPs vs. Coric in ATP Masters 1000 Rome 3R (W/O vs. Tsitsipas in QF due to right leg injury).
- Earned 20+ wins and advanced to Australian Open 3R-or-better for 20th straight season (l. to Tsitsipas in 4R).

### Career Highlights

> Set new records with 310 weeks overall and 237 consecutive weeks at No. 1 (2004-08). Became oldest No. 1 in history at age 36 on 19 February 2018. Ended 5 seasons as No. 1 (2004-07, 2009). One of 4 players to finish 5+ seasons at No. 1 along with Sampras (6), Connors (5) and Djokovic (5).

> Holds Nitto ATP Finals records for titles (6), finals (10), SFs (15), appearances (17) and wins (57), capturing championship in 3 cities (Houston 2003-04, Shanghai 2006-07, London 2010-11) and 5 times with 5-0 record (2003-04, 2006, 2010-11). Qualified for 2019 Nitto ATP Finals with 1R win on Monday.

- > Owns 102 titles and 1,224 wins -- 2nd-most in Open Era behind Connors' 109 titles and 1,274 wins. Earned 100th title at 2019 Dubai (d. Tsitsipas) and 1,000th win in 2015 Brisbane final (d. Raonic).
- > Enjoyed 41-match win streak (2006-07), reached 17 straight finals (2005-06), posted 24-match win streak in finals (2003-05), won 24 straight matches vs. Top 10 (2003-05) and earned record 65 consecutive victories on grass (2003-08). Went 81-4 in 2005 (.953) for best win percentage since McEnroe went 82-3 in 1984 (.965). Boasts 10 wins vs. World No. 1 and 10 wins from 2 sets down. Never retired in 1,711 matches on tour (1,490 singles and 221 doubles).
- > Greatest of all time at Grand Slams with 20 titles in 31 finals and 354 victories overall. One of 8 men to win all 4 majors, securing career Grand Slam at 2009 Roland Garros. Captured record 8th Wimbledon title in 2017. By winning 6th Australian Open title at age 36 in 2018, became 2nd-oldest Grand Slam champion in Open Era behind Rosewall, 37, at 1972 Australian Open. Owns Open Era records for consecutive Grand Slam finals (10), SFs (23) and QFs (36). Won 16 of 27 Grand Slam events beginning with 2003 Wimbledon, then 1 of 27 after that. Made 20 straight appearances at Australian Open (2000-19) and 21 at Wimbledon (1999-2019). Boasts 28 titles, 50 finals and 379 wins at ATP Masters 1000s, including Indian Wells/Miami 'Sunshine Double' in 2005-06 and 2017.
- > Two-time Olympic medalist, taking gold in doubles at 2008 Beijing w/Wawrinka and silver in singles at 2012 London. Finished 4th in singles at 2000 Sydney Olympics. Clinched 2014 Davis Cup title for Switzerland by beating Gasquet for 50th Davis Cup win (SUI d. FRA 3-1).

## DAMIR DZUMHUR

### 2019 in Review

- Best results are QFs at Rotterdam (d. Tsitsipas in 1R, l. to Monfils), Geneva as Q (d. Wawrinka, l. to Albot) and Antalya (ret. vs. Thompson due to stomach injury).
- Qualified at Winston-Salem (l. to Sonogo in 2R).
- Fell to Millman in opening rubber of Bosnia-Herzegovina's 4-0 loss to Australia in Davis Cup Qualifiers.
- Dropped outside Top 100 of ATP Rankings on 5 August for 1st time since 16 February 2015.
- Conceded walkover to Cecchinato in ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R due to lower back pain.
- Retired vs. Cecchinato in ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo 1R and withdrew from Budapest due to abdominal injury.
- Withdrew from 's-Hertogenbosch and Halle due to shoulder injury.

### Career Highlights

- > Top Bosnian in ATP Rankings history. Achieved career-high No. 23 on 2 July 2018 after winning 3rd ATP Tour title at Antalya. Improved year-end ranking in 8 straight seasons (2010-17).
- > First player to sweep both Russian titles in a single season, capturing 1st championships of career at St. Petersburg and Moscow in 2017.
- > Finished 2017 season on 24-7 run, including 1st final at Winston-Salem. Earned career-best 36 victories in 2017, highlighted by biggest wins of career over No. 3 Wawrinka in Dubai 1R and No. 4 A. Zverev in Shenzhen QF.
- > Advanced to Grand Slam 3R on 5 occasions, including 2018 Roland Garros, where he led No. 3 A. Zverev by 2 sets to 1 and held 1 MP before losing.
- > Defeated Nadal en route to 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Miami R16. Also reached R16 at 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo as Q and 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Paris.

## NOVAK DJOKOVIC

### 2019 Highlights

### 2019 in Review

- Saved 2 championship points to defeat Federer in longest Wimbledon final on record (4 hours, 55 minutes).
- Became 1st Wimbledon champion to save championship point since Bob Falkenburg saved 3 MPs in 1948 final.
- Also saved 2 MPs to defeat Federer in both 2010 US Open SF and 2011 US Open SF. Leads H2H 26-22.
- Prior to 5th Wimbledon title, captured record 7th Aus. Open title (d. Nadal). Third all-time with 16 Grand Slam titles.
- Became 1st player in history to win 3+ straight Grand Slam titles on 3 occasions (also 2011-12, 2015-16).
- Also 1st player to win a Grand Slam final over Nadal in straight sets. Spaniard has reached 26 Grand Slam finals.
- Won 26 straight Grand Slam matches until Roland Garros SF (l. to Thiem in 5 sets).
- Earned 200th win vs. Top 10 to capture 33rd ATP Masters 1000 title at Madrid (d. Tsitsipas).
- Saved 2 MPs vs. Del Potro en route to 9th Rome and 49th ATP Masters 1000 final (l. to Nadal).
- Projected to pass Connors and Lendl and move into 3rd all-time with 271 weeks as World No. 1 on 30 September.

### Career Highlights

> Ended 5 years as World No. 1 (2011-12, 2014-15, 2018). One of 4 players to finish 5+ seasons at No. 1 along with Sampras (6), Connors (5) and Federer (5). Projected to pass Connors and Lendl and move into 3rd all-time with 271 weeks as World No. 1 on 30 September 2019, trailing only Federer's 310 weeks and Sampras' 286 weeks. In 2018, became oldest year-end No. 1 in ATP Rankings history at age 31 (since 1973). Also set records for lowest ranking (No. 22), worst 10-match start (5-5) and fewest pre-Wimbledon titles (0) in same season as finishing No. 1. Earned record \$21,646,145 in 2015 and \$134,979,120 in career.

> Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals 12 times (2007-16, 2018-19), capturing 5 titles overall and becoming 1st player to sweep 4 straight titles (2008, 2012-15). Finished Top 3 and earned 50+ wins in 11 of last 12 seasons (2007-16, 2018).

> Owns 75 singles titles, including 16 Grand Slams (3rd behind Federer's 20 and Nadal's 18) and 33 ATP Masters 1000s (2nd behind Nadal's 35). Won 2+ titles each year from 2006-19, including all 4 Grand Slam and all 9 ATP Masters 1000 events. Only player with titles at all 9 ATP Masters 1000s since start of series in 1990. Enjoyed win streaks of 43 matches overall (2010-11), 31 matches at ATP Masters 1000s (2011) and 30 matches at Grand Slams (2015-16). One of 3 active players with 800+ victories (also Federer, Nadal). Earned 800th win in 2018 London/Queen's Club QF (d. Mannarino). Owns winning records against Nadal (28-26), Federer (26-22) and Murray (25-11).

> Swept titles at 2015 Wimbledon, 2015 US Open, 2016 Australian Open and 2016 Roland Garros, becoming 8th player to complete career Grand Slam and 3rd to hold all 4 major titles at one time (also Budge, Laver). Only player to win 3+ Grand Slam titles in a row on 3 occasions (2011-12, 2015-16, 2018-19). Enjoyed Grand Slam streaks of 28 QFs (2009-16), 14 SFs (2010-13) and 6 finals (2015-16). Owns most Australian Open titles of all time with 7. Captured 4th Wimbledon title in 2018 as World No. 21, becoming lowest-ranked Grand Slam champion since No. 44 Gaudio at 2004 Roland Garros. Added 5th Wimbledon title in 2019 by saving 2 championship points vs. Federer.

> Won 2008 Beijing Olympics bronze medal, then led Serbia to 2010 Davis Cup title (SRB d. FRA 3-2). Lost in 2012 London Olympics bronze medal match and 2013 Davis Cup final, despite defeating Stepanek and Berdych (CZE d. SRB 3-2).

## JUAN IGNACIO LONDERO

### 2019 Highlights

### 2019 in Review

- Captured 1st ATP Tour title on home soil at Cordoba as 112th-ranked WC (d. Pella) in February.
- Became 1st player since Darcis at 2007 Amersfoort to win a title without a tour-level victory entering tournament.
- Also advanced to Bastad final (l. to Jarry). Has won a career-high 22 tour-level matches this season.
- Reached Roland Garros 4R (d. Basilashvili, Gasquet and Moutet; l. to Nadal). Became 1st player to reach 4R in Grand Slam debut since Goffin at 2012 Roland Garros.
- Broke into Top 100 of ATP Rankings on 11 February and achieved career-high No. 55 on 12 August.
- Qualified at Rio de Janeiro (l. to Cuevas in 2R) and ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo (l. to Auger-Aliassime in 1R).

### Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 55 on 12 August 2019 after posting 20th win of season and career at Los Cabos. Broke into Top 100 on 11 February 2019 following historic title win at Cordoba. Entered Top 200 nearly 5 years earlier on 9 June 2014.
- > Captured 1st ATP Tour title at 2019 Cordoba as 112th-ranked WC. Became 1st player since Darcis at 2007 Amersfoort to win a title without a tour-level victory entering tournament. Went on to reach 2019 Bastad final.
- > Beat Basilashvili, Gasquet and Moutet before falling to 12-time champion Nadal in 2019 Roland Garros 4R. Became 1st player to reach 4R in Grand Slam debut since Goffin at 2012 Roland Garros.
- > Made ATP Tour debut at 2013 Bogota as Q -- more than 5 years before 1st ATP Tour win at 2019 Cordoba. Also qualified at 2014 Bogota and 2018 Bastad.
- > Owns 108-98 ATP Challenger Tour record, winning titles in 2018 at Mexico City, MEX as Q and Marburg, GER. Boasts Challenger wins over past or present Top 20 players Auger-Aliassime, Pouille and Schwartzman.

### BRADLEY KLAHN

#### 2019 in Review

- Snapped 7-match tour-level losing streak and earned 1st win of season at Antalya (d. Darcis, l. to Thompson in 2R).
- Qualified at Auckland (l. to Kohlschreiber in 1R) and advanced to 2R at Atlanta (l. to eventual champion de Minaur).
- Did not drop a set en route to 8th ATP Challenger Tour title at Winnetka, USA (d. Kubler).
- Let 2-set lead slip away against 2018 semi-finalist Chung in Australian Open 1R.
- Withdrew from New York, Delray Beach and Acapulco qualifying due to sprained ankle.

#### Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 63 on 17 March 2014 after making ATP Masters 1000 debut at Indian Wells. Broke into Top 100 on 18 November 2013 and returned to Top 100 for 1st time in 4+ years on 20 August 2018. Unranked from 15 February 2016 through 20 November 2016 while rehabbing back.
- > As reigning NCAA singles champion, made tour-level debut at 2010 US Open as WC. Enjoyed 1st and biggest win of career at 2012 US Open as Q, defeating No. 36 J. Melzer in 5 sets. Also reached 2R at 2013 US Open as WC and 2018 Wimbledon as Q.
- > Secured his 3rd US Open WC in 2018 by winning USTA's US Open Wild Card Challenge. Clinched WC by qualifying and earning 1st ATP Masters 1000 win over Ferrer at 2018 Toronto.
- > Owns 136-73 ATP Challenger Tour record (8-6 in finals). Did not drop a set en route to most recent Challenger title at 2019 Winnetka, USA.
- > Peaked at No. 14 in junior rankings on 7 April 2008. Played at all 4 junior Grand Slams in 2008, reaching 3R at Australian Open, Wimbledon and US Open. Went 68-34 overall on ITF Junior Circuit with wins over future ATP Top 25 players Basilashvili, Carreno Busta, Pospisil and Raonic.

- Advanced to ATP 500 SFs at Rotterdam (l. to Wawrinka) and Barcelona (l. to Medvedev).
- Reached Grand Slam QFs at Australian Open (d. Majchrzak, Karlovic and Carreno Busta in 5 sets; ret. vs. No. 1 Djokovic due to quad strain), Roland Garros (d. Djere and Paire in 5 sets, l. to Nadal) and Wimbledon (l. to Federer).
- Improved to 23-6 in 5th sets with 3 wins at Australian Open and 2 wins at Roland Garros. Won 8 straight 5th sets.
- Earned 400th win of career in Wimbledon 3R (d. Johnson).
- Squandered 1 MP vs. Gasquet in ATP Masters 1000 Montreal 2R.
- Withdrew from Washington due to right arm injury.

## Career Highlights

- > Top Asian player in ATP Rankings history. Achieved career-high No. 4 on 2 March 2015 after reaching Acapulco final. Broke into Top 10 on 12 May 2014 after reaching ATP Masters 1000 Madrid final.
- > Finished in Top 10, earned 40+ wins and qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 2014-16 and 2018 (SFs in 2014, 2016).
