CINCH CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- **British Favourite Returns:** It's been more than three months since former World No. 1 **Andy Murray** last competed in singles on the ATP Tour, shortly before the British star and his wife Kim welcomed their fourth child. Murray returns to familiar surroundings at The Queen's Club, where the 34-year-old has won a tournament record five titles (2009, 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2016) and compiled a 30-8 match record,
- **Berrettini Top Seed:** **Matteo Berrettini** returned from a hernia/groin injury to compile strong clay-court results, which included the Belgrade-1 title (d. Karatsev), final at ATP Masters 1000 Madrid (l. to Zverev) and QF at Roland Garros (l. to Djokovic). As the Italian switches surfaces, the Nitto ATP Finals hopeful will be looking to build upon his 21-6 record, having captured one grass-court crown at 2019 Stuttgart (d. Auger-Aliassime). Should he beat countryman **Stefano Travaglia** in the opener, Murray may be a potential 2R foe.
- **Three Former Champions In Field:** Murray will be joined by two other former champions, Croatian **Marin Cilic** and Spaniard **Feliciano Lopez**. Cilic, who captured his 19th ATP Tour crown on Sunday in Stuttgart (d. Auger-Aliassime), is a two-time champion, winning in 2012 and 2018. With no tournament in 2020, Lopez comes in as the reigning champion, having completed the 2019 title double ranked World No. 113. He also won the 2017 title. The Spaniard beat Gilles Simon in the singles final and teamed up with Murray for the doubles crown (d. Ram/Salisbury).
- **Karatsev Makes Grass Debut:** **Aslan Karatsev** has been the breakthrough story of 2021 after his run to the Australian Open semi-finals (l. to Djokovic) in February and his first ATP Tour crown in Dubai (d. Harris). The 27-year-old Russian will play his first tour-level grass-court tournament in London and is firmly in contention for a spot at the Nitto ATP Finals in November, sitting in seventh position in the FedEx ATP Race Turin.
- **Italians In London:** #NextGenATP star **Jannik Sinner**, **Lorenzo Sonego** and **Fabio Fognini** join Berrettini in the cinch Championships. Third seed Sinner has played just one tour-level match on grass, while No. 7 seed Sonego clinched the 2019 Antalya Open crown (d. Kecmanovic) on the surface. Fognini's best performance on grass came in June 2016 when he reached the Eastbourne quarter-finals (l. to Dodig).

Jack Draper | Age: 19 | World No. 309 | Career-High No. 283 | 2021: 0-1 (Miami 1R) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)

> Has a 7-9 career record on ATP Challenger Tour and 77-22 in Futures events with 7 titles on hard courts.

> Made his ATP Tour debut as a WC in 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Miami where he retired after losing the 1st set 7-5 to Kukushkin due to heat related illness.

> Last month reached final at Prague Futures on clay.

> In 2019, played 3 tournaments on grass, at Nottingham Challenger (l. to Evans in 2R), 1R qualifying at Queen's (l. to Bublik) and 1R qualifying at Wimbledon (l. to Uchiyama).

> Reached 2019 Wimbledon juniors final (l. to Tseng).

NOTE: British teenager is looking for his first career ATP Tour main draw win (0-1).

Jannik Sinner | Age: 19 | World No. 23 | Career-High No. 17 | 2021: 24-11 (Melbourne-1 Title) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)

> Unranked to begin 2018, broke into Top 100 in 2019, ended 2020 as No. 1 teenager, and achieved career-high No. 17 on 17 May 2021. First Italian teen to break the Top 20 in the history of the ATP Rankings (since 1973).

> After capturing 2019 Next Gen ATP Finals title, added ATP 250 titles to end 2020 season (Sofia) and begin 2021 season (Melbourne-1).

> Youngest ATP Tour champion at age 19 since Nishikori, 18, at 2008 Delray Beach; youngest 2-time champion since Djokovic, 19, in 2006; and youngest player to win titles in consecutive appearances since Nadal, 19, in 2005.

> Became 1st Italian finalist and 2nd-youngest finalist in 36-year history of Miami Open, finishing as 2021 runner-up at age 19 (l. to Hurkacz).

> Advanced to 2020 Roland Garros QF in tournament debut at age 19, becoming 1st debutant to reach Roland Garros QF since Nadal in 2005 and youngest quarter-finalist at event since Djokovic, 19, in 2006.

NOTE: #NextGenATP Italian has reached QFs or better in 5 tournaments and has a 14-5 record on hard, 10-6 on clay this season. In only previous pro grass court main draw, qualified and lost in 1R at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch (l. to Jarry).

Cameron Norrie | Age: 25 | World No. 41 | Career-High No. 41 | 2021: 25-12 (Estoril, Lyon Finals) | Queen's: 0-3 (2017-19 1R)

> Former Top-10 junior set a new career-high ranking 9 times in 2018 and 5 times in 2019, peaking at No. 41.

> Advanced to ATP Tour finals at 2019 Auckland as WC, 2021 Estoril and 2021 Lyon.

> Beat No. 4 Thiem en route to 2021 Lyon final and No. 10 Isner en route to 2018 Lyon SF for biggest wins of career.

> Rallied from 2 sets down and saved 2 MPs vs. Schwartzman en route to 2020 US Open 3R.

> Born in South Africa, grew up in New Zealand, became No. 1 collegiate player in USA at Texas Christian University, and has represented Great Britain since 2013.

NOTE: British No. 2 is 11-1 in 1R matches this season and he's already achieved a personal-best 25 wins (14-5 on clay, 11-7 on hard). Looking for his first Queen's Club main draw win (0-3).

Albert Ramos-Vinolas | Age: 33 | World No. 38 | Career-High No. 17 | 2021: 18-11 (Estoril Title) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)

> Achieved career-high No. 17 in 2017 and is 1 of 4 left-handed Spaniards to finish each of last 10 seasons in Top 100 (also Lopez, Nadal, Verdasco).

> Nine-time finalist on ATP Tour, winning 1st title at 2016 Bastad and 2nd title at 2019 Gstaad.

> Advanced to 3R, 4R and QF of a Grand Slam for 1st time at 2016 Roland Garros.

> Reached QF, SF and final of an ATP Masters 1000 event for 1st time at 2017 Monte Carlo, earning biggest career win over World No. 1 Murray in 3R from 0-4 down in 3rd set.

> Defeated defending champion Federer in 2015 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai 2R for 1st win in 16 tries vs. Top 10.

NOTE: Ramos-Vinolas is 17-8 on clay this season (1-3 on hard) with his third career ATP Tour title in Estoril (d. Norrie) and finalist in Cordoba (l. to J.M. Cerundolo). Has 6-12 career record on grass with five wins at Wimbledon.

Feliciano Lopez | Age: 39 | World No. 64 | Career-High No. 12 | 2021: 5-10 (Aus Open 3R) | Queen's: 25-12 (2017, '19 Titles)
> Ended 19 straight years in Top 100 (2002-20) -- 2nd-longest active streak behind fellow 39-year-old Federer's 22 (1999-2020). Reached a career-high No. 12 on 2 March 2015.
> Won singles and doubles titles at 2019 London/Queen's Club as 37-year-old, becoming oldest player to sweep both titles at same event since Rosewall, 40, at 1975 Jackson.
> Counts victories over No. 1 Nadal (2010 London/Queen's Club) and No. 1 Djokovic (2016 Dubai) among his 38 Top-10 wins -- most among active players never ranked in Top 10.
> Played in record 75th consecutive Grand Slam men's singles main draw at 2021 Australian Open, becoming oldest player at age 39 to reach Grand Slam 3R since Rosewall, 44, at 1978 Australian Open.
> Three-time Wimbledon singles quarter-finalist beat No. 1 seeds and previous 3 champions to win 2016 Roland Garros doubles title w/M. Lopez.

NOTE: Lopez is making his 15th Queen's Club appearance and won titles in 2017 and 2019. Has career record of 82-44 on grass and 497-465 overall in his career. His best finish this season is 3R at Australian Open (l. to No. 8 Rublev).

Ilya Marchenko | Age: 33 | World No. 155 | Career-High No. 49 | 2021: 2-0 (16-8 Challenger) | Queen's: 0-2 (2010-11 1R)
> The Ukrainian has finished 3 seasons in Top 100 (2010, 2015-16). Passed Dolgoplov and became No. 1 Ukrainian on Sept. 12, 2016 after reaching US Open 4R. Achieved career-high No. 49 on Sept. 26, 2016 following Metz 1R win (d. Seppi after saving 2 MPs). Broke into Top 100 on Feb. 8, 2010 after reaching Zagreb QF (l. to J. Melzer).
> Advanced to 3 ATP Tour SFs: 2009 Moscow as Q (l. to Tipsarevic), 2010 St. Petersburg (l. to Kukushkin) and 2016 Doha (d. Ferrer in 1R, l. to Nadal). Also a quarter-finalist 5 other times, most recently at 2016 Acapulco (l. to Tomic).
> Earned career-high 18 tour-level wins in 2010, then followed with 18 combined tour-level wins from 2011-15. Secured 1st Top 10 win by beating Ferrer in 2016 Doha 1R.
> Owns records of 228-160 at Challengers with 8 hard court titles and 54-23 at Futures with two titles.
> Reached 1st Grand Slam 3R and 4R at 2016 US Open (d. Kyrgios, l. to eventual champion Wawrinka in 4 sets). Successfully qualified at 7 Grand Slam events during career, most recently 2017 Wimbledon (l. to Vesely in 1R).

NOTE: Marchenko, who is 16-8 in Challengers this season with one title, is trying to win his first ATP Tour main draw match since 2017 Montpellier (d. No. 111 Rublev, l. to De Schepper). Has 6-13 career record on grass.

[5] Aslan Karatsev (RUS) vs [LL] Alejandro Tabilo (CHI)

First Meeting

Aslan Karatsev | Age: 27 | World No. 24 | Career-High No. 24 | 2021: 22-9 (Dubai Title) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)
> Broke into Top 100 and Top 50 at No. 42 following unprecedented run to 2021 Australian Open SF as Q.
> World No. 114 became 1st player in Open Era to reach SF in Grand Slam main draw debut, 1st qualifier to reach Grand Slam SF since Voltchkov at 2000 Wimbledon, and lowest-ranked Grand Slam semi-finalist since No. 125 Ivanisevic at 2001 Wimbledon.
> Earned 8 victories at 2021 Australian Open, including 3 qualifying wins in Doha more than 4 weeks prior to main draw wins in Melbourne over No. 9 Schwartzman, No. 19 Auger-Aliassime and No. 21 Dimitrov. Lost in all 9 prior attempts to qualify for a Grand Slam main draw, including Australian Open in 2015 and 2016.
> Won his 1st ATP Tour title at 2021 Dubai, becoming the 11th wild card to win an ATP 500 title in series history (since 2009) and reaching career-high No. 24 on 14 June.
> Went 18-2 at Challengers following tour resumption in August 2020, including clay titles at Prague-2 and Ostrava.

NOTE: Karatsev is 22-9 this season with five Top 10 wins (13-3 on hard, 9-6 on clay). Had 3-10 career record coming into 2021. Earned biggest career win over No. 1 Djokovic in Belgrade SF before losing to Berrettini in 3rd set TB in final. Playing his first career tour level match on grass.

Alejandro Tabilo | Age: 24 | World No. 171 | Career-High No. 156 | 2021: 1-2 (8-10 Challenger) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)
> Making pro grass court tournament main draw debut as lucky loser in place of Krajinovic who withdrew (illness).
> In March, qualified on home soil in Santiago and reached 2R (d. Kovalik, l. to eventual champion Garin). Also qualified at ATP Masters 1000 Miami (l. to M. Ymer).
> Has an 8-10 record on ATP Challenger Tour with SF in Concepcion and QF at Antalya-2.
> Lost in final round of qualifying at Roland Garros to #NextGenATP Spaniard Alcaraz.

NOTE: Tabilo is the No. 2 of 15 Chileans (behind No. 19 Garin) in the FedEx ATP Rankings.

Reilly Opelka | Age: 23 | World No. 32 | Career-High No. 31 | 2021: 8-10 (Rome SF) | Queen's: 0-0 (Debut)
> Broke into Top 40 and achieved career-high No. 31 in October 2019 after reaching Basel SF.
> Saved 6 MPs and hit 43 aces vs. Isner, then hit 43 more aces vs. Schnur to win 1st ATP Tour title at 2019 New York.
> Saved 1 MP vs. Raonic and beat Nishioka on same day to win 2nd title at 2020 Delray Beach.
> Owns 6-6 record vs. Top 10 with biggest win of career over defending champion and World No. 6 Medvedev at 2020 St. Petersburg.
> Peaked at No. 4 in juniors following 10-1 run at 2015 Wimbledon, winning boys' singles title and reaching boys' doubles final w/Santillan.

NOTE: Opelka, who is the No. 1 American this week for the first time in his career, last month broke a 6-match losing streak by advancing to his first career ATP Masters 1000 SF in Rome (l. to Nadal). Has 2-3 career record on grass.

John Millman | Age: 32 | World No. 43 | Career-High No. 33 | 2021: 8-12 (Munich QF) | Queen's: 0-1 (2018 1R)
