[6] Tommy Paul (USA) vs Tallon Griekspoor (NED)

First Meeting

Tommy Paul | Age: 24 | World No. 34 | Career-High No. 33 | 2022: 16-11 (Delray Beach SF) | Geneva: 0-0 (2019 Q2)
 > Former World No. 3 junior earned personal-best 25 wins in 2021 and achieved career-high No. 33 in April 2022.
 > Defeated former No. 1 Murray and junior rivals Fritz and Tiafoe en route to 1st ATP Tour final and title at 2021 Stockholm.
 > Upset No. 3 Alexander Zverev in Indian Wells 2R in 2022 for his biggest career victory. Also defeated No. 5 Rublev at 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 4R.
 No. 5 Rublev for biggest win of career and to reach 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 4R.
 > After qualifying in men's singles at 2015 US Open, ended junior career there by reaching boys' singles final (d. de Minaur 6-0 6-0, l. to Fritz).
 > Grew up playing on clay courts in North Carolina, preparing him for run to 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz) and boys' doubles final w/Blumberg.

NOTE: Paul is making his first appearance in Geneva main draw after losing in qualifying in 2019.

Tallon Griekspoor | Age: 25 | World No. 67 | Career-High No. 54 | 2022: 5-9 (Melbourne QF) | Geneva: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Achieved career-high No. 54 in February 2022 after setting single-season record with 8 Challenger titles in 2021.
 > Went 8-0 in finals and 42-7 overall on ATP Challenger Tour in 2021, ending season with 25 straight wins.
 > Opened 2022 season by advancing to 1st ATP Tour QF at Melbourne.
 > Earned Rotterdam 1R wins as WC over No. 13 Wawrinka in 2018, No. 11 Khachanov in 2019 and No. 14 Karatsev in 2022.
 > Twin brothers, Scott and Kevin, are 5.5 years older and peaked at No. 205 and No. 655 respectively in ATP Rankings.

NOTE: Griekspoor is seeking to break his 5-match tour-level losing streak. He is 4-5 versus higher-ranked players on tour-level this season (0-2 on clay).

Kamil Majchrzak | Age: 26 | World No. 80 | Career-High No. 75 | 2022: 9-7 (Pune SF) | Geneva: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Former World No. 7 junior broke into Top 100 in July 2019 and achieved career-high No. 75 in February 2022.
 > In 2019, qualified at Australian Open and Wimbledon before advancing to US Open 3R as LL with 5-set wins over Jarry and Cuevas.
 > Went 3-0 for Team Poland at 2022 ATP Cup and advanced to 1st ATP Tour SF at 2022 Pune.
 > Owns 125-89 Challenger record (3-5 in finals), defeating future Top-20 players Carreno Busta and Cecchinato to reach 1st final at 2015 Mohammedia as Q.
 > Ended junior career as 2014 Youth Olympics gold medallist, also winning 2013 US Open boys' doubles title w/Ma. Redlicki and earning wins over future Top-10 ATP players Berrettini, Hurkacz, Medvedev and Rublev.

NOTE: Holding a 1-14 record vs. Top-50 players, Majchrzak is looking for the biggest win of his career (currently No. 44 Delbonis at 2022 ATP Cup).

Alexander Bublik | Age: 24 | World No. 41 | Career-High No. 30 | 2022: 12-11 (Montpellier Title) | Geneva: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Achieved career-high No. 30 after capturing 1st ATP Tour title in 5th final at 2022 Montpellier.
 > Earned biggest wins of career over A. Zverev as No. 3 in 2022 Montpellier final and as No. 7 in 2021 Rotterdam 1R.
 > Runner-up at 2019 Newport, 2019 Chengdu, 2021 Antalya and 2021 Singapore.
 > Posted personal-best 35 wins in 2021 and advanced to ATP Masters 1000 QFs at Miami and Madrid.
 > In doubles, advanced to 2021 Roland Garros final with countryman Golubev and 2020 Australian Open SF with countryman Kukushkin.

NOTE: After winning his first clay match of the season vs. Wawrinka at ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo 1R, he is now seeking to break his 4-match losing streak (1-4 on clay in 2022).
