[5] Sebastian Baez (ARG) vs Sumit Nagal (IND)

First Meeting

Sebastian Baez | Age: 23 | World No. 19 (Career-High) | 2024: 20-11 (Rio, Santiago Title) | Geneva: 0-0 (Debut)

> Broke inside Top 20 at career-high No. 19 in March 2024 after winning back-to-back ATP Tour titles in Rio de Janeiro and Santiago.

> Earned personal-best 31 wins in 2023 highlighted by 12-match winning streak, winning titles in Kitzbuhel and Winston-Salem and reaching 1st Grand Slam 3R at US Open.

> Captured 1st ATP Tour title at 2022 Estoril, then earned 2nd title on home soil at 2023 Cordoba after entering tournament with 6 straight losses and 17 losses in previous 18 matches.

> Broke into Top 300, 200 and 100 in 2021, posting 6-3 record in Challenger finals to tie 4 other players for 2nd-most titles in a season behind Griekspoor's 8 in 2021.

> Became World No. 1 junior in March 2018 and went on to reach Roland Garros boys' singles final and win boys' doubles gold medal at Youth Olympics w/Diaz Acosta in his hometown of Buenos Aires.

NOTE: Baez leads the tour in clay-court wins (17) and titles (2) this year and is 15-2 against players ranked outside the Top 50 on clay in 2024 (l. to No. 136 Darderi at Cordoba and No. 106 Coria in Buenos Aires).

Sumit Nagal | Age: 26 | World No. 93 | Career-High No. 80 | 2024: 3-5 (3 times in 2R) | Geneva: 0-0 (Debut)

> Earned 1st ranking point at age 16 in 2013, broke into Top 200 in 2019 and Top 100 in February 2024 by winning 5th Challenger title in Chennai, achieving career-high No. 80 in April 2024.

> Made ATP Tour debut on home soil at 2018 Pune as Q and Grand Slam debut at 2019 US Open as Q (l. to 5-time champion Federer in 1R), then reached 1st ATP Tour QF at 2021 Buenos Aires.

> Earned first tour-level wins at 2019 Davis Cup vs. Pakistan, followed by 1st Grand Slam win at 2020 US Open.

> Owns 119-104 Challenger record (5-3 in finals), picking up titles at 2017 Bangalore, 2019 Buenos Aires, 2023 Rome, 2023 Tampere, and 2024 Chennai.

> Peaked at No. 23 in juniors in 2015 and went 88-53 in juniors with wins over future Top 10 players Berrettini, Hurkacz, Shapovalov and Tiafoe, ending junior career by winning 2015 Wimbledon boys' doubles title w/Ly.

NOTE: Nagal is seeking the biggest win of his career (d. No. 22 Garin at 2021 Buenos Aires) and is 0-6 against the Top 20. He aims to post 4 tour-level wins in one season for the first time in his career (had 3 in 2021 and 2023).

Daniel Altmaier (GER) vs Roberto Carballes Baena (ESP)

First Meeting

Daniel Altmaier | Age: 25 | World No. 78 | Career-High No. 47 | 2024: 8-13 (Auckland QF) | Geneva: 0-2 (2017, 2021 1R)

> Made Top 50 debut a day before his 25th birthday in September, achieving career-high No. 47 in October 2023.

> In 2023, reached 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at Madrid as a LL and defeated No. 7 Rublev for biggest win of career en route to 7th ATP Tour QF at 2023 Hamburg.

> Ended 2022 season with 13 wins in his last 14 Challenger matches, including back-to-back titles at Lima-2 and Guayaquil.

> Advanced to 1st ATP Tour SFs of career in back-to-back weeks at Umag and Kitzbuhel in July 2021.

> Made Grand Slam qualifying debut at 2020 Roland Garros and earned 6th win of tournament over No. 8 Berrettini to reach 4R and defeated No. 9 Sinner en route to 2023 Roland Garros 3R.

> Hits a one-handed backhand and says that his idols growing up were fellow one-handers Federer and Wawrinka.

NOTE: Altmaier is seeking his 40th tour-level win (39-72), 25th on clay courts (24-31). He made the Geneva main draw as a qualifier in 2017 (l. to Querrey) and as a lucky loser in 2021 (l. to Lopez).

R. Carballes Baena | Age: 31 | World No. 62 | Career-High No. 49 | 2024: 13-12 (Marrakech Final) | Geneva: 1-1 (2023 2R)

> Former World No. 8 junior entered Top 50 at 30 years of age at career high No. 49 after rallying from a set down three times in five matches to win 2nd ATP Tour title at 2023 Marrakech.

> At 2018 Quito, became 1st Spanish qualifier to win an ATP Tour title since Almagro at 2006 Valencia.

> Defeated No. 11 Shapovalov 8-6 in 5th after 5 hours to reach 2020 Roland Garros 3R for 1st Top 20 win and defeated No. 4 Rune at 2023 US Open for 1st Top 10 win in 14th attempt.

> Defeated Goffin for 1st ATP Tour win en route to 2014 Casablanca SF as Q.

> Boasts 233-151 Challenger record (11-8 in finals), including clay-court titles at 2022 and 2023 Seville.

NOTE: Carballes Baena is 6-2 against Germans on tour-level. He ended 2023 on a 5-match losing streak against one-handed backhand players, but is 3-1 this year (l. to Tsitsipas at Barcelona).
