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ERSTE BANK OPEN TALKING POINTS

- Four former **Erste Bank Open** champions return to **Wiener Stadthalle**, including World No. 2 **Jannik Sinner**, who won the title two years ago. Italian is on a 16-match winning streak on indoor hard courts, including titles in Rotterdam and Nitto ATP Finals last year and is playing in his first indoor event of the season. He attempts to join Alcaraz (8) and Bublik (4) as only men to win more than 3 tour-level titles this season.
- No. 3 seed **Alex de Minaur** leads the ATP Tour in hard-court wins this season (37), as he attempts to record his 300th tour-level win on Monday (299-174), when he takes on wildcard **Jurij Rodionov**. Rodionov won their only previous match by saving 1 MP at 2021 Stuttgart. Australian No. 1 is 16-6 at ATP 500 level this season, highlighted by saving 3 championship points to win Washington title.

- 2022 champion **Daniil Medvedev** ended his 882-day title drought in Almaty on Sunday to win his 21st title at as many different locations and this week attempts to continue his winning streak and win a title at one event multiple time for first time in his career. No. 2 seed **Alexander Zverev** is making his fifth appearance in Vienna and has never lost prior to quarter-final stage at this event, highlighted by capturing 2021 title.
- With five **Nitto ATP Finals** spots still open, players will look for deep run in Vienna to get closer to securing their ticket for Turin. Zverev is No. 4 in PIF ATP Live Race to Turin and bids to qualify for 8th time in last 9 years. Last year's semi-finalists No. 7 de Minaur and No. 8 Musetti also attempt to increase their lead in the qualification spots, as de Minaur looks for his 2nd straight appearance in Turin, while Musetti seeks his debut.

Luciano Darderi | Age: 23 | World No. 26 (Career-High) | 2025: 29-23 (3 Titles) | Vienna: 1-1 (2024 2R)

> Former Top 10 junior started 2024 season as No. 128, then broke into Top 100 in February, Top 50 in May and achieved career-high No. 26 in September 2025 after runs to 3R of Wimbledon and US Open.

> Captured his 1st ATP Tour title in Cordoba, defeating Bagnis in 3rd final between two qualifiers since the ATP Tour was established in 1990.

> In 2025, won Bastad and Umag titles in back-to-back weeks in July after lifting Marrakech title in April.

> Owns 95-61 Challenger record (4-3 in finals) with titles at 2023 Todi, 2023 Lima-2, 2024 Perugia and 2025 Genoa.

> Peaked at No. 8 in junior rankings in February 2020 after earning 3 singles and 3 doubles titles to start the season.

> Born in Argentina, started playing tennis at age 4 with his father Luciano Enrique, a former tennis player and current coach.

NOTE: Darderi bids to record 30 wins in a season for first time in career to become third Italian man this season to achieve the feat after Sinner (43) and Musetti (38). He looks for his third Top 100 win on hard courts (2-21) after wins over No. 21 Tabilo at 2024 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati and No. 40 Martinez at 2025 ATP Masters 1000 Miami.

Brandon Nakashima | Age: 24 | World No. 35 | Career-High No. 29 | 2025: 31-26 (3 SFs) | Vienna: 1-1 (2024 2R)

> Former World No. 3 junior broke into Top 50 in July 2022 and achieved career-high No. 29 in May 2025 soon after earning 100th career win en route to biggest SF of his career in Acapulco.

> Defeated countryman Giron to win 1st ATP Tour title in hometown of San Diego in 2022 and ended season on 16-1 run in tiebreaks.

> Played in back-to-back ATP Tour finals at Los Cabos and Atlanta as 19-year-old in 2021, becoming youngest American to reach multiple finals since Roddick in 2001-02.

> Returned to Milan and went 5-0 to capture 2022 Next Gen ATP Finals title after reaching SF in 2021.

> Reached Roland Garros 3R, Wimbledon 4R and US Open 3R in 2022, highlighted by first Top 20 wins of career over No. 16 Shapovalov in Wimbledon 2R and No. 19 Dimitrov in US Open 2R.

NOTE: Nakashima is 10-1 in his opening rounds since June, lone loss to Majchrzak in ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai earlier this month. American No. 5 is 1-13 vs. Top 30 players in 2025, lone win over No. 13 Rune via RET in Acapulco 2R in February (3-0 RET) and seeks 1st Top 30 win in a completed match since d. No. 12 Paul in Vienna 1R last year.

Alejandro Tabilo | Age: 28 | World No. 73 | Career-High No. 19 | 2025: 11-15 (Chengdu Title) | Vienna: 0-0 ('22 Q1)
 > Toronto-born Chilean broke into Top 100 in February 2022, achieving career-high No. 19 in July 2024 after defeating No. 1 Djokovic for biggest win of career en route to 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF in Rome.
 > Won 1st ATP Tour title at 2024 Auckland as Q, becoming 1st Chilean to win a title on hard courts since Gonzalez in 2007 and became 1st Chilean to win a grass court title in Open Era at 2024 Mallorca.
 > On home soil, defeated countrymen Garin en route to 2nd ATP Tour SF at 2022 Santiago as WC and Barrios Vera en route to 2nd ATP Tour final at 2024 Santiago.
 > Earned 5-set wins over fellow South American Galan in Grand Slam main draw debut at 2020 Australian Open and over Italian Cobolli to reach 3R of 2024 Wimbledon.
 > Represented Canada throughout junior career, peaking at No. 29 in junior rankings during 2015 season.

NOTE: Tabilo is 5-22 vs. Top 20 in his career, including wins this year over No. 5 Djokovic in ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo 2R and No. 9 Musetti to win Chengdu title (saved 2 MPs). He bids to be first Chilean match winner in Vienna since Garin in 2020 (d. Wawrinka) to score his first ATP Tour win on indoor hard courts this season.

Alexander Bublik | Age: 28 | World No. 16 (Career-High) | 2025: 31-19 (4 Titles) | Vienna: 0-1 (2019 1R)
 > Achieved career-high No. 16 in October 2025 after winning 4 ATP Tour titles during the season, joining Alcaraz and Djokovic as only men to win titles on clay, grass and hard in a season in this decade.
 > In Halle, earned five Top 25 wins in as many matches to capture 2023 title and recorded biggest win of career over No. 1 Sinner en route to 2025 title.
 > Defeated No. 3 A. Zverev in 2022 Montpellier final for 1st ATP Tour title in 5th final and became 1st ATP Tour champion (since 1990) to come back from a set down in every match en route to his 4th title at 2024 Montpellier.
 > Upset No. 9 de Minaur by rallying from 2 sets down and No. 6 Draper en route to 2025 Roland Garros QF, becoming 1st Grand Slam men's quarter-finalist representing Kazakhstan.
 > In doubles, advanced to 2021 Roland Garros final with countryman Golubev and 2020 Australian Open SF with countryman Kukushkin.

NOTE: Bublik is making his second Vienna appearance after his debut in 2019 as a lucky loser (l. to Rublev in 1R). He is on a 24-6 run since Roland Garros, including titles in Halle, Gstaad, Kitzbuhel and Hangzhou, but lost two most recent matches to No. 60 Mannarino in Beijing 1R and No. 204 Vacherot in ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai 2R.

Alex de Minaur | Age: 26 | World No. 7 | Career-High No. 6 | 2025: 50-19 (Washington Title) | Vienna: 4-2 (2024 SF)
 > Two-time Next Gen ATP Finals runner-up achieved career-high No. 6 in July 2024 before becoming 1st Australian to qualify for Nitto ATP Finals in singles since Hewitt in 2004.
 > Earned personal-best 50 victories in 2025 and captured 10 ATP Tour titles, including ATP 500 championships at 2023 and 2024 Acapulco and 2025 Washington, where he saved 3 championship points vs. Davidovich Fokina.
 > Reached 1st Grand Slam QF at 2020 US Open immediately after winning 1st ATP Tour doubles title at 2020 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati w/Carreno Busta in team debut and at same venue.
 > Six-time Grand Slam quarter-finalist, including at four consecutive events from 2024 Roland Garros to 2025 Australian Open and advanced to 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF, SF and final at 2023 Toronto.
 > Playing for Australia, he went 6-1 in Davis Cup play during the 2022 season, leading Australia to its 1st final since 2003 and defeated No. 2 Nadal in 2023 and No. 1 Djokovic in 2024 at United Cup.
 > Son to a Uruguayan father and Spanish mother, splits time between Australia and Spain, and speaks English, Spanish and French.

NOTE: de Minaur aims to record 300th tour-level win of career (299-174) to become second man born in 1999 or later to achieve the milestone after Sinner (306). He leads the ATP Tour in hard court wins this season (37) and in ATP 500 wins since the start of 2023 season (45), highlighted by titles at 2023 and 2024 Acapulco and 2025 Washington.

 > Earned 1st ranking point at age 16 in November 2015, broke into Top 200 in January 2019, into Top 100 in August 2023 and achieved career-high No. 87 in February 2024 after winning 7th Challenger title in Koblenz.
 > Advanced to 1st ATP Tour QF and SF at 2021 Stuttgart as WC and reached 2nd QF at 2023 Astana.
 > Qualified, saved 1 MP and rallied from 2 sets down vs. Chardy at 2020 Roland Garros to earn 1st tour-level win of career.
 > Owns 8-5 record in Challenger finals, including titles at 2022 and 2023 Biel and most recent title at 2025 Bonn.
 > Peaked at No. 7 in juniors, highlighted by run to 2017 Wimbledon boys' singles QF and boys' doubles final w/Vrbensky.

NOTE: Rodionov is 1-3 vs. Top 20 (0-1 vs. Top 10), seeking biggest win of career, five years after defeating No. 12 Shapovalov in 2020 1R at this event. He looks for first tour-level win outside Davis Cup since defeating Vukic in Munich 1R last year to become 1st Austrian to defeat a Top 10 player since Thiem defeated No. 1 Djokovic in 2020 Nitto ATP Finals SF.

 > Upset Top-10 players Isner, A. Zverev, Thiem and Djokovic en route to 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Paris title, but went on a 23-match losing streak to Top 10 players (August 2019-March 2023), ended by beating No. 3 Tsitsipas en route to 4th ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2023 Miami.
 > At 2018 Paris, became 1st unseeded ATP Masters 1000 champion since Nalbandian at 2007 Paris.
 > Defeated No. 3 Zverev at 2025 Toronto, saving 1 MP, to reach his 2nd ATP Masters 1000 final and record biggest gap between finals in series history (since 1990).
 > Advanced to QFs of all 4 Grand Slam events, highlighted by runs to 2022 US Open SF and 2023 Aus. Open SF.
 > Entered 2020 Tokyo Olympics as No. 4 men's player on Team ROC and went on to earn silver medal (held in 2021).

NOTE: Khachanov aims to break a 4-match losing streak since defeating Basavareddy in US Open 1R (held 5 MPs vs. Majchrzak in 2R). Last year, he led the ATP Tour in indoor wins (14), including Vienna final (l. to Draper), but is 0-2 indoors this year with opening round losses in Marseille to Medjedovic and Almaty to Struff.

 > Earned personal-best 36 wins in 2023, won 1st ATP Tour title in Pune and achieved career-high No. 21 in November.

> Went 17-3 on home soil in 2023-24, highlighted by 2nd title at 2023 's-Hertogenbosch and rallying from a set down to defeat No. 8 Hurkacz en route to 2024 Rotterdam SF.

> Rallied from a set down for Rotterdam wins as WC over No. 13 Wawrinka in 2018, No. 11 Khachanov in 2019, No. 14 Karatsev in 2022, No. 17 A. Zverev in 2023 and for 's-Hertogenbosch win over No. 18 de Minaur in 2023 – earning first 5 of 16 career Top-20 wins on home soil.
> Upset No. 2 Zverev in 2025 Indian Wells 2R to become 1st Dutch ATP Masters 1000 quarter-finalist since 2018.
> Went 8-0 in finals and 42-7 overall on ATP Challenger Tour in 2021, setting single-season record for most titles and ending season with 25 straight wins.

NOTE: Griekspoor is 16-44 vs. Top 20, 4-9 in 2025, including win over No. 2 Sinner via RET in Shanghai 3R earlier this month. He bids to be the first Dutch match winner at the event since Haase in 2014 (d. Thiem in 1R).
