## NATIONAL BANK OPEN PRESENTED BY ROGERS TALKING POINTS

- The ATP Tour returns to Montreal for **National Bank Open Presented by Rogers**, including 4 former champions in the draw, defending champion and No. 1 seed **Jannik Sinner**, 2017 champion and No. 2 seed **Alexander Zverev**, 2021 champion and No. 3 seed **Daniil Medvedev** and **Pablo Carreno Busta**, who defeated **Hubert Hurkacz** to capture his 1st ATP Masters 1000 title on **IGA Stadium** in 2022.
- World No. 1 **Sinner** plays in his first event since reaching the quarter-finals at Wimbledon as the 22-year-old Italian looks to join **Andy Murray** (2009-10), **Novak Djokovic** (2011-12) and **Rafael Nadal** (2018-19) as the only players to successfully defend ATP Masters 1000 Canada title this century. He leads the ATP Tour with 4 titles and most hard court wins this year, as he owns a 22-1 record on the surface in 2024.
- No. 2 seed **Alexander Zverev** leads the ATP Tour in wins this year, earning 47 wins, highlighted by capturing Rome title at the most recent ATP Masters 1000 event. He defeated No. 3 **Roger Federer** in 2017 to win the title as a then-20-year-old and will look to do the Rome-Montreal double for the second time in his career.
- No. 3 seed **Daniil Medvedev** earned all 20 tour-level titles of his career at 20 different events and the 28-year-old aims to capture his 2nd **National Bank Open Presented by Rogers** title after defeating **Reilly Opelka** in 2021 final, played in Toronto. No. 4 seed **Hubert Hurkacz** will bid to win his 3rd ATP Masters 1000 title after 2021 Miami and 2023 Shanghai after losing in 2022 Montreal final to **Carreno Busta** in three sets.
- After earning Canada the bronze medal at Paris Olympics in mixed doubles with **Gabriela Dabrowski** last week, No. 13 **Felix Auger-Aliassime** leads 5 Canadians in the 2024 field. Auger-Aliassime reached his best result at the event in Montreal 2 years ago, reaching the quarter-finals and will attempt to become the first Canadian champion at the event in Open Era (last Canadian champion **Robert Bedard** in 1958).
- The Canadian No. 1 is joined by former-Top 10 players **Denis Shapovalov** and **Milos Raonic**. Former-World No. 10 Shapovalov remains the youngest ATP Masters 1000 semi-finalist in series history (since 1990) after reaching 2017 Montreal SF as an 18-year-old in his 2nd ATP Tour event of career. Former-World No. 3 Raonic reached 2013 Montreal final and opens his week vs. No. 13 seed **Holger Rune** on Day 1.

**Alex Michelsen** | Age: 19 | World No. 55 (Career-High) | 2024: 18-20 (Newport Final) | Event: 0-0 (Debut)

> Youngest American in Top 200 of the PIF ATP Rankings earned career-high No. 55 in July 2024 before reaching his 2nd ATP Tour final in Newport (held 1 MP vs. Giron in final).

> Became the youngest American man in Grand Slam 3R since Young at 2007 US Open, reaching 3R at Australian Open.

> Earned 1st ATP Tour win and reached 1st QF, SF and final at 2023 Newport, becoming the youngest American ATP Tour finalist since Fritz at 2016 Memphis.

> Defeated No. 9 de Minaur for the biggest win of career in 2024 Los Cabos 2R, before squandering 3 MPs in QF against eventual champion Thompson.

> Owns a 35-18 Challenger record (2-2 in finals), winning titles at 2023 Chicago and Knoxville.

> Reached career-high No. 25 in ITF Juniors, highlighted by 2022 Wimbledon boys' doubles title w/Gorzny.

> Started playing at the age of 3, hitting with his mother, former college player, every day until 15 years of age.

**NOTE:** Michelsen enters the event after reaching 6th and biggest ATP Tour QF of career in Washington last week (l. to Cobolli). He aims to be the youngest American man to record a match win at the event since Donaldson reached 3R in 2016.

**Kei Nishikori** | Age: 34 | World No. 576 | Career-High No. 4 | 2024: 1-4 (Roland Garros 2R) | Event: 10-7 (2016 Final)

> Top Asian men's player in history, achieving career-high No. 4 in 2015.

> Earned biggest of 434 career wins over No. 1 Djokovic at 2014 US Open to become 1st Asian Grand Slam men's singles finalist.

> Captured 1st of 12 ATP Tour titles at 2008 Delray Beach as 18-year-old Q ranked 244th and remains youngest champion on tour since Hewitt, 16, at 1998 Adelaide.

> Six-time ATP 500 champion, four-time ATP Masters 1000 finalist, four-time Nitto ATP Finals qualifier and 2016 Rio Olympics bronze medallist.

> Owns highest winning percentage among active players in deciding sets (148-57, .722).

**NOTE:** Nishikori is looking to record his first ATP Masters 1000 match win since 2021 Indian Wells (d. J. Sousa in 1R). He owns 107-66 ATP Masters career record, highlighted by 4 finals including 2013 Toronto.

In their previous meeting in the 1st round of ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo earlier this year, a similar pattern on the Insight Scores was observed. However, Etcheverry was able to come through victorious in that match by equalling Jarry's serve quality of 8.5 and maintain his lead on the return.

> Former World No. 12 junior broke into Top 200 in June 2021 and Top 100 in April 2022, achieving career-high No. 27 in February 2024 after earning personal-best 30 wins in 2023.  
> At 2023 Roland Garros, earned 1st two Top 20 wins of career over No. 19 de Minaur in 2R and No. 16 Coric in 3R and reached the quarter-finals without losing a set.  
> Defeated clay-court champions Fognini, F. Cerundolo, Lajovic and Baez en route to 1st ATP Tour final at Santiago a month before reaching 2nd ATP Tour final at 2023 Houston.  
> Qualified at 2022 Australian Open and earned 1st Grand Slam main draw win at 2023 Australian Open (d. Barrere).  
> Posted Challenger records of 49-19 in 2021 and 41-16 in 2022, highlighted by clay-court titles at 2021 Perugia, 2021 Trieste and 2022 Concepcion-2.

> Joined countryman Garin as fellow 2019 first-time ATP Tour champion by winning 1st title in Bastad without losing a set.  
> Saved 1 MP vs. No. 3 A. Zverev in 2019 Barcelona 2R for 1st Top 3 win of career, but squandered 2 MPs vs. A. Zverev in Geneva final one month later.  
> Peaked at No. 8 in junior rankings after advancing to 2013 Roland Garros boys' doubles final with countryman Garin.  
> Parents, Allan and Cecilia, are former pro volleyball players; grandfather, Jaime Fillol, great-uncle, Alvaro Fillol, and uncle, Martin Rodriguez, are former ATP players.

> Captured 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Paris title at age 19 by becoming 1st player since start of ATP Tour in 1990 to earn 5 Top-10 wins at an event other than Nitto ATP Finals.  
> From 2022 Paris to 2023 Rome, compiled an 18-5 record in 6 ATP Masters 1000 events, posting runner-up results in Monte Carlo (l. to Rublev) and Rome (l. to Medvedev).  
> Went on a 7-match winning streak vs. Top 5 opponents, ending the streak with loss to No. 3 Medvedev at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Rome final (7-11 vs. Top 5).  
> Ended 2022 season on 19-2 run (2-2 in finals) after going 1-6 from January-February and 0-7 from June-July.  
> Upset 2021 finalist Tsitsipas at 2022 Roland Garros to become 1st Danish man to reach QF in tournament history (since 1925) and to reach any Grand Slam QF in Open Era (since 1968).

> Went 4-1 at 2022 ATP Cup and 6-0 at 2020 ATP Cup to lead Spain to finals after helping his country win 2019 Davis Cup.  
> Played football for Villarreal C.F. until he was 14 years old.

- > Joined Fritz in Top 10 amid 2023 season to mark the 1st time since 2012 two Americans were ranked in Top 10.
- > Defeated 4-time champion Nadal en route to 2022 US Open SF, becoming that event's 1st American men's semi-finalist since Roddick in 2006.
- > Led Team World to 2022 Laver Cup title, teaming w/Sock to defeat Federer/Nadal in Swiss' final match before clinching cup with win over Tsitsipas.
- > Won 1st ATP Tour title as 20-year-old at 2018 Delray Beach and remains youngest American champion since Roddick, 19, at 2002 Houston and 2nd ATP Tour title at 2023 Houston.
- > Parents emigrated from Sierra Leone in 1996 and father was Head of Maintenance at Junior Tennis Champions Center in Maryland, where Frances and his twin brother Franklin trained as kids.

**NOTE:** Tiafoe is 1-4 in ATP Masters 1000 events this season, capturing lone win over No. 56 Lajovic in Indian Wells 2R. The American No. 5 is 1-7 vs. left-handers in 2024, after going 19-0 against them from August 2021-August 2023.

**Alejandro Tabilo** | Age: 27 | World No. 21 | Career High No. 19 | 2024: 26-15 (2 Titles) | Event: 0-0 (Debut)

- > Toronto-born Chilean broke into Top 100 in February 2022, achieving career-high No. 25 after defeating No. 1 Djokovic for biggest win of career en route to 1st ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2024 Rome.
- > Captured 1st ATP Tour title at 2024 Auckland as Q, becoming the 1st Chilean to win a title on hard courts since Gonzalez in 2007.
- > Earned 6 straight-set wins – including 5 over Argentines – en route to 1st ATP Tour final at 2022 Cordoba as Q.
- > Defeated countryman Garin en route to 2nd ATP Tour SF at 2022 Santiago as WC, then reached 2024 Santiago final.
- > Qualified at Australian Open in 2020 and 2022, earning 5-set win over fellow South American Galan in Grand Slam main draw debut.
- > Represented Canada throughout junior career, peaking at No. 29 in junior rankings during 2015 season.

**NOTE:** Tabilo is seeded at an ATP Masters 1000 event for the second time in his career, reaching his 1st SF at this level in Rome in May as No. 29 seed. The Chilean No. 1 aims to record 1st Top 30 win on hard courts (0-6).

- > Earned personal-best 30 wins and achieved career-high No. 21 in 2021, sweeping Cagliari titles to become 1st Italian champion on home soil in singles since 2006 and in doubles since 2005 (w/Vavassori).
- > Broke into Top 50 after saving championship point vs. Kecmanovic to win 1st ATP Tour title at 2019 Antalya.
- > Did not drop a set en route to 3rd singles title of career at 2022 Metz, including wins over former champions Simon and Hurkacz.
- > Upset No. 1 Djokovic 6-2 6-1 en route to 2020 Vienna final, becoming 1st lucky loser to defeat Djokovic and equalling fewest games ever conceded to Djokovic in a match.
- > Saved 1 MP vs. Thiem en route to 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Rome SF, becoming 1st Italian semi-finalist at Foro Italico since 2007 and 2nd since 1978.

- > Won 2nd title at 2023 's-Hertogenbosch on home soil before coming from a set down to earn biggest win of career over No. 8 Hurkacz en route to 2024 Rotterdam SF.
- > Rallyed from a set down for Rotterdam wins as WC over No. 13 Wawrinka in 2018, No. 11 Khachanov in 2019, No. 14 Karatsev in 2022, No. 17 A. Zverev in 2023 and for 's-Hertogenbosch win over No. 18 de Minaur in 2023 – earning first 5 of 11 career Top-20 wins on home soil.
- > Went 8-0 in finals and 42-7 overall on ATP Challenger Tour in 2021, setting single-season record for most titles and ending season with 25 straight wins.

**NOTE:** Griekspoor is 12-4 in his opening rounds this season, including 5-0 on hard courts, playing in his first tournament on the surface since reaching ATP Masters 1000 Miami 3R in March (l. to Sinner).

> Made his tour-level debut at 2022 Davis Cup Finals vs. Serbia (l. to Djere) and earned 1st ATP Tour win by defeating No. 21 Evans at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Toronto 1R in front of home crowd.  
> Defeated No. 18 Musetti for biggest win of career at 2023 Davis Cup Finals RR to help Canada qualify for the finals stage, then qualified for first Grand Slam main draw at 2024 Roland Garros.  
> Owns a 55-33 Challenger record (3-1 in finals), winning 1st title at 2022 Granby as No. 519-ranked WC.  
> Played for the University of Kentucky, making the quarter-final round at 2022 NCAA Singles Championships before turning pro at the end of 2022.

**NOTE:** Diallo earned both tour-level wins this season in Davis Cup play vs. South Korea in February. He earned lone win in ATP Tour events in Toronto last year, defeating No. 21 Evans in 1R (l. to eventual finalist de Minaur in 2R).

**Karen Khachanov** | Age: 28 | World No. 22 | Career-High No. 8 | 2024: 21-14 (Doha Title) | Event: 10-5 (2018-19 SF)  
> Broke into Top 10 and achieved career-high No. 8 in July 2019 after ending 2018 season at No. 11.  
> Upset Top-10 players Isner, A. Zverev, Thiem and Djokovic en route to 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Paris title, but went on a 23-match losing streak to Top 10 players (August 2019-March 2023), before beating No. 3 Tsitsipas en route to 4th ATP Masters 1000 SF at 2023 Miami, first since 2019 Montreal.  
> At 2018 Paris, became 1st unseeded ATP Masters 1000 champion since Nalbandian at 2007 Paris.  
> Advanced to QFs of all 4 Grand Slam events, highlighted by runs to 2022 US Open SF and 2023 Australian Open SF.  
> Entered 2020 Tokyo Olympics as No. 4 men's player on Team ROC and went on to earn silver medal (held in 2021).

**NOTE:** After going 15-1 vs. players ranked outside Top 100 from start of 2022 to February this year, Khachanov aims to avoid his fourth consecutive loss vs. player ranked 101+ with losses to No. 145 Kovalik at Roland Garros 2R, No. 220 Halys at Wimbledon 2R and No. 175 Hong in Washington 2R last week. He earned 2 of 4 career ATP Masters 1000 SFs in Canada (2018 Toronto, 2019 Montreal).

> In ATP Tour debut, qualified and defeated No. 2 Alcaraz for biggest win of career en route to 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Rome 4R, then reached QF at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai (d. No. 5 Ruud in 4R).  
> Upset No. 7 Rune in 2R and No. 10 de Minaur in 4R en route to 2024 ATP Masters 1000 Miami QF.  
> Earned 1st Grand Slam main draw win at 2023 US Open (d. Gasquet) and reached 3R at 2024 Australian Open.  
> Owns 55-30 record on Challenger tour (3-1 in finals), winning titles at 2022 Banja Luka, 2023 Antalya and 2023 Perugia and losing to compatriot Fucsovics in 2022 Bratislava-2 final.  
> Began playing tennis at age 5 and credits his father for teaching him everything about the sport.

**NOTE:** Marozsan owns 15-6 ATP Masters 1000 record in his career (8-4 in 2024), reaching at least round of 16 at first 4 of 6 events played, highlighted by runs to quarter-finals at 2023 Shanghai and 2024 Miami.

**Pablo Carreno Busta** | Age: 33 | World No. 799 | Career-High No. 10 | 2024: 0-2 | Event: 8-2 (2022 Title)  
> Winner of 7 singles and 4 doubles titles achieved career-high No. 10 in singles and No. 16 in doubles during 2017 season.  
> Captured 2022 Montreal championship to become 15th different Spaniard to win an ATP Masters 1000 title since start of series in 1990.  
> Defeated No. 1 Djokovic and No. 2 Medvedev en route to 2020 Tokyo Olympics bronze medal (held in 2021).  
> Reached US Open SF and Roland Garros QF in both 2017 and 2020, as well as 2016 US Open doubles final with countryman Garcia-Lopez.  
> Member of 2019 Davis Cup championship team and helped Team Spain reach ATP Cup finals in 2020 (5-1 in doubles) and 2022 (4-1 in singles).
