BNP PARIBAS OPEN TALKING POINTS

- First ATP Masters 1000 event of the season gets underway in Indian Wells with two-time defending champion
 Carlos Alcaraz returning in search of a three-peat, while record five-time champion Novak Djokovic (tied
 w/Federer) looks to become third man in Open Era to capture 100 tour-level titles in Open Era behind Jimmy
 Connors, 109 and Roger Federer, 103, as the Serbian No. 1 searches for his first Indian Wells title since 2016.
- World No. 3 Alcaraz is on a 12-match winning streak at this event as 21-year-old Spaniard attempts to join Agassi, Djokovic, Federer and Nadal as only players to three-peat at any ATP Masters 1000 event in series history (since 1990) and third in Indian Wells after Federer (2004-06) and Djokovic (2014-16). He enters on 11-2 record this season and bids to capture his second title of 2025 after winning Rotterdam in February.
- No. 6 seed **Djokovic** is playing in his 16th **BNP Paribas Open**, nineteen years after making his debut in 2006. When he takes to court for his 2R match against Kyrgios or van de Zandschulp, 37-year-old Serbian will tie Rafael Nadal for most ATP Masters 1000 matches played (500) and with a win, he would also tie Nadal for most wins at this level (Nadal 410-90). Djokovic, who is 409-90 in ATP Masters 1000 events, already owns records for most titles (40), finals (59) and semi-finals (78) in series history (since 1990).
- World No. 2 Alexander Zverev is the No. 1 seed at an ATP Masters 1000 event for 1st time in career, marking first time a German player is the No. 1 seed at this level since Indian Wells tournament director Tommy Haas at 2002 Madrid. 27-year-old will attempt to improve his best result at Indian Wells Tennis Garden (2021, 2024 QF) to join Djokovic as only active players to reach semi-finals of all 9 active ATP Masters 1000 events.
- Two-time finalist **Daniil Medvedev** reached his 38th and latest tour-level final in Indian Wells last year, losing to Alcaraz in the championship match for 2nd consecutive year. World No. 6 will once again attempt to lift the title this year to complete the set of ATP Masters 1000 titles at all active hard court events at this level and grab his first ATP Tour championship since winning his 1st clay title at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Rome.
- World No. 4 Taylor Fritz leads 17 American men in main draw, as 27-year-old aims to become 1st American to win ATP Masters 1000 title since he defeated Nadal in 2022 final to become 1st American men's champion at this event since Agassi in 2001. Joining him are last year's semi-finalist World No. 11 Tommy Paul, 22-year-old No. 12 Ben Shelton and 2023 semi-finalist Frances Tiafoe, all hunting 1st ATP Masters 1000 title.
- For first time in BNP Paribas Open history, players will be able to request a video replay review of specific
 judgement decisions as explained in the following document.

Buyunchaokete (CHN) vs [WC] Nishesh Basavareddy (USA) First Meeting

Buyunchaokete | Age: 23 | World No. 71 | Career-High No. 65 | 2025: 3-8 (Montpellier QF) | Indian Wells: 0-0 (Debut) > Former World No. 5 junior earned 1st ranking point in January 2022, broke into Top 100 in September 2023 and achieved career-high No. 65 in December 2024.

- > Reached back-to-back ATP Tour SFs on home soil, losing to Zhang in first all-Chinese ATP Tour SF in Hangzhou and defeating No. 6 Rublev for biggest win of career to reach Beijing SF (I. to No. 1 Sinner).
- > Made tour-level debut at 2022 Davis Cup (I. to M. Cuevas) and ATP Tour debut at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai as WC, earning first career win over No. 45 Kecmanovic in 1R via RET.
- > Owns 61-36 Challenger record (3-2 in finals) with titles at 2023 Seoul, 2024 Wuxi and 2024 Granby.
- > He notes Andy Murray as his tennis idol and played against him at 2023 Surbiton CH, losing in straight sets.
- > Earned win over future-Top 10 player Rune en route to 2019 Australian Open boys' singles 3R and reached quarterfinals in boys' doubles at 2019 Roland Garros w/Khan and 2020 Australian Open w/Mitsui.

NOTE: Bu is playing in his first ATP Masters 1000 event outside Shanghai (2023 2R, 2024 1R), aiming to become 4th Chinese man to win a main draw match in Indian Wells after Wu in 2023 and Shang and Zhang last year. 23-year-old is 0-5 vs. Americans on ATP Tour.

Nishesh Basavareddy | Age: 19 | World No. 101 (Career-High) | 2025: 3-4 (Auckland SF) | Indian Wells: 0-0 (Debut) > Peaked at No. 3 in junior rankings in January 2023, then broke Top 200 in September 2024, opting to leave college and turn professional in December 2024 and achieved career-high No. 101 in March 2025.

- > Reached 1st ATP Tour SF at 2025 Auckland as Q, upsetting defending champion No. 23 Tabilo for biggest win of career in 2R and countryman Michelsen in QF.
- > Made tour-level debut at 2024 Next Gen ATP Finals, going 1-2 in round robin, defeating No. 50 Shang for 1st win and Grand Slam main draw debut at 2025 Australian Open, losing to 10-time champion Djokovic in 1R.
- > Owns 50-20 Challenger record (2-5 in finals), capturing titles at 2024 Tiburon and Puerto Vallarta .
- > Spent two seasons playing college tennis for Stanford University, where he was a two-time ITA All-American.
- > Won 2022 US Open boys' doubles title w/Baris, becoming fifth all-American team to win the US Open boys' doubles title this century.

NOTE: Basavareddy is making his ATP Masters 1000 debut this week, looking to join Fritz, Tiafoe and Michelsen as only American teenagers to record a main draw win in Indian Wells in last 12 editions of the event (since 2013). 19-year-old earned all 3 ATP Tour wins this year en route to 1st ATP Tour SF in Auckland.

Opelka's 9.1 serve quality average is number 2 on Tour, with only Mpetshi Perricard ahead of him. In Attack will be significant in this one, Opelka will want to serve well and dominate In Attack, while Safiullin will hope to keep the In Attack score close and force Opelka into more neutral play.

Roman Safiullin | Age: 27 | World No. 69 | Career-High No. 36 | 2025: 0-5 (5x 1R) | Indian Wells: 1-2 (2024 2R)

- > Former World No. 2 junior broke into Top 100 in August 2022 and achieved career-high No. 36 in January 2024.
- > Posted personal-best 20 wins in 2023, highlighted by 1st ATP Tour final at Chengdu and win over No. 2 Alcaraz at ATP Masters 1000 Paris to reach 3R as Q.
- > As World No. 92 in Wimbledon main draw debut, became lowest-ranked quarter-finalist since Kyrgios in 2014.
- > Defeated 2-time champion and World No. 4 Tsitsipas to reach 1st ATP Tour SF at 2022 Marseille, and advanced to 2nd SF on indoor hard courts at 2022 Tel Aviv.
- > Went 105-21 with 11 titles on ITF Junior Circuit, posting wins over Medvedev, Rublev and Khachanov before ending junior career as 2015 Australian Open champion.

NOTE: Safiullin looks for his first ATP Tour win since defeating Fognini in Belgrade 1R in November (0-6 since). In his last ATP Masters 1000 event, earned wins over No. 27 Bublik and No. 17 Tiafoe to reach Shanghai 4R and equal his best result at this level (also R16 at 2023 Paris).

- > Defeated Isner for 4th ATP 250 title on American soil at 2022 Houston after beating him 7-6(7) 7-6(22) en route to 2022 Dallas title, winning longest tiebreak in ATP Tour history (since 1990).
- > At 2020 Delray Beach, saved 1 MP vs. Raonic and defeated Nishioka on same day to win 2nd title.
- > At 2019 New York, saved 6 MPs and hit 43 aces vs. Isner in SF, then hit 43 more aces vs. Schnur in final to win 1st title.
- > Upset No. 3 Tsitsipas at 2021 Toronto for biggest win of career and to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 final and defeated No. 7 Djokovic en route to 2025 Brisbane final to break Serbian's 34-match winning streak vs. Americans.

NOTE: Bublik is making his fourth consecutive main draw appearance in Indian Wells, highlighted by win over former finalist Murray in 2022 2R, and looks for first outdoor win of 2025. He fell 31 spots to No. 82 on Monday after losing in Dubai 1R as 2024 finalist, his lowest ranking since July 2019. He is 2-0 after winning 1st set in 2025 (0-7 after losing).

Yosuke Watanuki | Age: 26 | World No. 349 | Career-High No. 72 | 2025: 0-0 (1 CH QF) | Indian Wells: 0-0 (2023 Q1) > Broke into Top 200 in November 2018 and Top 100 in July 2023, achieving career-high No. 72 in October 2023 soon after defeating No. 12 Auger-Aliassime for biggest win of career at 2023 Washington.

- > Qualified for 2023 Australian Open in 8th Grand Slam qualifying attempt, defeating Rinderknech for 1st Grand Slam win after ending 2022 on 10-match winning streak on Challenger tour with titles at 2022 Kobe and 2022 Yokkaichi.
- > Posted 1st ATP Tour win at 2018 Tokyo as Q (d. Haase) after making an ATP Tour debut at 2018 Washington as Q and squandering 1 MP vs. Medvedev and reached his 1st ATP Tour QF at 2022 Lyon as LL.

Nishikori and Munar exhibit notable differences in shot distribution and speed. Nishikori averages 17% of his shots through the middle of the court, while Munar hits 24%. On speed, Nishikori also leads, with an average forehand speed of 76 mph and backhand speed of 70 mph, compared to Munar's 72 mph forehand and 67 mph backhand. These factors contribute to Nishikori's 5% advantage in attack. However, both players show similar shot quality, due to Munar demonstrating greater consistency: he lands 87% of his forehands and backhands, while Nishikori hits 81% of forehands and 84% of backhands.

- > Earned biggest of 447 career wins over No. 1 Djokovic at 2014 US Open to become 1st Asian Grand Slam men's singles finalist.
- > Captured 1st of 12 ATP Tour titles at 2008 Delray Beach as 18-year-old Q ranked 244th and remains youngest champion on tour since Hewitt, 16, at 1998 Adelaide.
