DAY TWO HIGHLIGHTS

- Only four active players have won each of the other Grand Slams, but parity has prevailed at the US Open with seven different men's singles champions in the last 10 years. All seven are in the field this fortnight, including three in action on Tuesday. Two-time champion **Novak Djokovic** returns to Arthur Ashe Stadium for the first time since the 2016 final. Djokovic missed the 2017 US Open due to a right elbow injury and struggled to a 6-6 start this season. The Serbian superstar is 27-4 since then, highlighted by his 13th Grand Slam title at Wimbledon and 31st ATP Masters 1000 title at Cincinnati. Djokovic meets **Marton Fucsovics**, Hungary's best player of the last 30 years.
- Also on Arthur Ashe Stadium, five-time champion **Roger Federer** faces 5-foot-7 **Yoshihito Nishioka** of Japan. As the US Open celebrates its 50th anniversary, Federer has reached the 10th anniversary of his last US Open title. Federer is playing his 40th match at the tournament following his 40-match win streak here from 2004 through 2009. The Swiss is 31-8 in New York City since defeating Djokovic in the 2009 semi-finals. If he claims his sixth title on 9 September, the 37-year-old Federer would become the oldest and winningest US Open champion in the Open Era.
- Marin Cilic**, who routed Federer en route to the 2014 US Open title, opens his campaign on Grandstand against **Marius Copil** of Romania. Cilic edged Copil in three sets on 15 August at Cincinnati. While Cilic seeks a second Grand Slam title, **Kei Nishikori** begins his quest for a second Grand Slam final against **Maximilian Marterer** of Germany on Court 17. Nishikori upset Djokovic in the 2014 US Open semi-finals before finishing runner-up to Cilic.
- Eight #NextGenATP players will compete on Tuesday, led by World No. 4 **Alexander Zverev**. The 21-year-old German plays **Peter Polansky** of Canada, the luckiest of losers, on Louis Armstrong Stadium. Polansky is the first player on record to enter all four Grand Slam events as a lucky loser, doing so in 2018 alone. Also in action is 19-year-old **Alex de Minaur**, who meets **Taro Daniel** of Japan on Court 13. De Minaur, Zverev, **Stefanos Tsitsipas** and **Andrey Rublev** -- all #NextGenATP players -- reached the Washington semi-finals earlier this month. Washington became the first tour-level event since 1995 Buenos Aires without a semi-finalist over the age of 21.
- A pair of 36-year-old veterans could be playing the last Grand Slam match of their respective careers on Tuesday. Two-time US Open semi-finalist **Mikhail Youzhny** meets **Marcos Baghdatis** on Court 6 after announcing his upcoming retirement last month at Atlanta. Youzhny is two wins shy of 500 for his career. **Julien Benneteau**, who is also retiring, faces No. 22 seed **Marco Cecchinato** on Court 13. Cecchinato is 0-8 lifetime in hard-court matches. The 2018 US Open also marks the final Grand Slam tournament for **David Ferrer**, **Florian Mayer** and **Gilles Muller**.

2018 in Review

- Ended career-long 54-week title drought by winning 4th Wimbledon and 13th Grand Slam title overall (d. Anderson).
- As World No. 21, became lowest-ranked Grand Slam champion since No. 44 Gaudio at 2004 Roland Garros.
- Improved to 27-25 vs. Nadal by defeating World No. 1 in Wimbledon SF 10-8 in 5th after 5 hours, 15 minutes.
- Improved to 24-22 vs. Federer by beating World No. 2 for ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati title.
- Became 1st player to win titles at all 9 ATP Masters 1000 events since start of series in 1990.
- Earned 800th career win in London/Queen's Club QF (d. Mannarino), but squandered 1 MP in final (l. to Cilic).
- Advanced to Roland Garros QF-or-better for 9th straight year (l. to Cecchinato in QF).
- Reached ATP Masters 1000 Rome QF-or-better for 12th straight season (l. to Nadal in SF).
- Started year 6-6 with 3 straight losses to Chung in Aus. Open 4R, Daniel in Indian Wells 2R and Paire in Miami 2R.
- Fell to No. 22 in ATP Rankings on 21 May -- lowest since No. 22 on 2 October 2006. Returned to Top 10 on 16 July.
- Underwent surgery on right elbow shortly after Australian Open, which was his 1st tournament in 6 months.

Career Highlights

> Ended 4 years as World No. 1 (2011-12, 2014-15). One of 7 players to finish 4+ seasons at No. 1 along with Sampras (6), Connors (5), Federer (5), Lendl (4), McEnroe (4) and Nadal (4). Spent 223 total weeks at No. 1, 5th all-time behind Federer's 310, Sampras' 286, Lendl's 270 and Connors' 268. Finished Top 3 and earned 60+ wins in 10 straight seasons (2007-16).

> Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 10 straight years (2007-16), capturing 5 titles overall and becoming 1st player to sweep

4 straight titles (2008, 2012-15).

> Owns 70 singles titles, 6th-most in Open Era, including 13 Grand Slams (4th all-time) and 31 ATP Masters 1000s (2nd behind Nadal's 33). Won 2+ titles each year from 2006-18, including all 4 Grand Slam and 9 ATP Masters 1000 events. Only player with titles at all 9 ATP Masters 1000s since start of series in 1990. Enjoyed win streaks of 43 matches overall (2010-11), 31 matches at ATP Masters 1000s (2011) and 30 matches at Grand Slams (2015-16). One of 3 active players with 800+ victories (also Federer, Nadal), earning 800th win in 2018 London/Queen's Club QF (d. Mannarino). Owns winning records against Nadal (27-25), Federer (24-22) and Murray (25-11).

> Swept titles at 2015 Wimbledon, 2015 US Open, 2016 Australian Open and 2016 Roland Garros, becoming 8th player to complete career Grand Slam and 3rd to hold all 4 major titles at one time (also Budge, Laver). Tied with Emerson and Federer for most Australian Open titles in history (6). Loss to Querrey in 2016 Wimbledon 3R snapped streaks of 28 QFs, 9 SFs, 6 finals and 4 titles in a row at Grand Slams.

> Won 2008 Beijing Olympics bronze medal, then led Serbia to 2010 Davis Cup title with straight-set wins over Simon and Monfils (SRB d. FRA 3-2). Lost in 2012 London Olympics bronze medal match and 2013 Davis Cup final, despite defeating Stepanek and Berdych in straight sets (CZE d. SRB 3-2).

2018 in Review

- Defeated 2-time defending champion Wawrinka en route to 1st ATP World Tour title at Geneva (d. Gojowczyk).
- First Hungarian champion on tour since Taroczy won last of his 13 titles at 1982 Hilversum.
- Earned biggest win of career over No. 13 Querrey en route to Australian Open 4R (l. to eventual champion Federer).
- Became 1st Hungarian to reach R16 at a Grand Slam since Taroczy at 1984 Roland Garros.
- Achieved career-high No. 40 on 20 August. Highest-ranked Hungarian since No. 37 Taroczy on 15 October 1984.
- Lost 5 straight tour-level matches before reaching Munich QF (l. to Marterer).
- Squandered 4 MPs vs. Wawrinka in ATP Masters 1000 Toronto 2R. Also lost to Wawrinka in Cincinnati 3R.
- Reached 9th ATP Challenger Tour final at Canberra, AUS (l. to Seppi).
- Withdrew from Marseille qualifying (leg) and Eastbourne (hip). Retired in Halle 1R vs. Kohlschreiber (hip).

Career Highlights

> Achieved new career-high 7 times in 2018, peaking at No. 40 on 20 August. Highest-ranked Hungarian since No. 37 Taroczy on 15 October 1984. Broke into Top 100 on 17 July 2017 following Wimbledon debut, becoming 1st Hungarian in Top 100 since his coach Savolt on 10 March 2003.

> Defeated 2-time defending champion Wawrinka en route to 1st ATP World Tour SF, final and title at 2018 Geneva. Became 1st Hungarian champion on tour since Taroczy at 1982 Hilversum. Also advanced to 1st ATP World Tour QF in Switzerland, doing so at 2017 Basel as Q (l. to Cilic 76 in 3rd).

> Earned biggest win of career over No. 13 Querrey en route to 2018 Australian Open 4R. Became 1st Hungarian to reach R16 at a Grand Slam since Taroczy at 1984 Roland Garros. Qualified for 2016 US Open after failing in 1st 14 qualifying attempts at Grand Slams.

> Owns 128-77 Challenger record (4-5 in finals), including titles in 2017 at Vicenza, ITA and Ilkley, GBR. Broke into Top 200 on November 25, 2013 after winning Andria, ITA Challenger title and Top 300 on May 6, 2013 after winning Anning, CHN Challenger title.

> Became World No. 1 junior on 5 July 2010. Captured 2010 Wimbledon junior singles title without dropping a set, as well as 2009 US Open junior doubles title w/Hsieh.

- Advanced to 5th ATP World Tour QF of career at Los Cabos (d. Fritz, l. to eventual champion Fognini).
- Defeated Kohlschreiber in 5 sets to reach Australian Open 2R for 2nd straight year (l. to Seppi).
- Qualified at Houston (l. to Zeballos in 1R) and ATP Masters 1000 Toronto (ret. vs. Carreno Busta in 1R -- fatigue).
- Fell to No. 380 in ATP Rankings on 9 April -- lowest since No. 382 on 21 April 2014.
- Improved to 5-0 in ATP Challenger Tour finals by winning Gimcheon, KOR title as Q (d. Pospisil).
- Returned to action at Playford, AUS Challenger after tearing left ACL on 24 March 2017 (l. to Schnur in 1R).
- Retired in Launceston, AUS Challenger 1R vs. Polmans due to left knee injury.

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 58 on 20 March 2017 before tearing left ACL 4 days later. Broke into Top 100 on 11 July 2016 following Winnetka, USA Challenger title. Ended 2016 at No. 100 after winning Astana, KAZ Challenger title in final week of season. Peaked at No. 12 in juniors on 2 January 2012.
- > Saved 4 MPs vs. Evans en route to 1st ATP World Tour SF at 2016 Atlanta. Reached 1st ATP QF at 2015 Delray Beach as Q, where he posted 1st tour-level wins of career over Sijsling and Matosevic. Won gold medal at 2014 Asian Games in Incheon, KOR (d. Lu 6-2, 6-2).
- > Enjoyed remarkable run to 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 4R. Entered as LL and defeated E. Ymer 6-4, 6-1 in 1R after losing to E. Ymer 6-3, 6-1 in Q2. Gave up 16 inches to 6-foot-11 Karlovic in 2R, yet broke him 3 times to win 6-4, 6-3. Rallied from 6-1, 5-2 down in 3R, saving 1 MP to beat No. 14 Berdych for biggest win of career. Served for match twice against No. 3 Wawrinka in 4R before falling in 3rd-set TB.
- > Advanced to 2R at 2015 US Open as Q, 2017 Australian Open and 2018 Australian Open, where he defeated Kohlschreiber in 5 sets to win 1st tour-level match following left knee surgery. Played at 8 Grand Slam junior events, reaching 2012 US Open SFs in singles and doubles w/Panta.
- > Owns 5-0 record in ATP Challenger Tour finals with titles at 2014 Shanghai, CHN; 2015 Toyota, JPN; 2016 Winnetka, USA; 2016 Astana, KAZ and 2018 Gimcheon, KOR as Q.

2018 in Review

- Became oldest World No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings at age 36 on 19 February.
- Owns records for most weeks at No. 1 (310), years since debut at No. 1 (14) and years between stints at No. 1 (5).
- Extended records with 20th Grand Slam title and 30th final at Australian Open (d. Cilic). Tied record with 6th AO title.
- Secured No. 1 ranking with Rotterdam QF win (d. Haase). Went on to win 97th ATP World Tour title (d. Dimitrov).
- Clinched No. 1 most recently with Stuttgart SF win (d. Kyrgios in 3rd-set TB). Went on to win 98th title (d. Raonic).
- Ranked No. 1 for 6 weeks from 19 February-1 April, 1 week from 14-20 May and 1 week from 18-24 June.
- Tied his own record with 34 straight sets won at Wimbledon before squandering 1 MP in QF (l. to Anderson).
- Held in 100 straight service games at ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (l. to Djokovic in final after being broken 3 times).
- Saved 2 MPs vs. Paire en route to 12th Halle final (l. to Coric).
- Enjoyed career-best 17-0 start before squandering 3 MPs vs. Del Potro in ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells final.
- Fell to Del Potro in 3rd-set TB. Now 1-8 in championship matches decided by final-set TB.
- Also lost 3rd-set TB to No. 175 Kokkinakis in ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R -- worst loss by World No. 1 since same tournament and round in 2003 (No. 178 Clavet d. No. 1 Hewitt).
- Skipped clay-court season and has not played on surface since 12 May 2016 (l. to Thiem in Rome 3R).

Career Highlights

> Enjoyed record 310 weeks at No. 1, including record 237 straight from 2 February 2004 to 17 August 2008. Became oldest World No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings at age 36 on 19 February 2018. Ended 5 seasons as No. 1 (2004-07, 2009), tied with Connors (1974-78) for 2nd-most year-end No. 1 finishes behind Sampras (1993-98).

> Holds Nitto ATP Finals records for titles (6), finals (10), SFs (14), appearances (15) and wins (55), capturing championship in 3 cities (Houston 2003-04, Shanghai 2006-07, London 2010-11) and 5 times with 5-0 record (2003-04, 2006, 2010-11).

> Owns 98 titles, 2nd-most in Open Era behind Connors' 109. Also trails only Connors in wins with 1,165 to American's 1,256. Earned 1,000th victory in 2015 Brisbane final over Raonic. Enjoyed career-long 41-match win streak (2006-07), reached 17 straight finals (2005-06), posted 24-match win streak in finals (2003-05), won 24 straight matches vs. Top 10 (2003-05) and earned record 65 consecutive victories on grass (2003-08). Went 81-4 in 2005 (.953) for highest win percentage since McEnroe went 82-3 in 1984 (.965). Boasts 10 wins vs. World No. 1 and 10 wins from 2 sets down. Never retired in 1,638 matches on tour (1,420 singles and 218 doubles).

> Greatest of all time at Grand Slams with 20 titles in 30 finals and 336 victories overall. One of 8 men to win all 4 majors, securing career Grand Slam at 2009 Roland Garros. Captured record 8th Wimbledon title in 2017. Second-oldest Grand Slam champion in Open Era behind Rosewall (1972 Australian Open). Owns Open Era records for consecutive Grand Slam finals (10), SFs (23) and QFs (36). Won 16 of 27 Grand Slam events from 2003 Wimbledon through 2010 Australian Open, then 1 of 27 from 2010 Roland Garros through 2016 US Open. Owns 27 titles and 359 wins at ATP Masters 1000 events, including Indian Wells/Miami 'Sunshine Double' in 2005-06 and 2017.

> Two-time Olympic medalist, taking gold in doubles at 2008 Beijing w/Wawrinka and silver in singles at 2012 London. Finished 4th in singles at 2000 Sydney. Clinched 2014 Davis Cup title for Switzerland by beating Gasquet for 50th Davis Cup win of career (SUI d. FRA 3-1).

- Lost in 1R as LL at Australian Open (l. to Khachanov), Roland Garros (l. to Herbert) and Wimbledon (l. to Novak).
- Achieved career-high No. 110 in ATP Rankings on 25 June.
- Advanced to 2R for 6th time at ATP Masters 1000 Toronto (d. Ebden, l. to Djokovic).
- Qualified at ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells and saved 2 MPs in 1R win over Copil (l. to Mannarino in 2R).
- Captured 3rd ATP Challenger Tour singles title of career at Granby, CAN (d. Humbert).
- Advanced to 3 Challenger doubles finals, highlighted by Bordeaux, FRA title w/Klahn (d. Duran/M. Gonzalez).

Career Highlights

- > Achieved career-high No. 110 on 25 June 2018 after advancing to Ilkley, GBR Challenger QF. Broke into Top 200 on 24 August 2009 soon after reaching ATP Masters 1000 Montreal 2R. Finished 6 seasons in Top 200 (2009, 2012-14, 2016-17).
- > Still seeking 1st ATP World Tour QF. Advanced to 2R at 11 tour-level events, including 6 times at ATP Masters 1000 Canada as WC. Earned biggest win of career over No. 15 J. Melzer in 2010 Toronto 1R.
- > Played at all 4 Grand Slam events in 2018 as LL, becoming 1st player to player to do so in calendar year and overall. Also entered 2017 Australian Open as LL. Owns 1-9 main draw record at Grand Slams, posting lone win at 2010 US Open as Q (d. Monaco). Also qualified at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open in 2009, as well as 2014 Roland Garros.
- > Captured ATP Challenger Tour titles at 2013 Tiburon, USA; 2016 Gatineau, CAN and 2018 Granby, CAN. Owns 183-166 Challenger record (3-7 in finals).
- > Peaked at No. 34 in juniors on 18 December 2006. Went 62-34 on ITF Junior Circuit with wins over Klizan, Tomic and Young. Advanced to 2006 US Open boys' singles final as SE and 2006 Australian Open boys' doubles SF w/Nishikori.

2018 in Review

- Did not drop a set or his serve en route to 3rd ATP Masters 1000 title at Madrid (d. Thiem).
- Became 1st player to win a clay-court title without being broken since stats started being kept in 1991.
