MIAMI OPEN PRESENTED BY ITAU TALKING POINTS

- Tour-leader in wins on the ATP Tour this season **Daniil Medvedev** starts his campaign at the **Miami Open presented by Itau** on Saturday. The former World No. 1 has reached a semi-final in 5 of 6 events he played this season, including a 19-match winning streak. With 3 titles won (Rotterdam, Doha, Dubai), the 27-year-old leads the tour with most titles and finals (4) this year and faces **Roberto Carballes Baena** in his opening round. The Spaniard turned 30 on Thursday and crowned it with a 6-0 3-0 RET win over compatriot **Bernabe Zapata Miralles**. Carballes Baena owns a 0-10 record vs. Top 10 players and seeks biggest career win.
- No. 2 seed **Stefanos Tsitsipas** lost his opening round at Indian Wells earlier this month and will try to avoid leaving the 'Sunshine Double' without a win for the first time in his career. The Greek faces the experienced veteran **Richard Gasquet**, who earned his 596th tour-level win on Thursday, 20 years after first debuting in Miami in 2003. Gasquet, who has earned at least 1 Top 10 win in 17 of last 18 seasons (2005-2022), going 0-4 against them in 2020, seeks first Top 5 win on hard courts since defeating No. 4 Ferrer at 2013 Beijing QF.
- With 21 wins this year, No. 11 seed **Cameron Norrie** entered Miami with second-most tour-level wins in 2023. The Brit, who is still the only player to get the better of World No. 1 **Carlos Alcaraz** this year in the Rio de Janeiro final, opens vs. Frenchman **Gregoire Barrere**. Barrere, who earned first career ATP Masters 1000 win over **Roman Safiullin** on Thursday, will be seeking first Top 20 win in his career (0-9).
- World No. 6 **Felix Auger-Aliassime** is back to his career-high after rising 4 spots in the latest [Pepperstone ATP Rankings](#) following a quarter-final showing at Indian Wells (l. to Alcaraz). The 22-year-old has reached the quarter-final stage at last 6 ATP Masters 1000 events, but still seeks 1st ATP Masters 1000 final. He will be aiming to achieve that in Miami, where he also came from qualifying to become the youngest semi-finalist in tournament history in 2019. He faces left-handed Brazilian **Thiago Monteiro**, who aims to earn 2nd career Top 10 win (1-5).
- With 5 Americans in singles action on the men's side, the biggest spotlight will be on No. 2 American and No. 12 seed **Frances Tiafoe**. Tiafoe was the last American men standing in Indian Wells last week to reach his 1st ATP Masters 1000 semi-final. 4 years from his run to the Miami quarter-finals, the 25-year-old starts his campaign for another run vs. Japanese qualifier **Yosuke Watanuki**. Another American seed, World No. 39 **Ben Shelton** will be making his Miami debut. The 20-year-old, who sits at his career-high has no points to defend until June and will face Frenchman **Adrian Mannarino** in their first meeting.

Richard Gasquet | Age: 36 | World No. 40 | Career-High No. 7 | 2023: 8-6 (Auckland Title) | Miami: 13-12 (2013 SF)
 > Former World No. 1 junior achieved career-high No. 7 in 2007 and finished 4 seasons in Top 10 overall (2007, 2012-13, 2015).
 > Defeated Top-5 players in 5 sets to reach SFs at 2007 Wimbledon (d. Roddick in QF), 2013 US Open (d. Ferrer in QF) and 2015 Wimbledon (d. Wawrinka in QF).
 > Owns 16 titles, qualified at Nitto ATP Finals in 2007 and 2013, and reached ATP Masters 1000 finals at 2005 Hamburg, 2006 Toronto and 2012 Toronto.
 > Won ATP Tour debut as 15-year-old at 2002 Monte Carlo (d. Squillari), earned biggest career win at 2005 Monte Carlo (d. No. 1 Federer) and posted 500th career win at 2018 Monte Carlo (d. M. Zverev).
 > Remains youngest match winner since start of ATP Tour in 1990 and owns 596 wins overall – most among Frenchmen in Open Era (since 1968).

NOTE: Gasquet made his Miami debut 20 years ago (l. to Lisnard at 2003 Miami 1R) and earned best result at the event 10 years ago (l. to Murray in SF). He is 35-113 vs. Top 10 players in his career (10-62 vs. Top 5), seeking first Top 10 win since defeating No. 2 Medvedev at 2022 Geneva 2R.

Stefanos Tsitsipas | Age: 24 | World No. 3 (Career-High) | 2023: 13-3 (Aus. Open Final) | Miami: 7-4 (2021 QF)
 > Top-ranked Greek of all time achieved career-high No. 3 in August 2021 and boasts 10 wins vs. Top-3 opponents (2 vs. No. 1, 3 vs. No. 2, 5 vs. No. 3).
 > Six-time Grand Slam semi-finalist, highlighted by runs to 2021 Roland Garros and 2023 Australian Open finals.
 > Captured 2018 Next Gen ATP Finals title at age 20 and 2019 Nitto ATP Finals title at age 21, becoming youngest champion of latter since Hewitt, 20, in 2001.
 > Won 9 ATP Tour titles, including 2021 and 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo, but still seeking 1st ATP 500 title (0-9 in finals).
 > Youngest of 30 players to defeat Djokovic (2018 Toronto 3R), Federer (2019 Australian Open 4R) and Nadal (2019 Madrid SF), sweeping Big 3 before turning 21.

NOTE: Tsitsipas is on a 9-match winning streak vs. Frenchmen on tour-level, 14-2 since the start of 2021.

Roberto Carballes Baena | Age: 30 | World No. 84 | Career-High No. 71 | 2023: 4-7 (4 times in 2R) | Miami: 2-3 ('19, '23 2R)
 > Former World No. 8 junior achieved career-high No. 71 in November 2021 following previous career-high of No. 72 in February 2018.
 > At 2018 Quito, became 1st Spanish qualifier to win an ATP Tour title since Almagro at 2006 Valencia.
 > Earned biggest win of career over No. 11 Shapovalov 8-6 in 5th after 5 hours to reach 2020 Roland Garros 3R.
 > Defeated Goffin for 1st ATP Tour win en route to 2014 Casablanca SF as Q.
 > Boasts 228-146 Challenger record (10-8 in finals), capturing clay-court titles in 2022 at Tunis and Seville.

NOTE: Carballes Baena seeks biggest career win, owning a 0-10 record vs. Top 10 players and 2-18 record vs. Top 50 players on hard courts across all levels (d. No. 16 Berrettini at 2022 Florence 2R and No. 41 Zapata Miralles at 2023 Miami 1R).

Daniil Medvedev | Age: 27 | World No. 5 | Career-High No. 1 | 2023: 24-3 (3 Titles) | Miami: 9-4 (2021-22 QF)
 > Spent 16 weeks as World No. 1 in 2022, becoming tallest No. 1 in history at 1.98m (6'6") and 1st No. 1 other than Djokovic, Federer, Murray and Nadal since Roddick in 2004.
 > Four-time Grand Slam finalist owns 5-3 record vs. Djokovic when Serb is World No. 1, including 6-4 6-4 6-4 win in 2021 US Open final that denied Djokovic calendar Grand Slam.
 > Beat No. 1 Djokovic, No. 2 Nadal and No. 3 Thiem en route to 2020 Nitto ATP Finals title, becoming 1st player to sweep Top 3 in tournament history and anywhere on ATP Tour since 2007 Madrid (Nalbandian).
 > Earned 20 straight wins from 2020-21 (12 vs. Top 10), led ATP Tour with 63 victories in 2021, and captured team titles at 2021 ATP Cup, Laver Cup and Davis Cup.

> Won 17 of his 18 singles titles on hard courts and all 18 of his titles at different events, including ATP Masters 1000 championships at 2019 Cincinnati, 2019 Shanghai, 2020 Paris and 2021 Toronto.

NOTE: Medvedev reached the final at all ATP Masters 1000 hard court events except Miami. He is 19-1 in his last 20 matches, losing a 19-match winning streak at the 2023 Indian Wells final last week (l. to Alcaraz).

Felix Auger-Aliassime | Age: 22 | World No. 6 (Career-High) | 2023: 11-6 (Doha SF) | Miami: 6-3 (2019 SF)

> Achieved career-high No. 6 and earned personal-best 60 wins during breakout 2022 season, including career-long 16-match win streak with 3 titles in as many weeks at Florence, Antwerp and Basel.

> Also in 2022, won Rotterdam title to snap 0-8 start to career in singles finals, advanced to 3rd straight Grand Slam QF at Australian Open, and swept team titles at ATP Cup, Laver Cup and Davis Cup.

> Led ATP Tour with 45 hard-court and 31 indoor wins in 2022, highlighted by victories over No. 1 Alcaraz and former No. 1s Djokovic, Murray and Nadal.

> At 2021 US Open, became 1st Canadian men's singles semi-finalist in tournament history (since 1881).

> As an 18-year-old in 2019, became youngest Top-25 player since Hewitt, 18, in 1999, youngest ATP 500 finalist in series history at Rio de Janeiro (since 2009), and youngest semi-finalist in Miami tournament history (since 1985).

NOTE: Auger-Aliassime reached at least the quarter-final stage at last 6 ATP Masters 1000 events.

Thiago Monteiro | Age: 28 | World No. 81 | Career-High No. 61 | 2023: 5-9 (Santiago QF) | Miami: 1-2 (2023 2R)

> Former World No. 2 junior achieved career-high No. 61 after going 18-6 at Challengers in 2022, highlighted by titles at Salzburg and Genoa.

> Defeated No. 9 Tsonga in ATP Tour debut at 2016 Rio de Janeiro as 338th-ranked WC, which remains biggest win of career.

> Also beat a Frenchman to advance to 1st ATP Tour SF of career at 2018 Quito (d. Monfils).

> Ended 7-match losing streak at Grand Slams and reached 1st Grand Slam 3R at 2020 Roland Garros.

> Posted 86-33 record on ITF Junior Circuit, including 6-2 6-1 win over Kyrgios en route to 2011 Offenbach Grade 1 title and 6-1 6-1 win over Pouille en route to 2011 Charleroi Grade 1 title.

NOTE: Monteiro seeks biggest career win and owns a 1-5 record vs. Top 10 players (d. No. 9 Tsonga at 2016 Rio de Janeiro 1R) and 1-8 record vs. Top 20 players on hard courts (d. No. 19 Monfils at 2022 Adelaide-2 2R). Coming into 2023 Miami with a 0-6 in ATP Masters 1000 events, he earned his first win over Kubler in 1R.

Hubert Hurkacz | Age: 26 | World No. 9 (Career-High) | 2023: 13-6 (Marseille Title) | Miami: 12-2 (2021 Title)

> Top Polish men's player in history ended 2021 at career-high No. 9 after qualifying for Nitto ATP Finals, then finished 2022 at No. 10.

> Entered 2021 Wimbledon on 6-match losing streak, then reached 1st Grand Slam SF by defeating 8-time champion Federer 6-3 7-6(4) 6-0 in final singles match of Swiss' career.

> Upset 5 seeds to win 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Miami title and earned 4 victories in 3 sets to reach 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Montreal final.

> Also advanced to ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2021 Paris and 2022 Miami, and captured ATP Masters 1000 doubles titles at 2020 Paris w/Auger-Aliassime and 2022 Miami w/Isner.

> Defeated No. 1 Medvedev 6-1 6-4 in 63 minutes to win 5th ATP Tour singles title in 5th final at 2022 Halle (now 6-1 in finals).

NOTE: Hurkacz is 8-0 vs. players outside the Top 50 in 2023 and is on an 11-match winning streak in his opening rounds (l. to Isner at 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 2R). He faces a lucky loser in his opening rounds for the third tournament in a row (Dubai 1R – Shevchenko, Indian Wells 2R – Popyrin).

Thanasi Kokkinakis | Age: 26 | World No. 94 | Career-High No. 69 | 2023: 8-5 (Adelaide-2 SF) | Miami: 7-4 (2022 4R)

> Former Top-10 junior earned 1st ranking point 8 days after 15th birthday in 2011, achieved career-high No. 69 at age 19 in 2015 and returned to career-high No. 69 at age 26 in 2022.

- > Captured 1st ATP Tour title in hometown at 2022 Adelaide-2 as 145th-ranked WC after reaching 1st QF, SF and final at 2017 Los Cabos as 454th-ranked WC.
- > Upset defending champion Federer in 2018 Miami 2R as 175th-ranked Q, becoming lowest-ranked player to beat World No. 1 since No. 178 Clavet beat Hewitt in 2003 Miami 2R.
- > Won 2022 Australian Open doubles title as 434th-ranked WC with countryman Kyrgios, defeating Ebden/Purcell in 1st All-Aussie Grand Slam doubles final since 1980 Australian Open.
- > Advanced to 3 Grand Slam junior finals in 2013, winning Wimbledon boys' doubles title w/Kyrgios and finishing as boys' singles runner-up at Australian Open and US Open.

NOTE: Kokkinakis earned biggest career win in Miami 2R 5 years ago over then-No. 1 Federer on 24 March 2018. Owns a 3-9 record vs. Top 10 players, 1-1 in 2023 (d. No. 6 Rublev at Adelaide-2 2R).

[Q] Yosuke Watanuki (JPN) vs [12] Frances Tiafoe (USA) First Meeting

Yosuke Watanuki | Age: 24 | World No. 123 | Career-High No. 111 | 2023: 2-1 (2 times in 2R) | Miami: 1-0 (2023 2R)
 > Broke into Top 200 on 19 November 2018 after advancing to Kobe CH final before achieving career-high No. 111 in February 2023 after winning his first career Grand Slam match at 2023 Australian Open.
 > Successfully qualified for 2023 Australian Open in 8th attempt and defeated Rinderknech for first Grand Slam win.
 > Ended 2022 on a 10-match winning streak on the ATP Challenger tour to win titles at 2022 Kobe and 2022 Yokkaichi, 3 years after winning only previous ATP Challenger Tour title at 2019 Kobe.
 > Posted 1st ATP Tour win at 2018 Tokyo as Q (d. Haase) after making an ATP Tour debut at 2018 Washington as Q and squandering 1 MP vs. Medvedev.
 > Made his first ATP Tour quarter-final at 2022 Lyon as a lucky loser defeating No. 43 Pedro Martinez in 1R for biggest career win.
 > Peaked at No. 2 in junior rankings in March 2016. Went 104-39 on ITF Junior Circuit, including wins over current top 20 players de Minaur, Ruud and Tsitsipas. Reached US Open boys' SFs in 2016 singles and 2015 doubles w/Harris.
 > Father, Hirotsugu, and mother, Chizuru, are tennis coaches. Brothers are Yusuke, his coach, and Keisuke, who also plays tennis.

NOTE: Watanuki seeks biggest career win (0-1 vs. Top 20 players) after earning first career ATP Masters 1000 win in 1R over fellow qualifier Paire and jumping 17 spots to No. 106 on the [Pepperstone ATP Live Rankings](#).

Frances Tiafoe | Age: 25 | World No. 14 (Career-High) | 2023: 14-4 (Indian Wells SF) | Miami: 12-5 (2019 QF)
 > Former World No. 2 junior achieved career-high No. 14 in February 2023 after posting 5-0 singles record to help Team USA win inaugural United Cup.
 > Defeated 4-time champion Nadal en route to 2022 US Open SF, becoming that event's 1st American men's semi-finalist since Roddick in 2006.
 > Led Team World to 2022 Laver Cup title, teaming w/Sock to defeat Federer/Nadal in Swiss' final match before clinching cup with win over Tsitsipas.
 > Won 1st ATP Tour title as 20-year-old at 2018 Delray Beach and remains youngest American champion since Roddick, 19, at 2002 Houston.
 > Parents emigrated from Sierra Leone in 1996 and father was Head of Maintenance at Junior Tennis Champions Center in Maryland, where Frances and his twin brother Franklin trained as kids.

NOTE: Tiafoe reached first career ATP Masters 1000 SF last week at Indian Wells before losing to Medvedev. He is on an 11-match winning streak vs. players outside of Top 100 (l. to No. 290 Wawrinka at 2022 London/Queen's Club 1R).

 > Broke into Top 100 in September 2019 and achieved career-high No. 58 in February 2023.
 > Advanced to ATP Tour QFs in his native France at 2019 Metz, 2020 Montpellier and 2023 Montpellier.
 > Won main draw matches at all 4 Grand Slam events, including at Roland Garros in 2019 and 2022 as WC.
 > Qualified at Wimbledon in 2018, 2019 and 2021, as well as at 2019 US Open.
 > Owns 126-95 Challenger record (6-7 in finals), winning all 6 of his titles and reaching 12 of his 13 finals on French soil.

NOTE: Barrere seeks biggest career win entering the match with a 0-9 record vs. Top 20 players.

Cameron Norrie | Age: 27 | World No. 12 | Career-High No. 8 | 2023: 21-4 (Rio de Janeiro Title) | Miami: 4-4 (2022 4R)
> Broke into Top 10 in April 2022 and achieved career-high No. 8 in September 2022, joining Henman, Murray and Rusedski as 4th Top-10 British man in history.
> Advanced to 13 ATP Tour finals from May 2021-February 2023, highlighted by 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells title to become 1st British champion in 46-year tournament history.
> Reached Grand Slam 4R, QF and SF for 1st time at 2022 Wimbledon, falling to eventual champion Djokovic in 4 sets.
> Earned 52 wins in 2021 and 49 wins in 2022 before beating No. 2 Nadal at 2023 United Cup and No. 2 Alcaraz in 2023 Rio de Janeiro final for biggest wins of career.
> Born in South Africa to a Scottish father and Welsh mother, grew up in New Zealand, became No. 1 collegiate player in USA at Texas Christian University, and has represented Great Britain since 2013.

NOTE: Norrie has won his last 15 opening rounds (5-0 in 2023) since losing to No. 22 Dimitrov at 2022 London/Queen's Club 1R.

Adrian Mannarino (FRA) vs [32] Ben Shelton (USA)

> Won 1st ATP Tour title in 7th final of career at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch and 2nd title in 11th final of career at 2022 Winston-Salem.
> Earned biggest win of career over No. 5 Cilic to reach biggest final of career at 2017 Tokyo.
> Posted personal-best 33 wins in 2017, ending season on 25-13 run including 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at Montreal.
> Reached 2022 Australian Open 4R and Wimbledon 4R in 2013, 2017 and 2018, but owns 0-19 record vs. Top-10 players at Grand Slams.

NOTE: Mannarino is looking for a 2nd straight win vs. fellow left-handers after defeating 18-year-old Shang in 1R.

Ben Shelton | Age: 20 | World No. 39 (Career-High) | 2023: 6-5 (Australian Open QF) | Miami: 0-0 (Debut)
> Achieved career-high No. 39 in March 2023 after breaking into Top 100, 200 and 500 from June-November 2022.
> Advanced to 2023 Australian Open QF at age 20 and on 1st trip outside USA, becoming youngest American man in Australian Open QF since Giammalva Jr., 19, in 1982, and in Grand Slam QF since Roddick, 20, at 2002 US Open.
> Upset No. 5 Ruud to reach 2022 Cincinnati 3R in ATP Masters 1000 debut at age 19, becoming youngest American man to earn Top-5 win since Roddick, 18, at 2001 Montreal (d. No. 1 Kuerten).
> Ended 2022 on ATP Challenger Tour with 3 indoor hard titles in 3 weeks at Charlottesville, Knoxville & Champaign.
> Posted 65-10 singles record in 2 seasons for University of Florida, clinching 2021 NCAA team title and 2022 NCAA singles title while being coached by his father Bryan, a former World No. 55.

NOTE: Shelton is seeded at an ATP Tour event for the second time in his career (8th seed in Delray Beach) and seeks his 10th career tour-level win (9-8). He has a 4-1 career record vs. lower-ranked players on tour-level (l. to Giron at 2023 Delray Beach 1R).
