DAY 15 TALKING POINTS

- World No. 1 **Jannik Sinner** and World No. 2 **Carlos Alcaraz** face off for the 2025 US Open men's singles title. They are meeting in their fifth final of the season and became the 1st duo to meet in three Grand Slam men's singles finals in a season in Open Era (since 1968), as well as joined Djokovic and Nadal (4 in 2011-12) as only men to play each other in 3 consecutive Grand Slam finals. Both players are looking for their 2nd US Open title.

- WORLD NO. 1 ON THE LINE: Sinner** has held the top spot of PIF ATP Rankings since first becoming World No. 1 on 10 June last year and is on a streak of 65 consecutive weeks, but needs to defeat **Alcaraz** in Sunday's final to retain the position. Alcaraz aims to return to World No. 1 for the first time since September 2023 and plays in second US Open final after defeating Casper Ruud in another US Open final with No. 1 ranking at stake in 2022.

- Reigning champion **Jannik Sinner** is on a 27-match winning streak on hard courts at Grand Slam level, bidding to become the first man to defend US Open title since Federer won in 5 consecutive years in 2004-08 to end the longest drought without a men's title defense of any Grand Slam tournament in the Open Era (since April 1968).

- 22-year-old **Carlos Alcaraz** leads the ATP Tour in wins (60) and titles (6) this season and at 22 years and 125 days aims to become second youngest man in Open Era to win 6 Grand Slam titles. Spaniard would also become fourth man in history to win multiple Grand Slam titles on clay (2), grass (2) and hard courts (2022 US Open).

JANNIK SINNER

US Open Stats

- > He is making his 7th US Open main draw appearance, highlighted by becoming 1st Italian man to win the title last year.
- > Last year, defeated No. 1 American Fritz in final in straight sets to win 2nd of his 4 Grand Slam titles, losing just two sets en route to championship to McDonald in 1R and Medvedev in QF.
- > By reaching 2024 SF became 1st man born in 1990 or later to reach Grand Slam semi-finals at all 4 events, before becoming 11th man in Open Era (2nd-youngest behind Courier) to play in all 4 Grand Slam finals at 2025 Wimbledon.
- > Made 2023 4R by defeating former champion Wawrinka in 3R, before losing to 2020 runner-up Zverev in 4h41m.
- > Lost another marathon in 5h 15m in 2022 QF to eventual champion Alcaraz after holding 1 MP in 4th set. Match ended at US Open record 2:50 a.m.
- > Joined Berrettini in 2021 and 2022 as 1st pair of Italian men to reach same US Open 4R in event history (since 1881). Also joined Berrettini in 2022 as 1st pair of Italian men to reach same US Open QF in event history.
- > Squandered 2-set lead and lost 5th-set tiebreak vs. Khachanov in 2020 US Open 1R.
- > Qualified and made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2019 US Open (l. to 2016 champion Wawrinka in 1R).
- > Fourth man to reach 5 consecutive Grand Slam finals in Open Era after Federer (10 in 2005-07, 8 in 2008-10), Djokovic (6 in 2015-16, 5 in 2020-21) and Nadal (5 in 2011-12).
- > Became the fourth man in Open Era to reach finals of all 4 Grand Slams in a season after Laver (1969), Federer (2006-07, 2009) and Djokovic (2015, 2021, 2023).
- > Needs to win the US Open final to remain World No. 1 on PIF ATP Rankings and extend his run of 65 consecutive weeks on top of rankings since first becoming No. 1 on 10 June 2024.
- > Aims to be 1st reigning men's champion to defend US Open title since Federer won 5 consecutive titles from 2004-08.

- > After WTA World No. 1 Sabalenka defended her US Open title on Saturday, it could be the first time both singles champions defend their title since Sampras and Graf in 1996.
- > Bids to capture his 5th Grand Slam title, third of 2025, to tie Alcaraz for 2nd-most titles at this level among active men.
- > At 24 years and 22 days, he becomes the youngest man in Open Era to play in finals of all four Grand Slam tournaments in a single season, surpassing the previous record by Federer (25Y 33D) in 2006.
- > Bids to become 2nd man in history to win both Australian Open and US Open in back-to-back years (Federer 2006-07).
- > He is on a 27-match winning streak on hard courts at Grand Slam level, last loss to Zverev in 2023 US Open 4R and 26-1 in Grand Slams this year, lone loss to Alcaraz in Roland Garros final after holding 3 championship points.
- > Aims to capture his 21st tour-level title, third of the season after Australian Open and Wimbledon.

Career Highlights

- > Unranked to begin 2018, ended 2020 as No. 1 teenager, broke into Top 10 at age 20 in 2021 and became 1st Italian World No. 1 in PIF ATP Rankings history at age 22 in 2024, remaining at top of rankings since (65 weeks).
- > At 2024 Australian Open, defeated 10-time champion Djokovic in SF and rallied from 2 sets down in final vs. Medvedev to be 2nd Italian men's singles Grand Slam champion in Open Era (Panatta at 1976 Roland Garros).
- > Joined Federer (2003-04 Wimbledon) and Nadal (2005-06 Roland Garros) as only men this century to successfully defend 1st Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open.
- > Became 11th man in Open Era and 2nd youngest behind Courier to reach finals of all 4 Grand Slam events in his career, stopping Alcaraz's 20-match winning streak at the event to win 2025 Wimbledon title.
- > Captured 2024 US Open title to join Djokovic, Federer and Wilander as only players to win both hard-court Grand Slam titles in a season and became third man to win 1st two Grand Slam titles in one year in Open Era following Connors in 1974 and Vilas in 1977.
- > Boasts most titles of any Italian in Open Era (20), including ATP Masters 1000 championships at 2023 Toronto, 2024 Miami, 2024 Cincinnati and 2024 Shanghai.
- > Led Italy to 2023 and 2024 Davis Cup titles, first since 1976, became 1st Italian to win Nitto ATP Finals title on home soil in Turin in 2024.

CARLOS ALCARAZ

US Open Stats

- > Alcaraz is playing in US Open main draw for the fifth straight year, reaching at least the quarter-final stage in first three appearances (2021 QF, 2022 Title, 2023 SF) before losing to van de Zandschulp in 2R last year.
- > Beat No. 7-ranked Ruud in 2022 final in 4 sets to become 1st teenager to capture US Open men's title since Sampras in 1990 (19 years, 28 days). Afterwards became the 28th World No. 1 (and youngest) in the history of the PIF ATP Rankings (since 1973). Became 1st man to win US Open title in 1st or 2nd appearance since Pancho Gonzales in 1948 (2nd).
- > En route to title, earned 5-set wins over [15] Cilic in 4R, [11] Sinner in QF in 5h, 15m - saved 1 MP and [22] Tiafoe in SF to be 1st man to save match point en route to US Open title since Wawrinka in 2016 (1 vs. Evans in 3R).
- > Finished the tournament with 23 hours, 39 minutes on court, most by a US Open champion on record (since 1999). The previous record was 2012 champion Murray with 21 hours, 51 minutes.
- > Made US Open debut ranked No. 55 at 18 in 2021 and became youngest men's quarter-finalist at this event since Thomaz Koch, 18, at 1963 US Championships and youngest at Grand Slam since Chang, 18, at 1990 Roland Garros.
- > In 2021, won 5th-set TB vs. No. 3 Tsitsipas in 3R to earn his first Top 3 win (retired in QF due to upper right leg injury) to be the youngest man to earn Top 10 win at a Grand Slam since Ancic, 18, beat No. 9 Federer at 2002 Wimbledon.
- > Advanced to US Open QF, SF and final without dropping a set, doing so for 1st time in career at Grand Slam level.
- > Held 82 of 84 service games this week, joining Federer in 2015 (80 of 82) and Nadal in 2010 (89 of 91) and 2013 (81 of 82) as only men to reach US Open final without dropping serve more than twice since 1991.
- > Spaniard leads the ATP Tour in wins (60) and titles (6) this season and has advanced to the final of all 8 events played since losing to Goffin in ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R in March.
- > On a 45-2 run since April, highlighted by titles in Monte-Carlo, Rome, Roland Garros, Queen's Club and Cincinnati.
- > Owns 23-2 record at Grand Slams this season, reaching Australian Open QF (l. to Djokovic), saved 3 championship points to win Roland Garros (d. Sinner) and reached Wimbledon final (l. to Sinner).
- > By winning US Open, he would return to World No. 1 for first time since September 2023 after debuting on top of rankings at age 19 after winning 2022 US Open title.
- > Defeated Opelka 6-4 7-5 6-4 in 1R, Bellucci 6-1 6-0 6-3 in 2R, Darderi 6-2 6-4 6-0 in 3R, Rinderknech 7-6(3) 6-3 6-4 in 4R, Lehecka 6-4 6-2 6-4 in QF and four-time champion Djokovic 6-4 7-6(4) 6-2 in SF.
- > He is on a 12-match winning streak after winning Cincinnati earlier this month and advancing to his second US Open final after 2022 title.
- > Bids to become the first man to win US Open title in Open Era without dropping a set and first since Neale Fraser in 1960 (Amateur Era).
- > Seeks 23rd tour-level title and his 6th Grand Slam title, aiming to join Djokovic, Nadal and Wilander as only men to win multiple titles on all three surfaces (2 on clay - 2024-25 Roland Garros, 2 on grass - 2023-24 Wimbledon).
