MIAMI OPEN PRESENTED BY ITAU TALKING POINTS

- **Daniil Medvedev** is the No. 1 seed for the second straight year at the Miami Open, but lost the No. 1 ranking to **Novak Djokovic** on Monday following a three-week stint at the top. Medvedev will become World No. 1 again on 4 April if he reaches the Miami Open semi-finals for the first time in his fourth appearance. The 26-year-old has improved his finish in Miami with each passing edition of the event (2018 2R, 2019 4R, 2021 QF).

- **Hubert Hurkacz** will defend his 2021 Miami title. The 25-year-old entered the Top 20 of the ATP Rankings after beating **Jannik Sinner** to secure his maiden Masters 1000 title here a year ago. Hurkacz is still looking to win his first title this season after losing to **Andrey Rublev** in the Dubai semi-final.
- 18 of the top 20 players in the ATP Ranking are in the 2022 Miami Open presented by Itau draw. Top players including Medvedev, **Alexander Zverev**, **Stefanos Tsitsipas** and **Matteo Berrettini** are still fighting to win their first trophy of the season.
- **John Isner** was the last American to win the Miami Open men's singles title in 2018 (d. A. Zverev). He also reached the final in 2019 (l. to Federer).
- Newly crowned Indian Wells champion **Taylor Fritz** is the No. 11 seed and the current American No. 1. A total of 16 Americans compete at the second Masters 1000 of the season:

- A year ago, a No. 132-ranked **Carlos Alcaraz** made his ATP Masters 1000 debut in Miami, losing out in a tight three-set defeat to **Emil Ruusuvuori**. Since then, the young Spaniard has shown great performances, most recently in reaching a first Masters 1000 semi-final in Indian Wells.
- Today French veteran **Gilles Simon** is looking to edge one step closer to 500 career victories when he takes on an opponent seeking just his third tour-level win in 20-year-old wild card **Jack Draper**. Simon could reach his milestone by beating Draper and then 10th seed **Cameron Norrie** in the second round.
- Former world No.1 **Andy Murray** is coming back as a wild card to a tournament where he has enjoyed a lot of success in the past. The 34-year-old has won the Miami title in 2013 and 2009 and he also was a runner-up on two occasions.

Mackenzie McDonald | Age: 26 | World No. 54 | Career-High No. 49 | 2022: 7-8 (Dubai QF) | Event: 2-2 (2019, 2021 2R)
 > Broke into Top 50 and achieved career-high No. 49 in February 2022 after undergoing right hamstring surgery in 2019 and falling outside Top 250 in 2020.

- > Defeated former champions Kyrgios and Nishikori en route to 1st ATP Tour final at 2021 Washington.
- > Also in 2021, qualified at Roland Garros and Wimbledon after reaching Australian Open 4R as No. 192, becoming lowest-ranked player in Australian Open 4R since No. 248 Canas in 2004.
- > Posted biggest win of career over No. 4 Del Potro to reach 1st ATP Tour SF at 2019 Delray Beach.
- > Qualified for 2013 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati at age 18 by defeating USC legend Johnson, then went on to win 2016 NCAA singles and doubles titles for UCLA.

Dominik Koepfer | Age: 27 | World No. 64 | Career-High No. 50 | 2022: 2-3 (Australian Open, Indian Wells 2R) | Event: 0-1 (2021 1R)

- > Improved year-end ranking in 6 straight seasons (2016-21), breaking into Top 100 in 2019 and achieving career-high No. 50 in 2021.
- > Did not drop a set en route to 1st ATP Tour SF at 2021 Acapulco.
- > Qualified and made ATP Masters 1000 main draw debut at 2020 Rome, where he earned biggest win of career over No. 9 Monfils en route to 1st ATP Tour QF.
- > Posted 6 wins en route to 2019 US Open 4R as Q, then reached 3R at Roland Garros, Wimbledon, Tokyo Olympics and ATP Masters 1000 Paris in 2021.
- > Earned finance degree and was a 2-time All-American at Tulane University in New Orleans (2013-16).

- > At 2018 Quito, became 1st Spanish qualifier to win an ATP Tour title since Almagro at 2006 Valencia.
- > Earned biggest win of career over No. 11 Shapovalov 8-6 in 5th after 5 hours to reach 2020 Roland Garros 3R.
- > Peaked at No. 8 in junior rankings and won 2011 Roland Garros boys' doubles title with countryman Artunedo Martinavarro.

David Goffin | Age: 31 | World No. 70 | Career-High No. 7 | 2022: 5-8 (Sydney QF) | Event: 13-9 (2016 SF)

- > Ended 2017 at career-high No. 7 after defeating No. 1 Nadal and No. 2 Federer en route to Nitto ATP Finals championship match.
- > First Belgian to break into Top 10, qualify for Nitto ATP Finals, defeat World No. 1 and reach an ATP Masters 1000 final (2019 Cincinnati).
- > Became 6th player to beat Nadal and Federer at same event (also Davydenko, Del Potro, Djokovic, Murray and Nalbandian).
- > Earned career-high 59 tour-level wins in 2017 after posting 67 total wins in 2014 (25 tour-level, 17 qualifying, 25 Challenger).
- > Led Belgium to Davis Cup finals in 2015 and 2017, then defeated No. 1 Nadal during 2020 ATP Cup QF.

NOTE: Reached the QF at the Challenger in Phoenix last week (l. to Broady). Best result here came in 2016 when he lost to world No. 1 Djokovic in the SF.

Nick Kyrgios | Age: 26 | World No. 102 | Career-High No. 13 | 2022: 4-2 (Indian Wells QF) | Event: 12-4 (2016, 2017 SF)

- > Former World No. 1 junior broke into Top 50 at age 19 in 2015 and ended 2016 at career-high No. 13.
- > Joined countryman Hewitt as 1 of 2 players to win 1st meeting with Nadal (2014 Wimbledon), Federer (2015 Madrid) and Djokovic (2017 Acapulco).
- > Defeated Nadal en route to 1st Grand Slam QF (2014 Wimbledon), 1st ATP Masters 1000 final (2017 Cincinnati) and 2nd of 3 ATP 500 titles (2019 Acapulco).
- > Reached 2nd Grand Slam QF as 19-year-old at 2015 Australian Open, becoming youngest quarter-finalist at his home Grand Slam event since Cherkasov, 19, in 1990.
- > Won 2022 Australian Open doubles title as 259th-ranked WC with countryman Kokkinakis, defeating Ebden/Purcell in 1st All-Aussie Grand Slam doubles final since 1980 Australian Open.

NOTE: Moved up 30 spots in the ATP Rankings after reaching the QF in Indian Wells last week (l. to Nadal).

Adrian Mannarino | Age: 33 | World No. 61 | Career-High No. 22 | 2022: 10-8 (3 QF) | Event: 10-8 (2015, 2017 4R)

- > Achieved career-high No. 22 in 2018 and ended 9 straight years in Top 75 (2013-21).
- > Advanced to 10 ATP Tour finals, capturing 1st title in 7th final at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch.
- > Earned biggest win of career over No. 5 Cilic to reach biggest final of career at 2017 Tokyo.
- > Posted personal-best 33 wins in 2017, ending season on 25-13 run including 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at Montreal.
- > Reached 2022 Australian Open 4R and Wimbledon 4R in 2013, 2017 and 2018, but owns 0-19 record vs. Top-10 players at Grand Slams.

NOTE: Performed well on American soil this season, reaching quarter-finals in both Dallas and Delray Beach, losing to Opelka in both events.
