Peter Gojowczyk | Age: 32 | World No. 91 | Career-High No. 39 | 2022: 1-9 (Acapulco QF) | Newport: 5-2 (2017 SF) > Posted personal-best 23 wins, broke into Top 50 and achieved career-high No. 39 during 2018 season.

> Earned 7 wins in 8 days to capture 1st ATP Tour title at 2017 Metz as Q.

> Saved 3 MPs vs. Isner en route to 2nd final at 2018 Delray Beach, then reached 3rd final at 2018 Geneva.

> Qualified at 8 Grand Slam events, including 2021 US Open, where he reached 4R with 3 wins from a set down.

> Enjoyed biggest wins of career over No. 9 Raonic at 2014 Halle and No. 8 Sock at 2018 Auckland.

NOTE: Gojowczyk is seeking his 2nd tour-level win of the year (d. No. 75 Nakashima at Acapulco 1R) and first tour-level win on grass since reaching the quarter-final at 2021 Newport (d. No. 61 Pospisil in 2R).

Ugo Humbert | Age: 24 | World No. 129 | Career-High No. 25 | 2022: 7-16 (Wimbledon 3R) | Newport: 2-1 (2019 SF) > Achieved career-high No. 25 after upsetting No. 6 A. Zverev and No. 7 Rublev en route to biggest of 3 career titles at 2021 Halle.

> Won 1st ATP Tour title at 2020 Auckland as 21-year-old to become youngest French champion since Gasquet, 21, at 2007 Mumbai, and 1st Frenchman to win Auckland title in event history (since 1956).

> Saved 4 MPs vs. Evans en route to 2nd ATP Tour title at 2020 Antwerp.

> Owns 7-5 record vs. Top 10 and earned biggest win of career over No. 2 Medvedev at 2022 ATP Cup.

> Rallied from 2 sets down to defeat countryman Monfils en route to 2019 Wimbledon 4R.

NOTE: Humbert is coming off a 3R at Wimbledon, where he earned his 7th career Top 10 win, defeating No. 6 Ruud in 2R.

Jason Kubler | Age: 29 | World No. 102 | Career-High No. 91 | 2022: 4-2 (Wimbledon 4R) | Newport: 0-0 (Debut) > Unranked in March 2017 following string of knee surgeries, then broke into Top 100 and achieved career-high No. 91 during 2018 season.

> During 3-week stretch in spring 2022, won 4 matches to reach Roland Garros 2R as Q and did not drop a set en route to Little Rock Challenger title.

> Achieved his best Grand Slam result at 2022 Wimbledon reaching 4R (d. No. 33 Evans in 1R).

> Also posted tour-level wins at 2014 Dusseldorf as Q, 2018 US Open as WC and 2021 Melbourne-2 as WC.

> To protect his knees, played exclusively on clay from March 2012-May 2015, winning 1st of 7 career Challenger titles at 2014 Sibiu.

> Earned 35 straight junior wins from July 2009-January 2010 (70-4 in sets), became World No. 1 junior in May 2010 and ended junior career by reaching 2011 Wimbledon boys' singles SF.

NOTES: Owns a 22-4 record since start of May including qualifying, Challenger and tour-level matches, highlighted by run to Wimbledon 4R.

Jordan Thompson | Age: 28 | World No. 79 | Career-High No. 43 | 2022: 8-13 (Dallas QF) | Newport: 4-4 (2021 SF) > Earned personal-best 26 tour-level wins, broke into Top 50 and achieved career-high No. 43 in 2019.

> Ended 4-match losing streak in ATP Tour QFs by reaching 1st SF and final at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch.

> Reached Grand Slam 4R for 1st time at 2020 US Open and ATP Masters 1000 4R for 1st time at 2019 Miami.

> Upset World No. 1 and 5-time champion Murray at 2017 London/Queen's Club as LL, earning 1st tour-level win over Murray in 21 tries by an Aussie.

> In 2018, went 1-11 on ATP Tour and 52-17 on ATP Challenger Tour (3-5 in finals), earning 2nd-most Challenger wins in a single season behind Berlocq's 57 wins in 2010.

NOTE: Thompson started 2022 grass season with a 9-1 record on ATP Challenger Tour, winning his 8th ATP Challenger title in Surbiton (d. No. 81 Kudla) and reaching the final in Nottingham (l. to No. 35 Evans) and heads to Newport with a 12-4 grass record across all levels in 2022.

Stefan Kozlov | Age: 24 | World No. 104 (Career-High) | 2022: 4-4 (Delray Beach QF) | Newport: 1-3 (2016 2R)

> Achieved career-high No. 104 in July 2022 after setting his career record for tour-level matches won in a season (4). > Made ATP World Tour debut at 2013 Newport as 15-year-old WC (I. to Przysiezny). Remains youngest participant in ATP match since Behr, 14, at 1990 Tel Aviv. Earned all 5 career wins on grass, including 2 over countryman Johnson.

> Yet to play in a Grand Slam main draw, posting 6-12 record in 12 qualifying attempts.

> Captured ATP Challenger Tour titles at 2016 Columbus, USA and 2017 Las Vegas, USA. Lost to Querrey in 1st Challenger final at 2014 Sacramento, USA as 16-year-old WC.

> Peaked at No. 2 in junior rankings on 27 January 2014. Posted 105-37 record on ITF Junior Circuit from age 13 to 16 with wins over fellow #NextGenATP players Lee, Opelka, Rublev, Santillan, Tiafoe, Tsitsipas and A. Zverev. Grand Slam junior runner-up in singles at 2014 Australian Open and 2014 Wimbledon, and in doubles at 2014 Wimbledon w/Rublev. Ended junior career with 2014 Orange Bowl titles in singles and doubles w/Mmoh.

NOTE: Out of Kozlov's 9 career tour-level wins, 3 are against Johnson, beating him on the way to his both ATP Tour quarter-finals at 2016 's-Hertogenbosch and 2022 Delray Beach.

Steve Johnson | Age: 32 | World No. 95 | Career-High No. 21 | 2022: 10-9 (2 times in 3R) | Newport: 8-5 (2018 Title) > Achieved career-high No. 21 and became No. 1 American during 2016 season.

> Won grass-court titles at 2016 Nottingham and 2018 Newport, as well as clay-court titles at Houston in 2017 and 2018, becoming 1st repeat Houston champion since Roddick in 2001-02.

> Posted 7 wins at 2016 Rio Olympics, finishing as doubles bronze medallist w/Sock and singles quarter-finalist (I. to eventual gold medallist Murray in 3rd-set TB).

> Defeated then-No. 37 Dimitrov to reach 2016 Wimbledon 4R, but owns 1-10 record in Grand Slam 3R with all 9 losses to Top-15 players.

> One of the greatest college tennis players of all time, sweeping 2009-12 NCAA team titles with USC, winning 2011-12 NCAA singles titles and ending career with 72 straight singles wins.

NOTE: Johnson did not lose a game in his last match vs. Kozlov at 2022 London/Queen's Club qualifying, but is still 0-2 vs. Kozlov on grass in tour-level matches.

Radu Albot | Age: 32 | World No. 110 | Career-High No. 39 | 2022: 5-6 (Australian Open 3R) | Newport: 0-0 (Debut) > Achieved career-high No. 39 and earned personal-best 31 wins in 2019, highlighted by 1st ATP Tour title at Delray Beach (d. Evans after saving 3 MPs).

> Defeated No. 12 Carreno Busta in 5 sets for biggest win of career en route to 2018 Wimbledon 3R.

> Struggled with right shoulder injury to start 2020, then ended season by equaling career-best win over No. 12 Shapovalov in Sofia 2R.

> Peaked at No. 11 as a junior in 2007 and earned wins over future ATP No. 3s Dimitrov and Raonic.> Speaks Romanian, Russian, English and a bit of German and Spanish after training in Romania, USA, Germany and Spain.

NOTES: Albot is 1-5 vs. Top 100 players on tour-level this year (d. No. 63 Sousa at Stuttgart 1R).

Jack Sock | Age: 29 | World No. 100 | Career-High No. 8 | 2022: 5-6 (Wimbledon 3R) | Newport: 10-5 (2014-15 SF) > Ended 2017 at career-high No. 8 in singles, 2018 at career-high No. 2 in doubles and 2019 unranked in singles after posting only win of season at Laver Cup (d. Fognini).

> One of 2 active players to compete at Nitto ATP Finals in singles and doubles (also Verdasco), beating No. 3 A. Zverev for biggest singles win in 2017 and saving 1 MP for 2018 doubles title w/M. Bryan.

> Won biggest singles title of career at 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Paris after trailing Edmund 5-1 in 3rd set of opening match.

Captured Grand Slam titles in 2010 US Open boys' singles, 2011 US Open mixed doubles w/Oudin, 2014
Wimbledon men's doubles w/Pospisil and 2018 Wimbledon & US Open men's doubles w/M. Bryan.
Only men's or women's tennis player to earn multiple medals at 2016 Rio Olympics, winning gold in mixed doubles w/Mattek-Sands and bronze in men's doubles w/Johnson.

NOTE: Sock returned to Top 100 at No. 100 on the Pepperstone ATP Rankings on Monday for the first time since October 2018. He equaled his best result at Wimbledon last week reaching 3R for the 2nd time (2016).
