DAY ONE HIGHLIGHTS

Five years ago, Rafael Nadal and David Ferrer met for the Roland Garros title. On Monday, they meet in the opening round of the 2018 US Open, becoming just the fifth pair in the Open Era to play in a Grand Slam first round after playing in a Grand Slam final. Nadal, the defending champion and World No. 1, is 24-6 lifetime against his countryman Ferrer. But Ferrer won their only prior meeting at the US Open in 2007. His six wins over Nadal are tied with Nikolay Davydenko for the fourth-most of any player. Only Novak Djokovic (27), Roger Federer (15) and Andy Murray (7) have more. Ferrer, now ranked No. 148, says that the US Open will be his final Grand Slam.

- Also on Arthur Ashe Stadium, 2016 champion Stan Wawrinka returns to the US Open against No. 8 seed Grigor Dimitrov. Wawrinka missed last year's event after undergoing two surgeries on his left knee. He returns as the World No. 101 and for a second straight Grand Slam meets Dimitrov in the first round. Wawrinka rallied from a set down to defeat Dimitrov at Wimbledon on 2 July, ending a four-match losing streak in his rivalry with the Bulgarian.
- Two former US Open champions also comprise the men's schedule on the new Louis Armstrong Stadium. Murray, the 2012 champion and World No. 382, meets World No. 448 James Duckworth. Both men used protected rankings to enter, with Murray returning from right hip surgery and Duckworth recovered from five operations. Under the lights, World No. 3 Juan Martin del Potro faces American qualifier Donald Young. Del Potro is appearing in his 22nd Grand Slam event since winning the 2009 US Open title. He hopes to set an Open Era record for most attempts before a second Grand Slam title. Del Potro has missed 14 Grand Slam events since his US Open triumph.
- Young is one of 11 American men in action on Monday, with seven more scheduled for Tuesday. No. 11 seed John Isner, No. 18 seed Jack Sock and 2017 quarter-finalist Sam Querrey will play on Opening Day, as will Ryan Harrison, who meets 2017 finalist and World No. 5 Kevin Anderson on Court 17. Steve Johnson faces Denis Istomin on Court 13 with both competitors coming off finals played on Saturday. Johnson lost to Daniil Medvedev at Winston-Salem, while Istomin won a gold medal for Uzbekistan at the Asian Games in Palembang, Indonesia.
- On Grandstand, Canadian teenagers and 2015 US Open boys' doubles champions Denis Shapovalov and Felix Auger-Aliassime will meet for the first time on tour. Shapovalov, 19, is the youngest player in the Top 100 of the ATP Rankings at No. 28. Auger-Aliassime, 18, is the youngest player in the Top 200 at No. 117. Shapovalov vs. Auger-Aliassime is the youngest match at a Grand Slam event since Bernard Tomic, 17, beat Guillaume Rufin, 19, at the 2010 Australian Open and the youngest US Open match since Djokovic, 19, defeated Young, 17, in 2006.

2018 in Review

- Reached Australian Open 2R in return following 2 left knee surgeries in August (d. Berankis, I. to Sandgren).
- Defeated No. 6 Dimitrov to reach Wimbledon 2R (I. to Fabbiano).
- Advanced to Sofia SF as substitute for injured Dimitrov (I. to Basic).
- Fell to eventual champion Fucsovics as 2-time defending champion in Geneva QF.
- Avenged Geneva loss by saving 4 MPs against Fucsovics in ATP Masters 1000 Toronto 2R (I. to No. 1 Nadal in 3R).
- Defeated Fucsovics again to reach ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati QF (I. to Federer).
- Dropped to No. 263 in ATP Rankings on 11 June -- lowest since No. 284 on 11 August 2003.
- Retired in Marseille 2R vs. Ivashka and withdrew from Indian Wells, Miami and Madrid due to left knee injury.

- > Reached career-high No. 3 on 27 January 2014 after winning Australian Open title. Ended 2014-16 at No. 4. Fell to No. 263 on 11 June 2018 -- lowest since No. 284 on 11 August 2003.
- > Qualified for 2013-17 Nitto ATP Finals, advancing to 2013-15 SFs. Held 4 MPs in 2014 SF before falling to Federer in 3rd-set TB.



- > Owns 16 singles titles, including wins in 11 straight finals from 2014-16. Defeated Federer for lone ATP Masters 1000 title at 2014 Monte-Carlo. Also an ATP Masters 1000 finalist at 2008 Rome, 2013 Madrid and 2017 Indian Wells. One of 2 men to beat Big Four on clay (also Thiem) and 1 of 3 to beat Big Four at Grand Slams (also Berdych, Tsonga).
- > Upset World No. 1 in finals of 2014 Australian Open (d. Nadal), 2015 Roland Garros (d. Djokovic) and 2016 US Open (d. Djokovic). At age 31, became oldest US Open champion since Rosewall in 1970. Also beat No. 1 Murray to reach 2017 Roland Garros final. Owns 4-4 record vs. World No. 1 at Grand Slams and 0-17 elsewhere.
- > Won Beijing Olympics doubles gold medal w/Federer in 2008 and helped Swiss to Davis Cup title in 2014 (SUI d. FRA 3-1). Played longest Davis Cup rubber ever in 2013 w/Chiudinelli (I. to Berdych/Rosol 24-22 in 5th after 7h1m).

2018 in Review

- Defeated Goffin in Rotterdam SF (I. to Federer in final) and Monte-Carlo QF (I. to No. 1 Nadal in SF).
- Advanced to Brisbane SF as defending champion (d. Millman after saving 2 MPs in 2R, I. to Kyrgios).
- Reached QFs at Australian Open (I. to Edmund), Barcelona (d. Jaziri after saving 2 MPs, I. to Carreno Busta) and ATP Masters 1000 Toronto (I. to Anderson).
- Fell short of Roland Garros 4R for 8th time in as many appearances (d. Donaldson in 5 sets, I. to Verdasco in 3R).
- Withdrew from Sofia (shoulder) and lost to Djokovic in ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 3R as defending champion.

- > Top-ranked Bulgarian in ATP Rankings history, finishing 2017 at career-high No. 3 after winning Nitto ATP Finals title. Broke into Top 10 on 7 July 2014 after advancing to Wimbledon SF. Became World No. 1 junior on 8 September 2008.
- > Went 5-0 en route to biggest title of career at 2017 Nitto ATP Finals, becoming 1st debutant to win championship since Corretia in 1998 and 1st debutant to go 5-0 since McEnroe in 1978.
- > Only Bulgarian ATP champion. Won 4 of his 8 titles in 2017, including Brisbane, where he beat Top 10 opponents Thiem, Raonic and Nishikori. Earned biggest win of career over No. 1 Djokovic in 2013 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid 2R.
- > Reached 1st Grand Slam QF and SF of career in 2014, advancing to Australian Open QF and Wimbledon SF. Defeated defending champion Murray in 2014 Wimbledon QF. Also advanced to 2017 Australian Open SF, falling to Nadal in 5 sets after 4h56m. Ended junior career in 2008 with back-to-back boys' singles titles at Wimbledon and US Open.
- > Held in 52 of 53 service games en route to 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati title, beating Kyrgios in 1st ATP Masters 1000, ATP Finals or Grand Slam final between players born in 1990s. Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2014 Rome, 2014 Toronto, 2016 Cincinnati and 2018 Monte-Carlo.

2018 in Review

- Won record 11th title at 3 events: Monte-Carlo (d. Nishikori), Barcelona (d. Tsitsipas) and Roland Garros (d. Thiem).
- By winning Roland Garros, tied Margaret Court at Australian Open for most titles won at a single Grand Slam event.
- Improved to 111-2 in best-of-5-set matches on clay and earned 900th career win in Roland Garros 4R (d. Marterer).
- Also won record 8th Rome title (d. A. Zverev) and 33rd ATP Masters 1000 title at Toronto (d. Tsitsipas).
- Passed Federer for most ATP Masters 1000 wins (362) and tied him for consecutive seasons with an ATP title (15).
- Swept 50 straight sets on clay -- Open Era record for any single surface -- before losing to Thiem in Madrid QF.
- Reached 1st Wimbledon SF since 2011 (d. Del Potro in 5 sets after 4h48m, I. to Djokovic in 5 sets after 5h15m).
- Advanced to 10th Australian Open QF, retiring vs. Cilic in 5th set due to right hip injury.
- Ranked No. 1 from 1 January-18 February, 2 April-13 May, 21 May-17 June and 25 June-present.
- Swept Kohlschreiber and A. Zverev in straight sets to lead Spain to 3-2 win over Germany in Davis Cup QF.
- Broke all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.
- Withdrew from Brisbane (knee), Acapulco (right hip), ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells (right hip), ATP Masters 1000 Miami (right hip), London/Queen's Club (knee) and ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (fatigue).



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Career Highlights

- > Finished 2008, 2010, 2013 and 2017 as World No. 1. As 31-year-old in 2017, became oldest year-end No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings. Ranked No. 1 for 188 total weeks through end of 2018 US Open. Spent every week since 25 April 2005 in Top 10, including record 160 straight weeks at No. 2 before passing Federer on 18 August 2008.
- > Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 14 straight seasons (2005-18). Made 8 appearances and still seeking 1st year-end title after finishing as runner-up in 2010 and 2013. Owns only 1 indoor hard-court title (2005 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid).
- > Captured 80 titles, including unprecedented 11 each at ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo, Barcelona and Roland Garros. Greatest of all time on clay with 57 titles and .920-win percentage (415-36). Owns 111-2 record in best-of-5-set matches on clay (.982). Enjoyed record win streaks on a single surface of 81 matches (2005-07) and 50 sets (2017-18). Boasts most ATP Masters 1000 titles of all time with 33. Only player to sweep Roland Garros and all 3 clay-court ATP Masters 1000 events in a single season (2010).
- > Second all-time with 17 titles and 24 finals at Grand Slams, trailing only Federer's 20 titles and 30 finals. As 24-year-old at 2010 US Open, became youngest man in Open Era to complete career Grand Slam. One of 3 men to win a Grand Slam title in teens, 20s and 30s (also Sampras, Rosewall). Captured 1st of record 11 Roland Garros titles as 19-year-old in 2005 and remains youngest Grand Slam champion since Chang, 17, at 1989 Roland Garros. Earned 900th win of career in 2018 Roland Garros 4R en route to title (d. Marterer).
- > Won Olympic gold medals in singles at 2008 Beijing and doubles at 2016 Rio w/M. Lopez. One of 2 men to win all 4 Grand Slams and Olympic gold medal in singles (also Agassi). Led Spain to Davis Cup titles in 2004, 2009 and 2011. Owns all-time record with 24 straight Davis Cup singles and doubles wins since 2005.

- Also lost in Acapulco 2R and ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells 3R to Del Potro, who went on to win both titles.
- Defeated Kohlschreiber 7-5 in 5th after 4 hours, 51 minutes in deciding rubber of Davis Cup QF (ESP d. GER 3-2).
- Owns 2-9 record since Davis Cup QF with 1st Roland Garros 1R loss in 16th appearance (I. to Munar in 5 sets).
- Fell to No. 148 in ATP Rankings on 20 August -- lowest since No. 148 on 20 May 2002.
- Withdrew from tournaments in Monte-Carlo, Barcelona, Estoril and Madrid before birth of son Leo.

- > Finished 7 seasons in Top 10 (2007, 2010-15), achieving career-high No. 3 on 8 July 2013 after Wimbledon QF run. Ranked in Top 50 each week from 7 February 2005 through 22 July 2018. Fell to No. 148 on 20 August 2018.
- > Made 7 appearances at Nitto ATP Finals (2007, 2010-15), reaching final in debut after defeating Nadal in RR.
- > Owns 27-25 record in finals, highlighted by 2012 ATP Masters 1000 Paris title. Led ATP with 7 titles and 76 wins in 2012. Earned 20+ victories in 15 straight seasons (2003-17), notching 700th win in 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Rome 1R over Lopez. One of 4 active players with 700+ wins (also Federer, Nadal, Djokovic). Boasts 331 victories on clay, 2nd among active players behind Nadal. Earned 5 wins over World No. 1, including 3 vs. Nadal.
- > Did not drop a set en route to 2013 Roland Garros final. Played at 42 Grand Slam events before advancing to 1st final -- an Open Era record. Reached back-to-back Grand Slam SFs with 5-set QF wins over Tipsarevic at 2012 US Open and Almagro at 2013 Australian Open. Lost his last 6 Grand Slam QFs, including all 4 from 2013 Wimbledon through 2014 Roland Garros.
- > Boasts 28-5 Davis Cup record, helping Spain to titles in 2008, 2009 and 2011. Finished 4th in doubles at 2012 London Olympics w/F. Lopez.

- Earned 3-set wins over McDonald, Edmund and Copil to reach Washington QF (w/o vs. de Minaur)
- Defeated fellow 3-time Grand Slam champion Wawrinka at Eastbourne as WC (I. to Edmund in 2R).
- Returned following 11-month hiatus and lost 3-setter to Kyrgios in London/Queen's Club 1R.
- Fell to No. 839 in ATP Rankings on 16 July -- lowest since ATP Rankings debut at No. 774T on 21 July 2003.
- Passed by Edmund in ATP Rankings on 5 March, ending reign as No. 1 Brit since 10 July 2006.
- Underwent right hip surgery by Dr. John O'Donnell on 8 January in Melbourne, AUS.
- Withdrew from Wimbledon, where he is 2-time champion, due to hip injury.
- Conceded walkover to de Minaur in Washington QF and turned down ATP Masters 1000 Toronto WC due to fatigue.

- > First British World No. 1 in ATP Rankings history. Rose to top on 7 November 2016 and spent 41 straight weeks at No.
- 1. At age 29, became 2nd-oldest player to debut at No. 1 behind only 30-year-old Newcombe on 3 June 1974. Debuted at No. 2 on 17 August 2009 and owns record for most time between becoming No. 2 and No. 1 (7 years, 82 days).
- > Defeated Djokovic at 2016 Nitto ATP Finals to clinch year-end No. 1 and ATP-best 9th title of season. Went 5-0 at event and set a record by reaching 1st final in 8th appearance.
- > Owns 45 singles titles, including 1+ each year from 2006-17, trailing only Federer's 98, Nadal's 80 and Djokovic's 69 among active players. Won 14 ATP Masters 1000 titles, including 7 of 9 events (all but Indian Wells and Monte-Carlo). Boasts tournament-record 5 titles at London/Queen's Club. Earned 25+ wins in 12 straight seasons (2006-17), beating Anderson for 500th win in 2015 ATP Masters 1000 Miami 4R and 600th win in 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati 3R.
- > Captured titles at US Open in 2012 and Wimbledon in 2013 and 2016 to become 1st British Grand Slam champion since Perry at 1936 US Championships. One of 10 men in Open Era to play in all 4 Grand Slam finals.
- > First player to win 2 Olympic gold medals in singles (2012 London, 2016 Rio). Also earned mixed doubles silver medal w/Robson in 2012. Led Great Britain to 2015 Davis Cup title by becoming 1st player since introduction of World Group in 1981 to go 8-0 in singles.
