## DAY SIX HIGHLIGHTS

- Third round matches in the bottom half of the draw on Saturday feature a trio of former US Open champions – No. 2 **Roger Federer**, No. 6 **Novak Djokovic** and No. 7 **Marin Cilic**. With No. 4 **Alexander Zverev** and No. 10 **David Goffin** on the schedule, all five Top 10 players in this half of the draw are remaining.
- In the first men's match on Arthur Ashe Stadium, five-time champion **Federer** brings a 2-1 head-to-head record against No. 30 seed **Nick Kyrgios**, who is trying to reach the 4R at the US Open for the first time. This is their first meeting in a Grand Slam with their previous three matches decided in a third set tie-break. Federer is 16-1 in US Open 3R matches with his lone defeat in this round coming in his 2000 debut (l. to Ferrero). Kyrgios is 15-27 lifetime vs. Top 10 opponents (1-6 this season) and he's looking to break a six-match losing streak. He is 2-9 in Grand Slam play vs. Top 10 foes with wins over No. 1 Nadal at 2014 Wimbledon and No. 8 Raonic at 2015 Wimbledon.
- In the evening session on Ashe, two-time champion **Djokovic** takes a 12-1 head-to-head advantage against No. 26 **Richard Gasquet**, who has lost the last 10 meetings since his lone win at the 2007 Tennis Masters Cup in Shanghai. Djokovic has compiled a sparkling 29-4 record since a 6-6 start, highlighted by his 13th Grand Slam title at Wimbledon and 31st ATP Masters 1000 title at Cincinnati to become the first player to win the career Golden Masters (all nine Masters 1000 tournaments). Gasquet is 7-23 lifetime against Top 10 opponents in Grand Slam play with three wins coming at the US Open. The 32-year-old Frenchman has not been broken in 29 service games in the first two matches, saving 14 break points. He is 6-1 in 3R matches at the US Open and his best result is the semi-finals in 2013 (l. to eventual champion Nadal).
- On Louis Armstrong Stadium, the top two Germans in the ATP Rankings square off as No. 4 **Zverev** meets No. 34-ranked **Philipp Kohlschreiber**. They have split their previous four meetings with Zverev winning the last two on home soil in 2017 Halle and in May in Munich. Kohlschreiber won the only previous Grand Slam meeting in the 1R at the 2015 US Open in five sets. The 21-year-old #NextGenATP German star leads the ATP World Tour this season with 45 match wins and he is making his first appearance in the 3R here. Kohlschreiber is 3-22 lifetime against Top 10 opponents in Grand Slam play (1-5 at the US Open) and his best win here came over No. 10 Isner in the 3R in 2012. In the evening match, **Cilic** plays #NextGenATP teenager **Alex de Minaur** for the first time. Cilic is 4-4 in 3R matches at the US Open and he's lost in this round the last two years. The 19-year-old Aussie is appearing in his second straight Grand Slam 3R (Wimbledon). He is 0-6 lifetime vs. Top 10 opponents.
- On Grandstand, Aussie **John Millman** and **Mikhail Kukushkin** of Kazakhstan meet for the first time and the winner will advance to the 4R in Flushing Meadows for the first time. In the next match on, No. 13 **Diego Schwartzman** looks for his first win (0-2) against No. 21 and 2014 US Open finalist **Kei Nishikori**.
- On Court 17, No. 17 **Lucas Pouille** plays Portuguese No. 1 **Joao Sousa**, who is trying to reach the 4R in a Grand Slam 4R for the first time. He is 0-5 in 3R matches. Pouille was a quarter-finalist here two years ago. In the next match on, **Jan-Lennard Struff** takes on No. 10 **Goffin**, who has won the previous two meetings in straight sets.

#### 2018 in Review

- Top Aussie is trying to reach 4R at US Open for first time and appearing in 3R for third time. Has a 5-6 career record in Grand Slam 3R matches. Opened on Tuesday night hitting 25 aces (14 double faults) in 75 26 64 62 victory over Albot. and followed with 46 76 63 60 win over Herbert. Has held serve 33 of 38 games (87%), saving 16 of 21 break pts. (76%)
- Captured 4th ATP World Tour singles title and 1st on home soil at Brisbane (d. Dimitrov and Harrison).
- Reached back-to-back SFs on grass at Stuttgart (l. to Federer in 3rd-set TB) and London/Queen's Club (l. to Cilic).
- Defeated 2008 finalist Tsonga to reach Australian Open 4R for 2nd time (l. to Dimitrov).
- Saved 1 MP and hit tournament-record 39 aces to defeat Kudla in Cincinnati 1R (l. to Del Potro in 3R).
- Lost to A. Zverev in ATP Masters 1000 Miami 4R and Davis Cup 1R (GER d. AUS 3-1).
- Won 1st ATP World Tour doubles title at Lyon w/Sock (d. Jebavy/Middelkoop 11-9 in Match TB).
- Withdrew from Rotterdam, Delray Beach, Acapulco, Indian Wells, Estoril, Madrid, Rome and Roland Garros due to right elbow injury. Retired in Atlanta QF vs. Norrie and withdrew from Washington due to hip injury.

#### Career Highlights

- > Finished 3 straight seasons in Top 30 (2015-17). Achieved new career-high ranking 7 times in 2016, peaking at No. 13 to end season as youngest player in Top 20.
- > Captured 4th title on home soil at 2018 Brisbane. Won career-high 3 titles and 39 matches in 2016, including 6 vs. Top 10 players. One of 2 men to win 1st meeting with Nadal, Federer and Djokovic (also Hewitt). Earned 1st win in 6th try over Murray in 2018 London/Queen's Club 1R.

> Defeated No. 1 Nadal to reach 2014 Wimbledon QF as 19-year-old WC ranked 144th. Youngest player to beat No. 1 at a Grand Slam since Nadal at 2005 Roland Garros and lowest-ranked since No. 193 Olhovskiy at 1992 Wimbledon. Saved 9 MPs vs. Gasquet in 2R. Earned WC by winning 2014 Nottingham, GBR Challenger title. Also reached 2015 Australian Open QF after saving 1 MP vs. Seppi in 4R.

> Beat No. 2 Nadal en route to biggest final of career at 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati. Also at ATP Masters 1000 level, advanced to Miami SFs in 2016 and 2017. Lost to Federer in 3 TBs at 2017 Miami after beating him in 3 TBs at 2015 Madrid. Defeated Djokovic for 2nd time in 2 weeks to reach 2017 Indian Wells QF.

> Became World No. 1 junior on 21 January 2013. Won junior singles title at 2013 Australian Open and junior doubles titles at 2012 Roland Garros w/Harris, 2012 Wimbledon w/Harris and 2013 Wimbledon w/Kokkinakis.

### 2018 in Review

- Appearing in 3R for 18th straight time (DNP in 2016) and has 16-1 record in 3R with only loss in 2000 debut (l. to Ferrero). Opened on Tuesday night with a 62 62 64 victory over Nishioka and followed with 75 64 64 win over Paire. Has won 26 of 29 service games (90%), saving 12 of 15 break pts and winning 11 of 29 return games (38%), for season (27%).
- Became oldest World No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings at age 36 on 19 February.
- Owns records for most weeks at No. 1 (310), years since debut at No. 1 (14) and years between stints at No. 1 (5).
- Extended records with 20th Grand Slam title and 30th final at Australian Open (d. Cilic). Tied record with 6th AO title.
- Secured No. 1 ranking with Rotterdam QF win (d. Haase). Went on to win 97th ATP World Tour title (d. Dimitrov).
- Clinched No. 1 most recently with Stuttgart SF win (d. Kyrgios in 3rd-set TB). Went on to win 98th title (d. Raonic).
- Ranked No. 1 for 6 weeks from 19 February-1 April, 1 week from 14-20 May and 1 week from 18-24 June.
- Tied his own record with 34 straight sets won at Wimbledon before squandering 1 MP in QF (l. to Anderson).
- Held in 100 straight service games at ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati (l. to Djokovic in final after being broken 3 times).
- Saved 2 MPs vs. Paire en route to 12th Halle final (l. to Coric).
- Enjoyed career-best 17-0 start before squandering 3 MPs vs. Del Potro in ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells final.
- Fell to Del Potro in 3rd-set TB. Now 1-8 in championship matches decided by final-set TB.
- Also lost 3rd-set TB to No. 175 Kokkinakis in ATP Masters 1000 Miami 2R -- worst loss by World No. 1 since same tournament and round in 2003 (No. 178 Clavet d. No. 1 Hewitt).
- Skipped clay-court season and has not played on surface since 12 May 2016 (l. to Thiem in Rome 3R).

### Career Highlights

> Enjoyed record 310 weeks at No. 1, including record 237 straight from 2 February 2004 to 17 August 2008. Became oldest World No. 1 in 45-year history of ATP Rankings at age 36 on 19 February 2018. Ended 5 seasons as No. 1 (2004-07, 2009), tied with Connors (1974-78) for 2nd-most year-end No. 1 finishes behind Sampras (1993-98).

> Holds Nitto ATP Finals records for titles (6), finals (10), SFs (14), appearances (15) and wins (55), capturing championship in 3 cities (Houston 2003-04, Shanghai 2006-07, London 2010-11) and 5 times with 5-0 record (2003-04, 2006, 2010-11).

> Owns 98 titles, 2nd-most in Open Era behind Connors' 109. Also trails only Connors in wins with 1,167 to American's 1,256. Earned 1,000th victory in 2015 Brisbane final over Raonic. Enjoyed career-long 41-match win streak (2006-07), reached 17 straight finals (2005-06), posted 24-match win streak in finals (2003-05), won 24 straight matches vs. Top 10 (2003-05) and earned record 65 consecutive victories on grass (2003-08). Went 81-4 in 2005 (.953) for highest win percentage since McEnroe went 82-3 in 1984 (.965). Boasts 10 wins vs. World No. 1 and 10 wins from 2 sets down. Never retired in 1,640 matches on tour (1,422 singles and 218 doubles).

> Greatest of all time at Grand Slams with 20 titles in 30 finals and 338 victories overall. One of 8 men to win all 4 majors, securing career Grand Slam at 2009 Roland Garros. Captured record 8th Wimbledon title in 2017. Second-oldest Grand Slam champion in Open Era behind Rosewall (1972 Australian Open). Owns Open Era records for consecutive Grand Slam finals (10), SFs (23) and QFs (36). Won 16 of 27 Grand Slam events from 2003 Wimbledon through 2010 Australian Open, then 1 of 27 from 2010 Roland Garros through 2016 US Open. Owns 27 titles and 359 wins at ATP Masters 1000 events, including Indian Wells/Miami 'Sunshine Double' in 2005-06 and 2017.

> Two-time Olympic medalist, taking gold in doubles at 2008 Beijing w/Wawrinka and silver in singles at 2012 London. Finished 4th in singles at 2000 Sydney. Clinched 2014 Davis Cup title for Switzerland by beating Gasquet for 50th Davis Cup win of career (SUI d. FRA 3-1).

### 2018 in Review

- Has a 10-2 record in 3R US Open matches, winning last 10 appearances in 3R (DNP last year). Won 50th straight Grand Slam 1R match over Fucsovics 63 36 64 60 and followed with 61 63 67 62 win over Sandgren. Has held 32 of 35 service games (91%), saving five of eight break pts. Has won 13 of 35 return games (37%) and for season at 30%.
- Ended career-long 54-week title drought by winning 4th Wimbledon and 13th Grand Slam title overall (d. Anderson).
- As World No. 21, became lowest-ranked Grand Slam champion since No. 44 Gaudio at 2004 Roland Garros.
- Improved to 27-25 vs. Nadal by defeating World No. 1 in Wimbledon SF 10-8 in 5th after 5 hours, 15 minutes.
- Improved to 24-22 vs. Federer by beating World No. 2 for ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati title.

- Became 1st player to win titles at all 9 ATP Masters 1000 events since start of series in 1990.
- Earned 800th career win in London/Queen's Club QF (d. Mannarino), but squandered 1 MP in final (l. to Cilic).
- Advanced to Roland Garros QF-or-better for 9th straight year (l. to Cecchinato in QF).
- Reached ATP Masters 1000 Rome QF-or-better for 12th straight season (l. to Nadal in SF).
- Started year 6-6 with 3 straight losses to Chung in Aus. Open 4R, Daniel in Indian Wells 2R and Paire in Miami 2R.
- Fell to No. 22 in ATP Rankings on 21 May -- lowest since No. 22 on 2 October 2006. Returned to Top 10 on 16 July.
- Underwent surgery on right elbow shortly after Australian Open, which was his 1st tournament in 6 months.

### Career Highlights

- > Ended 4 years as World No. 1 (2011-12, 2014-15). One of 7 players to finish 4+ seasons at No. 1 along with Sampras (6), Connors (5), Federer (5), Lendl (4), McEnroe (4) and Nadal (4). Spent 223 total weeks at No. 1, 5th all-time behind Federer's 310, Sampras' 286, Lendl's 270 and Connors' 268. Finished Top 3 and earned 60+ wins in 10 straight seasons (2007-16).
- > Qualified for Nitto ATP Finals in 10 straight years (2007-16), capturing 5 titles overall and becoming 1st player to sweep 4 straight titles (2008, 2012-15).
- > Owns 70 singles titles, 6th-most in Open Era, including 13 Grand Slams (4th all-time) and 31 ATP Masters 1000s (2nd behind Nadal's 33). Won 2+ titles each year from 2006-18, including all 4 Grand Slam and 9 ATP Masters 1000 events. Only player with titles at all 9 ATP Masters 1000s since start of series in 1990. Enjoyed win streaks of 43 matches overall (2010-11), 31 matches at ATP Masters 1000s (2011) and 30 matches at Grand Slams (2015-16). One of 3 active players with 800+ victories (also Federer, Nadal), earning 800th win in 2018 London/Queen's Club QF (d. Mannarino). Owns winning records against Nadal (27-25), Federer (24-22) and Murray (25-11).
- > Swept titles at 2015 Wimbledon, 2015 US Open, 2016 Australian Open and 2016 Roland Garros, becoming 8th player to complete career Grand Slam and 3rd to hold all 4 major titles at one time (also Budge, Laver). Tied with Emerson and Federer for most Australian Open titles in history (6). Loss to Querrey in 2016 Wimbledon 3R snapped streaks of 28 QFs, 9 SFs, 6 finals and 4 titles in a row at Grand Slams.
- > Won 2008 Beijing Olympics bronze medal, then led Serbia to 2010 Davis Cup title with straight-set wins over Simon and Monfils (SRB d. FRA 3-2). Lost in 2012 London Olympics bronze medal match and 2013 Davis Cup final, despite defeating Stepanek and Berdych in straight sets (CZE d. SRB 3-2).

### 2018 in Review

- Has beaten Sugita 63 61 63 in 1R and Djere 63 76 63 for 300th career hard court win. Trying to reach 4R for first time since QF in 2015. Has not been broken in 29 service games, saving 14 break pts, and has a 6-1 record in 3R at US Open.
- Became 1st Frenchman with 500 career wins when he beat M. Zverev in Monte-Carlo 3R (l. to A. Zverev in QF).
- Won 15th title -- all ATP World Tour 250s -- at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Chardy).
- Advanced to 6th consecutive Montpellier final, falling to 3-3 in title matches (d. Goffin, l. to Pouille).
- Also advanced to Bastad final (l. to Fognini).
- Suffered 9th straight loss to Federer in Australian Open 3R. Fell to 0-16 vs. Nadal in Roland Garros 3R.
- Dropped to No. 38 in ATP Rankings on 2 April -- lowest since No. 38 on 6 September 2010.
- Defeated Haase to help defending champion France beat The Netherlands 3-1 in Davis Cup 1R.
- Retired in Rotterdam 1R vs. Herbert due to groin injury and withdrew from Indian Wells due to knee injury.
- Conceded walkover to Jarry in Hamburg 2R and withdrew from Kitzbuhel and Toronto due to left hip injury.

### Career Highlights

- > Finished 4 seasons in Top 10 (2007, 2012-13, 2015), qualifying for Nitto ATP Finals in 2007 and 2013. Broke into Top 10 and achieved career-high No. 7 on 9 July 2007 after reaching Wimbledon SF. Ended 2002 as World No. 1 junior.
- > Owns 15-16 record in finals with all 15 titles coming at ATP World Tour 250 events. Reached 6 straight Montpellier finals (2013-18), winning title in 2013, 2015 and 2016. Defeated M. Zverev in 2018 ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo 3R to become 1st Frenchman with 500 career wins. Earned 20+ victories in 14 straight seasons (2005-18).

> Defeated Top 5 players in 5 sets to reach SFs at 2007 Wimbledon (d. Roddick), 2013 US Open (d. Ferrer) and 2015 Wimbledon (d. Wawrinka). Won 2004 Roland Garros title w/Golovin in only mixed doubles appearance of career. Captured junior titles at 2002 Roland Garros and US Open.

> Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 finals at 2005 Hamburg as Q, 2006 Toronto and 2012 Toronto. Won ATP debut at 2002 ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo as 15-year-old Q (d. Squillari). Remains youngest match winner since Tommy Ho, 15, at 1988 Rye Brook. Qualified again at Monte-Carlo in 2005, beating No. 1 Federer in QF for biggest win of career.
