MUBADALA CITI DC OPEN TALKING POINTS

- ATP Tour returns to Washington for 56th edition of **Mubadala Citi DC Open** with American No. 1 **Taylor Fritz** leading the field, as he returns to hard courts after going 13-2 during grass season, picking up titles in Stuttgart and Eastbourne and advancing to Wimbledon SF. He bids to become 2nd consecutive American men's Washington champion after **Sebastian Korda** last year broke American men's singles title drought since 2007.
- Joining Fritz in men's field are 15 other Americans, including World No. 8 **Ben Shelton**, who enters Washington on a career-high after Top 10 debut in June before reaching Wimbledon QF. Last year's semi-finalist attempts to capture his 2nd title at ATP 500 level after 2023 Tokyo. Maryland-native and World No. 11 **Frances Tiafoe** also advanced to SF for 1st time last year and will look for biggest title of his career this week.
- There are five Top 10 players in the draw, including World No. 7 **Lorenzo Musetti**, who is attempting to join countryman **Jannik Sinner** (in 2021), on the men's champions list in tournament history, while World No. 9 **Holger Rune** and World No. 10 **Andrey Rublev** bid to join Alcaraz as only men to win multiple ATP 500 titles this season after the Dane won Barcelona title on clay in April, while Rublev triumphed in Doha in February.
- There are two former champions in the draw, as wild card **Daniel Evans** returns for first time since winning 2023 title after skipping last year's edition to play Paris Olympics men's doubles with Andy Murray in countryman's last event of career. 2016 champion **Gael Monfils**, who also reached 2007 SF and 2011 final, is the oldest player in the draw and will also team up with 2-time singles champion **Nick Kyrgios** in doubles.
- Last year's champion **Korda** was forced to withdraw due to calf injury, 12 months after winning the title to join 1992 champion, his father, Petr, as only father-son duo to win the same title in Open Era. No. 7 seed **Alex de Minaur** (2018), No. 8 seed **Daniil Medvedev** (2019) and No. 9 seed **Flavio Cobolli** (2024) return as former finalists, as well as WC **Mackenzie McDonald** (2021) and **Yoshihito Nishioka** (2022).

Reilly Opelka (USA) vs [Q] Murphy Cassone (USA)

First Meeting

Reilly Opelka | Age: 27 | World No. 74 | Career-High No. 17 | 2025: 18-14 (Brisbane Final) | Event: 4-6 (2021-22 3R)
 > Former Wimbledon junior champion became No. 1 American in June 2021 and achieved career-high No. 17 in February 2022 before undergoing hip surgery later that year.
 > Defeated Isner for 4th ATP 250 title on American soil at 2022 Houston after beating him 7-6(7) 7-6(22) en route to 2022 Dallas title, winning longest tiebreak in ATP Tour history (since 1990).
 > At 2020 Delray Beach, saved 1 MP vs. Raonic and defeated Nishioka on same day to win 2nd title.
 > At 2019 New York, saved 6 MPs and hit 43 aces vs. Isner in SF, then hit 43 more aces vs. Schnur in final to win 1st title.
 > Upset No. 3 Tsitsipas at 2021 Toronto for biggest win of career and to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 final and defeated No. 7 Djokovic en route to 2025 Brisbane final to break Serbian's 34-match winning streak vs. Americans.

NOTE: Opelka is 4-0 in Washington opening rounds since 2019 (0-2 in 2016-17) and plays in his first hard court event since defeating No. 12 Rune to advance to Miami 3R in March. He is on an 8-match winning streak vs. players ranked outside Top 100 on tour-level since losing to No. 104 van Rijthoven in 2022 Wimbledon 2R.

Murphy Cassone | Age: 22 | World No. 185 (Career-High) | 2025: 0-0 | Washington: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Ranked outside Top 800 in August 2024, entered Top 500 in October 2024 and Top 200 in June 2025, achieving career-high No. 185 in July 2025.
 > Makes ATP Tour debut at 2025 Washington as Q after wins over Kwiatkowski in Q1 and Hijikata in Q2.
 > Owns 30-24 Challenger record (1-0 in finals), highlighted by run to 2024 Calgary title as Q after saving 5 MPs vs. Seggerman in 1R.
 > Played college tennis for Arizona State University, becoming 3-time All-American, including first from Arizona State in men's tennis since 1995 during his sophomore season.
 > His tennis idol is Tallon Griekspoor and attributes his early success and inspiration to Dutchman's own success at ATP Challenger Tour level in 2021.

NOTE: Cassone is making his ATP Tour debut after defeating No. 82 Hijikata via RET in final round of qualifying for first Top 100 win of career. Now, 22-year-old seeks biggest win of career to jump to No. 161 on [PIF ATP Live Rankings](#).

JOHN HARRIS

[WC] Ethan Quinn (USA) vs Christopher O'Connell (AUS)

First Meeting

Ethan Quinn | Age: 21 | World No. 86 | Career-High No. 82 | 2025: 8-10 (Roland Garros 3R) | Event: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Former Top 20 junior began 2025 season as No. 202, breaking into Top 200 in January and Top 100 in June, earning career-high No. 82 soon after reaching Roland Garros 3R as Q.
 > Defeated Mukund in ATP Tour debut at 2023 Newport as No. 434-ranked WC and earned 2nd ATP Tour win at 2024 Newport with win over Polmans in 1R.
 > Owns 42-40 Challenger record (1-2 in finals) and captured 1st title at 2024 Champaign without losing a set.
 > In 2023, became 5th University of Georgia player, first since 2002, to win NCAA singles national crown after saving 4 MPs to beat Michigan's Styler in final.
 > Named 2023 ITA All-American in singles and doubles after finishing ranked No. 2 in singles and No. 3 in doubles w/Trent Bryde.
 > Earned a WC into 2022 US Open qualifying in singles (d. Escobedo, l. to Delbonis) and main draw in doubles after reaching singles final and winning doubles title at USTA Boys' 18 National Championships.

NOTE: Quinn is 5-1 in his tour-level opening rounds since April, lone loss to No. 2 Alcaraz in Barcelona 1R. He looks for 3rd ATP Tour win on hard courts after wins over No. 669 T. Svajda in Dallas 1R and No. 113 Boyer in Delray Beach 1R, both in February this year (0-6 vs. Top 100 on tour-level on hard courts in career).

Christopher O'Connell | Age: 31 | World No. 77 | Career-High No. 53 | 2025: 7-15 (Bucharest QF) | Event: 1-1 ('24 2R)
 > Unranked to begin 2019, broke into Top 200 in September 2019 and ended 2022 season at No. 78, before reaching career-high No. 53 in September 2023 after winning 5th Challenger title at Shanghai without losing a set.
 > Advanced to 1st ATP Tour SF at 2022 San Diego after reaching 1st ATP Tour QF at 2021 Atlanta as Q.

- > Defeated No. 13 Schwartzman for biggest win of career and to reach 2022 Australian Open 3R as WC and No. 16 Zverev to advance to 2nd ATP Tour SF at 2023 Munich.
- > Played 108 main draw and qualifying singles matches across all tours in 2019, posting 50-11 record on ITF World Tennis Tour with 3 titles in 10 finals.
- > Stopped playing tennis in 2018 due to many injuries to clean boats with his brother and get away from tennis, deciding to come back to the sport in 2019.

NOTE: O'Connell seeks first ATP Tour win since defeating Ugo Carabelli in ATP Masters 1000 Madrid 1R in April (l. to Fritz in 2R). He made his Washington debut last year, defeating Mayot in 1R, before losing to Nakashima in 2R.

[WC] Daniel Evans (GBR) vs Zizou Bergs (BEL)

First Meeting

Daniel Evans | Age: 35 | World No. 144 | Career-High No. 21 | 2025: 5-5 (Eastbourne QF) | Event: 9-4 (2023 Title)

- > Former Top-10 junior was unranked in April 2018 before becoming No. 1 Brit for 1st time in October 2019 and achieving career-high No. 21 in August 2023 after winning 2nd ATP Tour title at Washington.
- > Did not drop a set en route to 1st ATP Tour title as a 30-year-old at 2021 Melbourne-2.
- > Rallied from 2 sets down and won 5th-set TB vs. Popyrin to reach 2nd Grand Slam 4R of career at 2021 US Open, then beat Khachanov in 2024 US Open 1R in longest match in tournament history (5H 35M).
- > Reached ATP Masters 1000 SFs at 2021 Monte Carlo (d. No. 1 Djokovic in 3R) and 2022 Montreal.
- > Advanced to ATP Masters 1000 doubles finals at 2021 Miami w/N. Skupski, 2021 Monte Carlo w/N. Skupski and 2022 Montreal w/Peers.
- > Fell outside Top 100 after opting not to defend Washington title to play Paris Olympics doubles w/A. Murray in former World No. 1's final event, saving 5 MPs in 1R and 2 MPs in 2R to reach quarter-finals.

NOTE: Evans is on a 5-match winning streak in Washington after winning 2023 title, defeating Griekspoor in final. 35-year-old earned all 5 tour-level wins this season on grass and looks for first ATP Tour win on hard courts since defeating No. 89 Daniel in Almaty 1R last October.

Zizou Bergs | Age: 26 | World No. 52 | Career-High No. 49 | 2025: 21-16 (2 Finals) | Washington: 0-0 (Debut)

- > Former World No. 12 junior broke into Top 200 in July 2021, Top 100 in June 2024 and achieved career-high No. 49 in May 2025 after reaching 1st ATP Tour final in Auckland as Q earlier in the season.
- > Advanced to 2024 Roland Garros 3R as Q and upset No. 9 Rublev for biggest win of career to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 3R at 2025 Miami.
- > Defeated Ramos-Vinolas for 1st ATP Tour win at 2020 Antwerp as 528th-ranked WC before advancing to ATP Tour finals at 2025 Auckland and 2025 's-Hertogenbosch.
- > Earned 2022 Wimbledon WC after defeating former World No. 8 Sock for 2022 Ilkley Challenger title as Q.
- > Also won Challenger titles at 2021 St. Petersburg-1 as Q, 2021 Lille as Q, 2021 Almaty, 2023 & 2024 Tallahassee, 2023 Drummondville and 2023 Yokkaichi.

NOTE: Bergs is on a 4-match losing streak since advancing to his 2nd ATP Tour final in 's-Hertogenbosch in June. 26-year-old is 18-3 after winning 1st set this season and plays in his first hard court event since defeating No. 9 Rublev for 1st Top 10 win of career to reach Miami 3R in March.

Yoshihito Nishioka | Age: 21 | World No. 89 | Career-High No. 24 | 2025: 7-9 (Dallas QF) | Event: 8-7 (2022 Final)

- > Japanese left-hander achieved career-high No. 24 in June 2023 after advancing to Grand Slam 4R at 2023 Australian Open and Roland Garros for the 1st time in career.
- > Earned biggest win of career over No. 2 Ruud en route to 2nd ATP Tour title at 2022 Seoul.
- > Saved 2 MPs vs. Shapovalov en route to 1st title at 2018 Shenzhen as 171st-ranked Q.
- > On US soil, rallied from a set down 3 times en route to 2020 Delray Beach final, saved 1 MP vs. de Minaur en route to 2022 Washington final and won 3rd ATP Tour title at 2024 Atlanta.
- > Defeated countryman and World No. 5 Nishikori en route to 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati QF as Q.

NOTE: Nishioka seeks first win in Washington since defeating No. 8 Rublev in 2022 SF to advance to biggest of his 6 ATP Tour finals (l. to Kyrgios). Japanese No. 2 is on a 7-match losing streak (including ATP qualifying and Challenger level) since defeating Vukic in Delray Beach 1R in February (W/O to eventual champion Kecmanovic in 2R).

Jenson Brooksby | Age: 24 | World No. 102 | Career-High No. 33 | 2025: 13-8 (Houston Title) | Event: 4-2 (2021 SF)
> Achieved career-high No. 33 in June 2022, then defeated 6-time champion Isner at 2022 Atlanta en route to 3rd ATP 250 final on home soil.
> Captured 1st ATP Tour title in Houston as Q, after saving 1 MP vs. Gomez in qualifying, 3 MPs vs. Tabilo in 2R and 1 MP vs. Paul in SF and as No. 507 became 3rd-lowest-ranked champion in ATP Tour history (since 1990).
> Advanced to 1st ATP Tour QF, SF and final in his grass-court debut at 2021 Newport, becoming 2nd-youngest finalist at age 20 in 46-year tournament history (Rusedski, 19, in 1993).
> Reached 2021 US Open 4R as 20-year-old WC, becoming youngest American in US Open 4R since Roddick, 20, in 2002.
> Defeated No. 3 Ruud for biggest win of career and to reach 2023 Australian Open 3R.
> Qualified at 2019 US Open and ended former World No. 4 Berdych's career for 1st tour-level win, then missed entire 2020 season due to toe injury.

NOTE: Brooksby is making his 3rd Washington appearance after reaching 2021 SF (l. to Sinner) and losing to Nishioka in 2022 1R. He is playing in his first tour-level event on home soil since winning his 1st ATP Tour title in Houston in April earlier this year.
