NEXO DALLAS OPEN TALKING POINTS

- ATP Tour returns to Dallas, the only indoor tour-level event held in the United States and is headlined by Americans World No. 7 **Taylor Fritz** and World No. 9 **Ben Shelton**, joined by countrymen No. 5 seed **Tommy Paul**, No. 6 seed **Learner Tien**, and No. 8 seed **Frances Tiafoe**. Canadian **Denis Shapovalov**, who captured biggest title of career in Dallas last year, returns as No. 7 seed and will attempt to defend his title.
- No. 1 seed **Fritz** leads the charge of 17 Americans in the main draw with home players taking up 5 of the 8 seeded spots. Fritz lost to the eventual champion in each of his last 2 Dallas appearances (2023 SF vs. Wu and 2025 2R vs. Shapovalov). No. 1 American looks for his biggest title since winning 2022 Tokyo and bids to become the highest-ranked champion at the event since No. 3 **Andy Roddick** in 2005, held in San Jose.
- 2024 champion and No. 5 seed **Paul** reached 4R at Australian Open last month, falling to eventual champion **Carlos Alcaraz** and now looks to advance to his 1st ATP Tour final since winning the 2024 Stockholm title. Last year's champion **Shapovalov** upset four seeded players en route to the trophy and earned 3 Top 10 wins, defeating No. 4 Fritz in 2R, No. 9 Paul in SF and No. 5 Ruud in the championship match.
- No. 2 seed **Shelton** aims to improve on his 2024 SF run (l. to **Paul**) after reaching the quarterfinals at the Australian Open last month (lost to **Jannik Sinner** for the 2nd consecutive year). Meanwhile, No. 4 seed **Flavio Cobolli** is making his debut at the event, looking for his first hard court title and seeking 2nd ATP 500 trophy after lifting the biggest title of his career in Hamburg last year.
- Two-time champion **Reilly Opelka** and 2022 runner-up **Jenson Brooksby** are also in the main draw alongside Southern Methodist University's **Trevor Svajda** as a WC. Trevor's brother, **Zachary Svajda**, joins him in the main draw after qualifying, making them only the first pair of brothers to compete in singles of the same edition in this tournament since **John** and **Patrick McEnroe** in 1988, then held in San Francisco.

Brandon Nakashima | Age: 24 | World No. 29 (Career-High) | 2026: 4-2 (Brisbane Final) | Dallas: 1-2 (2022 2R)
 > Former World No. 3 junior broke into Top 50 in July 2022 and achieved career-high No. 29 in May 2025 soon after earning 100th career win en route to biggest SF of his career in Acapulco.
 > Defeated countryman Giron to win 1st ATP Tour title in hometown of San Diego in 2022 and ended season on 16-1 run in tiebreaks.
 > Played in back-to-back ATP Tour finals at Los Cabos and Atlanta as 19-year-old in 2021, becoming youngest American to reach multiple finals since Roddick in 2001-02.
 > Returned to Milan and went 5-0 to capture 2022 Next Gen ATP Finals title after reaching SF in 2021.
 > Reached Roland Garros 3R, Wimbledon 4R and US Open 3R in 2022, highlighted by first Top 20 wins of career over No. 16 Shapovalov in Wimbledon 2R and No. 19 Dimitrov in US Open 2R.

NOTE: Nakashima is one of 17 Americans in the field, making his 3rd appearance at the event and seeks his first win here since 2022. Opened the season by reaching his 4th ATP Tour final, 1st since 2022, in Brisbane (l. to Medvedev).

Mattia Bellucci | Age: 24 | World No. 72 | Career-High No. 63 | 2026: 0-1 (Australian Open 1R) | Dallas: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Began 2022 season as No. 681 on PIF ATP Rankings, broke in Top 500 in April, Top 200 in October and ended the year as No. 154, before breaking in Top 100 in November 2024 and achieving career-high No. 63 in July 2025.
 > Advanced to 1st ATP Tour QF at 2024 Atlanta as Q and defeated No. 7 Medvedev and No. 12 Tsitsipas for biggest wins of career en route to 1st SF at 2025 Rotterdam.
 > Made tour-level debut at 2023 Australian Open as Q, before qualifying for Roland Garros, Wimbledon and US Open in 2024, defeating former champion Wawrinka in US Open 1R for 1st Grand Slam win.
 > Owns 68-64 Challenger record (4-3 in finals), winning titles at 2022 Saint-Tropez as No. 275-ranked Q, 2022 Vilnius in back-to-back weeks, 2023 Cassis, and 2025 Sumter.

NOTE: Bellucci is seeking first ATP Tour win of the season and first since defeating Walton at ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai in October. He reached Manama Challenger SF last week (l. to Jacquet) and is 3-9 opponent vs. Top 30, with two of those wins coming indoors over No. 7 Medvedev and No. 12 Tsitsipas en route to Rotterdam SF last year.

[Q] Zachary Svajda (USA) vs [3] Alejandro Davidovich Fokina (ESP) First Meeting

Zachary Svajda | Age: 23 | World No. 109 | Career-High No. 102 | 2026: 0-1 (Aus. Open 1R) | Dallas: 0-2 ('23-24 1R)
 > Secured 1st ranking point at age 15 in 2018, broke into Top 200 in September 2023 after winning his 2nd Challenger title at Cary and achieved career-high No. 102 in August 2024.
 > Defeated Cecchinato for 1st tour-level win at 2021 US Open as 18-year-old WC and Piros at 2025 US Open as Q, before taking a set off 4-time champion Djokovic in 2R.
 > Squandered 2-set lead vs. Lorenzi in tour-level debut at 2019 US Open as 16-year-old WC, becoming youngest player to compete at event since Young, 16, in 2005.

- > Owns 81-54 Challenger record (7-1 in finals), highlighted by defeating future-Top 10 player Shelton for 1st Challenger title at 2022 Tiburon and former-Top 20 player Korda for latest title at 2026 San Diego.
- > Earned US Open WCs by winning 2019 and 2021 USTA Boys' 18s National Championships.
- > Lost to 2018 USTA Boys' 18s champion Brooksby in 2021 Cleveland Challenger 1R and 2017 USTA Boys' 18s champion Kypson in 2021 Wichita ITF QF.

NOTE: Svajda is 0-4 vs. Top 20, looking for the biggest win of career and first tour-level win since defeating Piros at US Open in August (l. to Djokovic in 2R). He is on a 15-match winning streak on the Challenger Tour highlighted by a recent title in San Diego two weeks ago (d. Korda). Qualified to join brother, Trevor, in main draw, becoming first American brothers to play in the same ATP Tour event since Christian and Ryan Harrison at 2021 Delray Beach.

Alejandro Davidovich Fokina | Age: 26 | World No. 14 (Career-High) | 2026: 4-3 (Adelaide SF) | Dallas: 1-1 (2025 2R)

- > Broke into Top 20 in July 2025 and achieved career-high No. 14 in November 2025 after earning advancing to 5th ATP Tour final in Basel after previously peaking at No. 21 in 2023.
- > Broke Djokovic 9 times in Monte-Carlo 2R win, setting record for most breaks of Djokovic in a best-of-3-set match to defeat then-World No. 1 en route to 1st ATP Tour final of career at 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Monte-Carlo.
- > Advanced to 1st Grand Slam QF at 2021 Roland Garros and 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2021 Monte-Carlo, highlighted by 5-set win over Ruud in Roland Garros 3R.
- > In 2025, advanced to 4 ATP Tour finals, including Delray Beach, where he held 2 championship points vs. Kecmanovic, and Washington, where he squandered 3 championship points vs. de Minaur.
- > Ended junior career as World No. 2 after winning Wimbledon boys' singles title and posting 20-1 record in 2017.

NOTE: Davidovich Fokina is making his 3rd appearance at the event, seeking 2nd win after defeating Holt in 1R last year before losing to Arnaldi in 2R. He aims for 2nd indoor final after Basel in October and 1st ATP Tour title of career.

Terence Atmane (FRA) vs [8] Frances Tiafoe (USA)

First Meeting

Terence Atmane | Age: 24 | World No. 64 | Career-High No. 61 | 2026: 0-2 (Adelaide, Aus Open 1R) | Dallas: 0-1 (2024 1R)

- > Broke into Top 200 in September 2023, before securing Top 100 debut in August 2025 after posting two Top 10 wins en route to ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati SF as Q, achieving career-high No. 61 in September.
- > Made ATP Tour debut at 2023 Zhuhai as Q and beat Thompson at 2023 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai for 1st win.
- > Qualified to make Grand Slam debut at 2024 Australian Open, taking a set off eventual finalist Medvedev in 1R.
- > Went 11-1 in three-week span at Challenger events in September 2023, earning 1st final and title at Zhangjiagang after saving 6 MPs vs. Sun in 1R and 2nd title at Guangzhou, saving 3 MPs vs. Polmans in the final.
- > Also captured Challenger titles in Busan and Guangzhou and went 35-18 on Challenger level in 2023, including 19-5 record in tie-breaks in Challenger events that year.

NOTE: Atmane aims to break 6-match losing streak and earn first win since September (d. Zhang in Beijing 1R) and first ATP Tour win indoors (0-4). He is 4-6 vs. Top 30 opponents, seeking first win since defeating No. 22 Cobolli, No. 4 Fritz and No. 9 Rune en route to his 1st ATP Tour SF at ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati last August.

Frances Tiafoe | Age: 28 | World No. 30 | Career-High No. 10 | 2026: 3-2 (Aus Open 3R) | Dallas: 5-7 ('18, '23-24 QF)

- > Former World No. 2 junior achieved career-high No. 10 in June 2023 after lifting 3rd title in Stuttgart, saving 1 MP vs. Struff in the final to own ATP Tour titles on all three surfaces.
- > Joined Fritz in Top 10 to be 1st American duo in Top 10 of PIF ATP Rankings since Fish and Isner in May 2012.
- > Defeated 4-time champion Nadal en route to 2022 US Open SF, becoming that event's 1st American men's semi-finalist since Roddick in 2006 and returned to US Open SF in 2024, losing to Fritz in all-American match.
- > Rallied from 3-5 in third set and saved 2 MPs vs. Rune to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 final at 2024 Cincinnati.
- > Won 1st ATP Tour title as 20-year-old at 2018 Delray Beach and remains youngest American champion since Roddick, 19, at 2002 Houston and 2nd ATP Tour title at 2023 Houston.
- > Parents emigrated from Sierra Leone in 1996 and father was Head of Maintenance at Junior Tennis Champions Center in Maryland, where Frances and his twin brother Franklin trained as kids.

NOTE: Tiafoe is making his 8th appearance at this event (2016-17 in Memphis, 2018-19 in New York, 2023-25 in Dallas), aiming to extend his spotless opening round record in Dallas (3-0). 28-year-old is looking for the biggest title of his career this week, previously reaching ATP 500 finals at 2021 Vienna and 2022 Tokyo.

Michael Zheng | Age: 19 | World No. 151 | Career-High No. 148 | 2026: 1-1 (Australian Open 2R) | Dallas: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Former Top 30 junior began 2025 season as No. 759 and broke into Top 500 in June and Top 200 in October, achieving career-high No. 148 in February 2026.
 > Qualified for Grand Slam main draw debut at 2026 Australian Open after saving a MP vs. Klein in final round of qualifying and earning first tour-level win vs. No. 53 Korda in 1R.
 > Went on a 15-match winning streak on Challenger level between August and September last year to capture titles in Chicago, Columbus and Tiburon.
 > Peaked at No. 22 in junior rankings, highlighted by run to 2022 Wimbledon boys' singles final (l. to Poljicak).
 > Senior at Columbia University is a 2024 and 2025 NCAA men's singles champion after runner-up finish in 2023, becoming first back-to-back NCAA champion since Johnson in 2011-12.

NOTE: Zheng qualified for his first Grand Slam main draw at Australian Open last month and earned 1st tour-level win against Korda (l. to Moutet in 2R). He is 18-2 on Challenger level since August, highlighted by 3 consecutive titles.

Sebastian Korda | Age: 25 | World No. 53 | Career-High No. 15 | 2026: 2-3 (Brisbane QF) | Dallas: 0-0 (Debut)
 > Achieved career-high No. 15 in August 2024, joining Petr Korda (No. 2 in 1998) to become only father-son duo to rank inside Top 20 in PIF ATP Rankings history (since 1973).
 > Earned biggest wins of career en route to ATP Masters 1000 SFs over No. 3 Medvedev at 2023 Shanghai and No. 4 Zverev at 2024 Montreal.
 > Did not drop a set en route to 2021 Parma title and captured 2024 Washington title, 32 years after his father, Petr, won in 1992, becoming 1st father-son duo to win the same ATP Tour event.
 > Advanced to 2020 Roland Garros 4R as Q and 2021 Wimbledon 4R, becoming 3rd men's player in Open Era to reach 4R in debut at both events (Borg in 1973, Pernfors in 1986).
 > Became World No. 1 junior by winning 2018 Australian Open boys' singles title 20 years after his father won Australian Open men's singles title.
