Format: Round robin format with 8 players/teams divided into two groups of four. The seeds will be determined based on the Pepperstone ATP Race to Turin standings as of Monday, 6 November. All singles matches shall be the best of three tie-break sets, including the final. All doubles matches shall be two tie-break sets (no ad) and a Match Tie-break.

Draw: The top seed for singles and doubles will be placed in the Green Group. The second seed for singles and doubles will be placed in the Red Group. Players/teams seeded 3 and 4, 5 and 6, 7 and 8 will then be drawn in pairs with the first drawn placed in for singles and for doubles in the Green Group. The round robin will determine the four players/teams for the semifinals with the format thereafter being an elimination competition. The winner of each group (best overall record) will be placed in separate semi-final brackets, with the top player/team in the Green Group playing the runner-up for singles/doubles in the Red Group and vice versa. If two or more players/teams are tied after the round robin matches, the ties will be broken by the Semi-final Qualifying Procedure (on pages 7-8).

- The 54th edition of the Nitto ATP Finals – and third at the Pala Alpitour in Turin – begins with Green Group action Sunday with reigning champion and six-time winner World No. 1 **Novak Djokovic** making his 16th tournament appearance against first-time qualifier **Holger Rune**. Djokovic comes in on an 18-match winning streak. In the day session, local favorite No. 4 **Jannik Sinner** takes on 2019 Nitto ATP Finals champion **Stefanos Tsitsipas**, who owns a 5-2 Lexus ATP Head2Head record, including 2-1 on hard courts.
- Djokovic is one win away from clinching year-end No. 1 in the Pepperstone ATP Rankings for an on-going record 8th time (2011-12, '14-15, '18, '20-21). He meets Rune for the 5th time (tied 2-2) and they have had three-set battles in their last three meetings, including most recently on 3 November in the quarter-finals at ATP Masters 1000 Paris where the Serb prevailed 7-5 6-7(3) 6-4 in the quarter-finals en route to the title.
- Rune and fellow 20-year-old **Carlos Alcaraz** are making their first appearance in the Nitto ATP Finals. They are the first 20-and-under duo to participate in the season finale since 2000 Lisbon where Lleyton Hewitt (19) and Marat Safin (20) made their debut. Alcaraz qualified last year but withdrew due to injury.
- Djokovic eyes a solo record seventh Nitto ATP Finals title in his 16th appearance at the year-end championships.

- Sinner**, who competed as an alternate two years ago in the Nitto ATP Finals, going 1-1, has put together a career-best season with four ATP Tour titles, including his first ATP Masters 1000 crown in Toronto. He has won a personal-high 57 matches (most by an Italian man in Open Era) and an 8-5 record vs. Top 10 opponents. He also compiled a sparkling 13-1 indoor record (most wins on ATP Tour this season). At No. 4, he is on course to become the first Italian to finish in the Top 5 in the 50-year history of the Pepperstone ATP Rankings.
- Tsitsipas**, who captured his biggest career title (of 10) in his debut at the 2019 Nitto ATP Finals in London, is making his fifth straight tournament appearance (6-6 record). The 25-year-old Greek native is looking to break a three-match losing streak in opening round robin matches. He is 11-4 indoors this season and in his last three tournaments he advanced to the semi-finals in Antwerp, Vienna and ATP Masters 1000 Paris.

- There are four former champions in the field for the second time in three years with **Djokovic, Daniil Medvedev, Tsitsipas and Alexander Zverev** (fifth time in tournament history). On Monday in Red Group play, Alcaraz takes on Zverev and in the evening session Medvedev meets boy-hood friend Andrey Rublev.

- This year's doubles field is extremely strong with three teams with five titles this season, all in the Green Group: No. 1 **Ivan Dodig** and **Austin Krajicek**, No. 4 **Santiago Gonzalez** and **Edouard Roger-Vasselin** and No. 7 **Maximo Gonzalez** and **Andres Molteni**. The reigning champions are No. 6 **Rajeev Ram** and **Joe Salisbury**.
- There are four teams making their Nitto ATP Finals debut: No. 3 **Rohan Bopanna** and **Matthew Ebden**, **S. Gonzalez** and **Roger-Vasselin**, **M. Gonzalez** and **Molteni** along with Australian Open champions **Rinky Hijikata** and **Jason Kubler**. All but Bopanna and Roger-Vasselin are appearing in their season finale debut.
- Year-end No. 1 in the Pepperstone ATP Doubles Team Rankings is up for grabs with five teams in contention. No. 1 Dodig/Krajicek have 6,330 points and No. 5 Granollers/Zeballos have 5,127 points. There are 1,500 points available if a team goes undefeated (5-0). The year-end No. 1 individual ranking is also at stake with 8 players all with a mathematical shot. No. 1 Krajicek has 7,120 points and No. 8 Bopanna has 5,990 points. Bopanna, at 43, is the oldest player to participate in Nitto ATP Finals history (since 1970).

LET'S MEET AGAIN - PLAYING SAME OPPONENT TWICE

In the history of the year-end finale, 19 times singles finalists have met twice in the same year-end championships since it first occurred in Houston in 1976. Federer has been involved five times and Djokovic three times. In 11 of the previous 19 occasions, the player who lost the round robin match came back to win in the final, with Alexander Zverev doing it the last two times in 2018 and 2021.

SEMI-FINAL QUALIFYING PROCEDURE

The final standings of each group shall be determined by the first of the following methods that apply:

a) Greatest number of wins;

b) Greatest number of matches played;

Comment: 2-1 won-loss record beats a 2-0 won-loss record; a 1-2 record beats a 1-0 record.

c) Head-to-head results if only two (2) players are tied,

d) If three (3) players are tied, then:

i) If three (3) players each have one (1) win, a player having played less than all three (3) matches is automatically eliminated and the player advancing to the single elimination competition is the winner of the match-up of the two (2) players tied with 1-2 records; or

ii) Highest percentage of sets won; or

iii) Highest percentage of games won; or

iv) The player positions on the Pepperstone ATP Rankings as of the Monday after the last ATP Tour tournament of the calendar year.

v) If (i), (ii), (iii) or (iv) produce one (1) superior player (first place), or one (1) inferior player (third place), and the two (2) remaining players are tied, the tie between those two (2) players shall be broken by head-to-head record.

Comment 1: 1 player has 3 wins and the other 3 players have 1 win. Of the 3 players with 1 win, 1 player has only played in 2 matches while the other 2 players have played 3 matches. The player who has only played 2 matches is eliminated and then the 2 remaining players revert back to head-to-head results with the winner of their match advancing to the semi-finals.

Comment 2: 1 player has 3 wins and the other 3 players have 1 win and they all have played 3 matches.

The tie-break for % of sets won has 1 player with a better % than the other two. This player advances to the semi-final round.

Comment 3: 3 players have 2 wins and the other player has 0 wins. The player with 0 wins is eliminated. Of the 3 players with 2 wins, they are ordered by their % of sets won. This produces a 1, 2 & 3 order and the players finishing 1 and 2 move to the semifinal round and the player finishing 3 in % of sets won is eliminated. The player with the best % of sets won is the winner of the group.

Comment 4: 3 players have 2 wins and the other player has 0 wins. The player with 0 wins is eliminated. Of the 3 players with 2 wins, 1 player's sets won-loss is 5-2 for 71.43%; the other 2 players both have a 4-3 record in sets for 57.14%. In this case there is 1 superior player (71.43%) and the remaining 2 players are tied; it now reverts to the head to head result of the 2 remaining players with the winning player advancing as group runner-up.

Comment 5: 3 players have 2 wins and the other player has 0 wins. The player with 0 wins is eliminated. Of the 3 players with 2 wins, 2 have set won-loss records of 5-3 (62.5%) while the other player is 4-3 (57.14%). In this case we have 1 inferior player (57.14%) and he is eliminated. The remaining two players both advance to the semi-finals with the winner of their head-to-head match advancing as the group winner.

Comment 6: 3 players have 2 wins and the other player has 0 wins. The player with 0 wins is eliminated. Of the 3 players with 2 wins, all have played 3 matches and all 3 have set won-loss records of 5-4 (55.56%). In this case we move to % of games won. The % of games won breaks down like this: 44-40 for 52.38%, 45-43 for 51.14% and 44-43 for 50.57%. This produces a 1, 2 and 3 order of the group and the number 1 player in % of games won is the group winner while the player finishing 2nd in % of games won advances to the semi-finals as the group runner-up. The player with the 3rd best % of games won is eliminated.

- In singles, reached career-high No. 19 in July 2012 and captured 4 ATP Tour titles. Also 4R in 4 Grand Slam events and advanced to 3 ATP Masters 1000 QFs, including 2013 Rome, where he beat No. 2 Murray for biggest career win.

Horacio Zeballos Career Highlights

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in doubles after advancing to 1st Grand Slam final at 2019 US Open w/Granollers, then went on to reach 2021 and 2023 Wimbledon finals w/Granollers.
- Also alongside Granollers, won 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Montreal title in team debut and added ATP Masters 1000 titles at 2020 Rome, 2021 Madrid, 2021 Cincinnati and 2023 Shanghai.
- Owns 20 doubles titles overall, including 2019 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells w/Mektic in 2nd tournament as a team.
- Qualified for 2020-23 Nitto ATP Finals w/Granollers and lost to eventual champion in SF in first 2 appearances.
- Stopped playing singles in January 2019 after peaking at No. 39 and earning biggest career win over No. 5 Nadal to capture Vina del Mar title in 2013.
