CINCH CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- 2022 Queen's Club tournament gets underway with former champions No. 2 seed **Matteo Berrettini**, No. 7 seed **Marin Cilic**, **Grigor Dimitrov** and **Andy Murray** in the field. 2021 finalist and only seeded home favorite No. 3 seed **Cameron Norrie** and Roland Garros finalist No. 1 seed **Casper Ruud** join them in the field.
- No. 1 seed **Ruud** is making his debut at the event, achieving his new career-high ranking (No. 5) after making his maiden Grand Slam final at Roland Garros. No. 2 seed and 2021 champion **Berrettini** is coming to the event on a 4-match winning streak, winning 14 of his last 15 grass court matches, including taking the title at Stuttgart last week.
- No. 3 seed **Norrie** is the highest-ranked of 7 British players in the field, the most in the main draw event since 1996 (56-player draw). Besides Norrie, 5-time champion **Murray** is arriving fresh from making the Stuttgart final, his first grass court tour-level final since winning Wimbledon in 2016, **Daniel Evans**, who is facing the No. 2 Berrettini in 1R, 3 wildcard recipients **Jack Draper**, who is making his Top 100 debut this week, **Liam Broady**, **Ryan Peniston** and former NCAA Division I Champion **Paul Jubb**, who qualified.
- No. 4 seed **Taylor Fritz** and No. 6 seed **Denis Shapovalov** will be looking for their first grass court wins of the season after failing to win their opening match last week in 's-Hertogenbosch and Stuttgart respectively.

Reilly Opelka | Age: 24 | World No. 18 | Career-High No. 17 | 2022: 19-11 (Dallas, Houston Titles) | Event: 0-1 (2021 1R)
 > Former No. 4 junior became No. 1 American in June 2021 and achieved career-high No. 17 after winning 3rd ATP Tour title at 2022 Dallas (d. Brooksby). In April 2022, captured his first clay court title in Houston (d. Isner).
 > Defeated Isner 7-6(7) 7-6(22) in 2022 Dallas SF, winning longest tiebreak in ATP Tour history (since 1990).
 > At 2020 Delray Beach, saved 1 MP vs. Raonic in SF and beat Nishioka in final on same day to win 2nd title.
 > At 2019 New York, saved 6 MPs and hit 43 aces vs. Isner in SF, then hit 43 aces vs. Schnur in final to win 1st title.
 > Upset No. 3 Tsitsipas at 2021 Toronto for biggest win of career and to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 final (l. to Medvedev).

NOTE: Opelka is making his 2nd appearance at the event and owns a 2-5 tour-level record on grass (d. No. 518 Stebe and No. 19 Wawrinka en route to 2019 Wimbledon 3R).

Alex de Minaur | Age: 23 | World No. 21 | Career-High No. 15 | 2022: 21-13 (Barcelona, Lyon SF) | Event: 3-2 (2021 SF)

> Five-time ATP Tour singles champion and two-time Intesa Sanpaolo Next Gen ATP Finals runner-up achieved career-high No. 15 in 2021.
 > Captured 1st title in his hometown of Sydney in 2019 and has won titles on 4 different continents.
 > At 2019 Atlanta, became 3rd player since 1991 to face 0 break points en route to an ATP Tour title (Haas at 2007 Memphis, Isner at 2017 Newport).
 > Reached 1st Grand Slam QF at 2020 US Open immediately after winning 1st ATP Tour doubles title at 2020 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati w/Carreno Busta in team debut.
 > Son to a Uruguayan father and Spanish mother, splits time between Australia and Spain, and speaks English, Spanish and French.

NOTE: de Minaur is looking for his first grass Top 20 win (0-2). He has lost 9 of his last 10 matches vs Top 20 players (d. No. 10 Norrie at 2022 Barcelona QF).

[4] Taylor Fritz (USA) vs [WC] Jack Draper (GBR)

First Meeting

Taylor Fritz | Age: 24 | World No. 14 | Career-High No. 13 | 2022: 21-9 (Indian Wells Title) | Event: 0-0 (2018 Q2)
 > Finished 2021 season as No. 1 American, advanced to 1st Grand Slam 4R at 2022 Australian Open and achieved career-high No. 13 in March 2022.
 > Equaled biggest win of career and snapped 20-match win streak of No. 4 Nadal to capture 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells title.
 > Became 1st American to win Indian Wells men's singles title since Agassi in 2001.
 > Won 1st ATP Tour title at 2019 Eastbourne after reaching 1st final at 2016 Memphis as 18-year-old WC, becoming youngest American finalist since start of ATP Tour in 1990.
 > Ended junior career in 2015 as World No. 1 after winning US Open title, reaching Roland Garros final and posting wins over future Top-10 ATP players Rublev, Shapovalov and Tsitsipas.

NOTE: Fritz making his main draw debut at the event, after failing to qualify in 2018. Played his first grass court event of the season at 's-Hertogenbosch last week and lost opening match to the eventual surprise winner van Rijthoven. He owns a 12-15 (0.444) tour-level record on grass.

Jack Draper | Age: 20 | World No. 99 (Career-High) | 2022: 2-2 (Miami, Madrid 2R) | Event: 2-1 (2021 QF)
 > Achieved new career-high ranking 12 times in 2022, breaking into Top 200 on 21 February and breaking into Top 100 on 13 June at No. 99 after winning 4 CH titles in 2022.
 > Owns 24-4 Challenger record in 2022, winning titles on indoor hard courts at Forli-2, Forli-4, Forli-5 and St. Brieuc.
 > Defeated both Sinner and Bublik in 2 TBs for 1st and 2nd ATP Tour wins of career, reaching 2021 London/Queen's Club QF as 309th-ranked WC.
 > Took 1st set off World No. 1 Djokovic in 2021 Wimbledon 1R on Centre Court as 253rd-ranked WC.
 > Ended junior career by achieving career-high No. 7 and reaching 2018 Wimbledon boys' singles final (d. Mejia 7-6 6-7 19-17 in SF).

NOTE: Draper is looking for his biggest career win and first win over a Top 20 player (0-3). He reached the quarter-final stage at 2021 Queen's Club defeating No. 23 Sinner and No. 39 Bublik.

Grigor Dimitrov | Age: 31 | World No. 22 | Career-High No. 3 | 2022: 17-11 (2 times in SF) | Event: 16-10 (2014 Title)
 > Ended 2017 at career-high No. 3 after becoming 1st debutant to go 5-0 en route to Nitto ATP Finals title since McEnroe in 1978.
 > Only Bulgarian champion in ATP Tour history, winning 8 titles including 2017 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati.
 > Surpassed 300 career wins in 2019, highlighted by biggest win over No. 1 Djokovic at 2013 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid.
 > Advanced to Grand Slam SFs at 2014 Wimbledon, 2017 Australian Open and 2019 US Open, as well as 8 ATP Masters 1000 SFs.
 > Posted 1st win in 8 meetings with Federer as World No. 78 in 2019 to become 2nd-lowest-ranked US Open men's semi-finalist in history (No. 174 Connors in 1991).

NOTE: Dimitrov is one of the 4 former champions playing in the event and is 4-5 vs Top 20 players in 2022 (3 of those wins came at ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo).

Cameron Norrie | Age: 26 | World No. 11 | Career-High No. 10 | 2022: 26-13 (Del. Beach, Lyon Titles) | Event: 4-4 (2021 F)
 > Achieved career-high No. 10 in April 2022, joining Henman, Murray, and Rusedski as 4th Brit to break into Top 10.
 > Earned 52 wins in 2021 after entering season with 51 career wins, becoming 1st Brit to win ATP Masters 1000 Indian Wells title in 46-year tournament history.
 > Won 1st of 3 ATP Tour titles at 2021 Los Cabos following runner-up finishes at 2019 Auckland as WC, 2021 Estoril, 2021 Lyon and 2021 London/Queen's Club.
 > Posted 14 straight wins in North America from 2021-22, including upset of No. 4 Tsitsipas in 2022 Acapulco SF to equal biggest win of career.
 > Born in South Africa, grew up in New Zealand, became No. 1 collegiate player in USA at Texas Christian University, and has represented Great Britain since 2013.

NOTE: Norrie is leading the 7 British players in the draw, the most since 1996 (7 British players in a 56-player draw). He owns a 11-11 (0.500) tour-level record on grass, compared to 35-23 (0.603) on clay and 83-64 (0.565) on hard courts.

Liam Broady | Age: 28 | World No. 137 | Career-High No. 116 | 2022: 1-4 (Dallas 2R) | Event: 0-3 ('12, '17, '21 1R)
 > Achieved career-high No. 116 in February 2022 after older sister, Naomi, broke into Top 100 of WTA singles and doubles rankings.
 > Defeated former World No. 10 Gulbis 6-3 6-0 en route to 1st ATP Tour QF at 2017 St. Petersburg as Q.
 > Rallied from 2 sets down vs. Matosevic for 1st tour-level win of career at 2015 Wimbledon as WC.
 > Owns 136-127 Challenger record (1-7 in finals), winning his first ATP Challenger title at Biel in September 2021 in his 8th ATP Challenger final.
 > Former World No. 2 junior was 2011 Wimbledon and 2012 US Open boys' singles runner-up, as well as 2010 Wimbledon and 2012 Australian Open boys' doubles champion with countrymen Farquharson and Ward Hibbert respectively.

NOTE: Broady is making his 4th appearance in the main draw of the event, seeking his 2nd Top 20 win (1-4) after beating No. 12 Hurkacz at Tokyo Olympics in July 2021.

Marin Cilic | Age: 33 | World No. 17 | Career-High No. 3 | 2022: 18-12 (3 times in SF) | Event: 32-11 ('12, '18 Titles)
 > Broke into Top 10 after reaching 2010 Australian Open SF and achieved career-high No. 3 following run to 2018 Australian Open final.
 > Beat Federer en route to 2014 US Open title, but fell to Swiss in 2017 Wimbledon and 2018 Australian Open finals.
 > Captured titles at Stuttgart and St. Petersburg in 2021 to become 6th active player with 20+ career championships (also Federer, Nadal, Djokovic, Murray, Del Potro).
 > Earned biggest career wins over No. 1 Djokovic (2016 Paris) and No. 1 Nadal (2018 Australian Open) before beating countryman Karlovic for 500th win (2019 Moscow).
 > Won 2016 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati title, clinched 2018 Davis Cup for Croatia, and earned silver medal in All-Croatian men's doubles final at 2020 Tokyo Olympics w/Dodig (held in 2021).

NOTE: 2-time London/Queen's Club champion Cilic is making his 15th appearance at the event and has played every edition since debuting in 2007. He has the more wins at the event (32) than any other player in the field (5-time champion Murray has 31).

A. Ramos-Vinolas | Age: 34 | World No. 40 | Career-High No. 17 | 2022: 14-13 (Cordoba Title) | Event: 0-1 (2021 1R)
 > Achieved career-high No. 17 in 2017 and has finished each of last 11 seasons in Top 100 (2011-21).
 > Played in 11 finals on ATP Tour, winning clay-court titles at 2016 Bastad, 2019 Gstaad, 2021 Estoril and 2022 Cordoba.
 > Advanced to 3R, 4R and QF of a Grand Slam for 1st time at 2016 Roland Garros.
 > Reached QF, SF and final of an ATP Masters 1000 event for 1st time at 2017 Monte Carlo, earning biggest career win over No. 1 Murray in 3R from 0-4 down in 3rd set.
 > Defeated defending champion and World No. 3 Federer in 2015 ATP Masters 1000 Shanghai 2R for 1st win in 16 tries vs. Top 10.

NOTES: Ramos-Vinolas has a 6-15 tour-level record on grass, looking for his first tour-level win on grass since reaching 3R at 2017 Wimbledon.

A. Davidovich Fokina | Age: 23 | World No. 44 | Career-High No. 27 | 2022: 12-14 (Monte Carlo Final) | Event: 0-0 (2019 Q2)
 > Achieved career-high No. 27 after defeating World No. 1 and 2-time champion Djokovic en route to 1st ATP Tour final of career at 2022 ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo.
 > Broke Djokovic 9 times in Monte Carlo 2R win, setting record for most breaks of Djokovic in a best-of-3-set match.
 > Advanced to 1st Grand Slam QF at 2021 Roland Garros and 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2021 Monte Carlo, highlighted by 5-set win over Ruud in Roland Garros 3R.
 > Ended junior career as World No. 2 after winning Wimbledon boys' singles title and posting 20-1 record in 2017.
 > Owns 2 cats and launched Adoptas.org in 2021, a pet adoption platform that aims to connect anyone looking to adopt or foster a pet with shelters and rescues across Spain.

NOTE: 2017 Junior Wimbledon Champion Davidovich Fokina is playing in his 4th career tour-level grass tournament, earning a 1-3 record (d. No. 98 Ymer at 2021 Eastbourne).

Lorenzo Musetti | Age: 20 | World No. 74 | Career-High No. 51 | 2022: 13-13 (3 times in QF) | Event: 0-0 (Debut)
> Achieved career-high No. 51 in May 2022 after reaching 3R at ATP Masters 1000 Monte Carlo, Barcelona and ATP Masters 1000 Madrid as Q.
> In 2021, qualified for Intesa Sanpaolo Next Gen ATP Finals and reached Roland Garros 4R (l. to World No. 1 and eventual champion Djokovic after leading by 2 sets).
> Advanced to ATP Tour SFs at 2020 Sardinia as WC, 2021 Acapulco as Q and 2021 Lyon.
> Defeated Wawrinka and Nishikori to reach 2020 Rome 3R as 18-year-old Q-WC, becoming 1st player born in 2002 to win an ATP Tour match and youngest player in Rome 3R since Santoro, 18, in 1991.
> Became World No. 1 junior after winning 2019 Australian Open boys' singles title and reaching 2018 US Open boys' singles final.
