### CINCH CHAMPIONSHIPS TALKING POINTS

- **Cameron Norrie** bids to become the second British champion of the cinch Championships since World War II when he meets No. 1 seed, World No. 9 and fellow 25-year-old **Matteo Berrettini** in the final on Sunday.
- Both Norrie and Berrettini are among the five players with the most wins on the ATP Tour in 2021. Berrettini, who is 25-6 (.806), also ranks among the five players with the highest winning percentages on tour this season.

- Norrie is playing in the fourth and biggest final of his career after finishing as an ATP 250 runner-up at 2019
   Auckland, 2021 Estoril and 2021 Lyon. If he claims his first title on home soil, Norrie will join five-time winner

   Andy Murray as the only British champions on the lawns of The Queen's Club since Bunny Austin in 1938.
- Norrie entered this week having tied his career-high of No. 41 in the FedEx ATP Rankings. He will set a new career-high ranking on Monday, which is projected to be No. 34 as the runner-up or No. 29 as the champion.
- The London resident is 29-12 in 2021 with 15 wins over higher-ranked opponents, including three this week against No. 38 **Albert Ramos-Vinolas**, No. 24 **Aslan Karatsev** and No. 14 **Denis Shapovalov**. He is seeking the second-biggest win of his career on Sunday after beating No. 4 **Dominic Thiem** 6-3 6-2 last month at Lyon.
- Norrie was winless in four singles matches at The Queen's Club entering 2021 (0-3 main draw, 0-1 qualifying).
- Norrie is still alive in the doubles draw as well. Following the singles final, he will return to the court alongside
   Alex de Minaur to resume their doubles semi-final against the fellow first-time team of Reilly Opelka and John
   Peers. Awaiting the winners in the final are two-time champions Pierre-Hugues Herbert and Nicolas Mahut.
- Should Norrie go 3-0 on Sunday, he will become the second consecutive player to sweep both titles at the cinch Championships. Fellow left-hander **Feliciano Lopez** won the 2019 singles and doubles titles (w/Andy Murray).
- Berrettini has not dropped a set in his tournament debut, including wins over Murray and British No. 1 Daniel
  Evans. He bids to become the first debutant to win the cinch Championships title since 17-year-old Boris
  Becker in 1985. Berrettini would be the first player to win the title without losing a set since Murray in 2009.
- Berrettini is the second Italian in the Open Era to advance to the cinch Championships final. He joins Laurence
   Tieleman, who lost to Scott Draper in his lone ATP Tour final at the 1998 event as a 253rd-ranked qualifier.
- Berrettini is seeking the biggest title of his career after capturing ATP 250 titles at 2018 Gstaad, 2019 Budapest, 2019 Stuttgart and 2021 Belgrade-1. He was runner-up at 2019 Munich and 2021 ATP Masters 1000 Madrid.
- The No. 1 seed is 9-0 in cinch Championships finals since **Todd Martin** upset **Pete Sampras** for the 1994 title. The last four finals have gone three sets and the loser of the first set has won seven of the last nine finals.

### [1] Matteo Berrettini (ITA) vs Cameron Norrie (GBR)

#### First Meeting

Matteo Berrettini | Age: 25 | World No. 9 | Career-High No. 8 | 2021: 25-6 (Belgrade-1 Title) | Queen's: 4-0 (2021 F)

- > Achieved career-high No. 8 in 2019 to become highest-ranked Italian since No. 8 Barazzutti in 1978.
- > Beat Monfils in 5th-set TB at 2019 US Open to become 2nd Italian semi-finalist in event history (Barazzutti in 1977).
- > Went 13-4 on clay in 2021 with 1st ATP Masters 1000 final at Madrid and 2nd Grand Slam QF at Roland Garros.
- > Defeated No. 3 Thiem for biggest career win en route to 2021 ATP Cup team final and beat No. 5 Thiem at 2019 Nitto ATP Finals to become 1st Italian to earn a singles win in tournament history (since 1970).
- > Won 2 of his 4 ATP Tour titles without dropping serve: 2018 Gstaad on clay and 2019 Stuttgart on grass.

Cameron Norrie | Age: 25 | World No. 41 | Career-High No. 41 | 2021: 29-12 (3 Finals) | Queen's: 4-3 (2021 Final)

- > Former Top-10 junior achieved career-high No. 41 in May 2019 and returned to No. 41 in June 2021.
- > Advanced to ATP Tour finals at 2019 Auckland as WC, 2021 Estoril and 2021 Lyon.
- > Posted personal-best 29 wins in 2021, including biggest victory of career over No. 4 Thiem in Lyon 2R.
- > Reached 3R at 3 Grand Slams, including at 2020 US Open, where he saved 2 MPs vs. Schwartzman in 1R.
- > Born in South Africa, grew up in New Zealand, became No. 1 collegiate player in USA at Texas Christian University, and has represented Great Britain since 2013.

# Reilly Opelka (USA) / John Peers (AUS) or Alex de Minaur (AUS) / Cameron Norrie (GBR) vs [4] Pierre-Hugues Herbert (FRA) / Nicolas Mahut (FRA) First Meeting

NOTE: Opelka/Peers leads de Minaur/Norrie 7-6(3) 2-2 in doubles SF scheduled to resume following singles final

- > In doubles, Opelka is No. 135 (career-high No. 115 in 2020) and Peers is No. 25 (career-high No. 2 in 2017).
- > American and Aussie are making team debut this week and defeated World No. 1 team Mektic/Pavic 6-1 6-2 in QF.
- > Opelka, 23, lost his 2 previous ATP Tour doubles finals at 2019 Basel w/Fritz and 2020 New York w/Johnson.
- > Peers, 32, is 24-12 in doubles finals (15-1 in last 16) and 1-1 at London/Queen's Club (2018 champion w/Kontinen).
- > In doubles, de Minaur is No. 69 (career-high No. 58 in 2020) and Norrie is No. 185 (career-high No. 142 in 2019).
- > Aussie and Brit are making team debut this week and beat World No. 4 team Ram/Salisbury 5-7 6-1 [12-10] in 2R.
- > De Minaur, 22, won his lone doubles final in team debut w/Carreno Busta at 2020 ATP Masters 1000 Cincinnati.
- > Norrie, 25, won his lone doubles final in ATP Tour doubles debut at 2018 Estoril with countryman Edmund.
- > **Herbert**, 30, and **Mahut**, 39, entered this week at No. 2 in FedEx ATP Doubles Team Rankings. In FedEx ATP Doubles Rankings, Herbert is No. 7 (career-high No. 2 in 2016) and Mahut is No. 3 (career-high No. 1 in 2016).
- > One of 8 teams to complete career Grand Slam, winning 2015 US Open (d. J. Murray/Peers), 2016 Wimbledon (d. Benneteau/Roger-Vasselin), 2018 Roland Garros (d. Marach/Pavic) and 2019 Australian Open (d. Kontinen/Peers).
- > Won 9 straight matches, highlighted by 2nd Roland Garros and 5th Grand Slam title on 12 June (d. Bublik/Golubev).
- > Own 22-7 record in 2021 and 175-64 record since ATP Tour team debut at 2014 ATP Masters 1000 Paris.
- > Frenchmen boast 18-7 record in finals: 5-1 at Grand Slams, 1-1 at Nitto ATP Finals, 7-1 at ATP Masters 1000s (7 different titles), 4-0 at ATP 500s and 1-4 at ATP 250s. Herbert is 20-8 overall and Mahut is 32-17 overall in finals.
- > Back-to-back London/Queen's Club champions in 2015 (d. Matkowski/Zimonjic) and 2016 (d. Guccione/Sa).
