DJOKOVIC, FEDERER MEET AGAIN; NO. 1 ROJER-TECAU LOOK FOR TITLE

- FINAL SHOWDOWN:** The 2015 ATP World Tour season culminates Sunday with the Barclays ATP World Tour Finals championship featuring two of the game's all-time greats as World No. 1 **Novak Djokovic** and No. 3 **Roger Federer** square off for the second time in the tournament. Federer won on Tuesday 75 62 and leads the all-time FedEx ATP Head 2 Head 22-21. This is their eighth meeting of the season (Djokovic leads 4-3). The duo have combined to win 10 of the last 12 season-ending titles between them with Federer a record six-time champion and Djokovic a four-time winner, including the last three. Federer is appearing in a tournament record 10th final and Djokovic his fifth. Djokovic is trying to become the first player to win four straight season finale titles in the tournament's 46-year history. They have reached the final for a second straight year and third in four years at The O2. The last time two players reached the final back-to-back years was Ivan Lendl and Boris Becker in 1985-86. Lendl won both times.

In the doubles final, the No. 1 duo in the Emirates ATP Doubles Team Rankings, No. 2 seeds **Jean-Julien Rojer** and **Horia Tecau** meet No. 8 **Rohan Bopanna** and **Florin Mergea**, who did not qualify until the last day of the regular season on Nov. 8. Rojer and Tecau, who have a 3-0 head-to-head advantage, wrapped up their first year-end No. 1 Emirates ATP Doubles Team Ranking with a 64 64 win over Bob and Mike Bryan on Saturday. They are 10-0 in London this season after winning the Wimbledon title and going undefeated so far in the tournament.

- **CLOSER LOOK AT DJOKOVIC vs. FEDERER:** For the fifth time at the Barclays ATP World Tour Finals and 44th time in their careers, **Djokovic** and **Federer** will face off. Djokovic tied the series at 21-21 with a four-set win in the 2015 US Open final before Federer won here on Tuesday to regain the lead. Here are several important trends to keep an eye on going into the final:
 - Through 43 meetings on tour, Djokovic has never led Federer in their head-to-head record
 - Federer has won 10 more sets than Djokovic during their rivalry (68-58)
 - Federer began the series with 4 straight victories, the longest H2H win streak by either player
 - Djokovic has beaten Federer en route to 6 of his 10 Grand Slam titles (8-6 overall at majors)
 - Federer is 3-4 in London (2-2 at Barclays ATP World Tour Finals, 1-2 at Wimbledon)
 - Djokovic is 10-6 in finals, winning 7 of 9 since the 2012 Barclays ATP World Tour Finals (does not include W/O last year)
 - Federer ended Djokovic's career-long 43-match win streak in the 2011 Roland Garros SF
 - Federer ended Djokovic's 23-match win streak this season in round robin play on Tuesday
 - Federer squandered 2 match points vs. Djokovic in both the 2010 and 2011 US Open SFs

- **RIVALRY FOR THE AGES:** **Djokovic** and **Federer** (44) have met the second-most times in the Open Era. The pair's respective coaches, **Boris Becker** and **Stefan Edberg**, played 35 times.

- **EXTENDING HIS RECORD? Federer** is seeking a seventh title at the season finale. He already holds the record for most titles with six, having surpassed **Sampras** (5) and **Lendl** (5) with his victory in London in 2011. The Swiss has taken on eight different opponents in his nine previous finals. This will be the third time he has met **Djokovic** in the final, losing to the Serb in the 2012 final and giving a walkover last year due to a back injury. If Federer emerges victorious, he will have beaten seven different opponents in his seven final wins:

- **LET'S MEET AGAIN:** In the history of the year-end Finals, singles finalists have met twice before in the same year-end championships 15 previous times since it first occurred in Houston in 1976. This is the fifth time Federer has been involved and second for Djokovic. In eight of the previous 15 times, the player who lost the round robin match came back to win in the final: Here's a look back at the last five times (prior to this year) there's been two meetings in the same year-end tournament:

- **RACE FOR NO. 2:** With **Andy Murray** eliminated on Friday, **Federer** can pass the Brit and reclaim the No. 2 ranking on Monday by winning his seventh Barclays ATP World Tour Finals championship. If Federer loses in the final, Murray will be the year-end No. 2 for the first time in his career. There are three scenarios in which Murray can finish the season as the World No. 2.
 1) Federer loses to **Djokovic** on Sunday.
 2) Murray wins two live singles rubbers during the Davis Cup final Nov. 27-29.
 3) Murray wins one live singles rubber and Great Britain wins the Davis Cup final.

- The 28-year-old Belgrade native is appearing in his fourth straight final and fifth overall (4-0). Here is a look at his road to the final:

Sunday – d. Kei Nishikori 61 61

- Loss broke streaks of 38 consecutive indoor match wins, 23 overall this season and 15 straight at Barclays ATP World Tour Finals. It was his first loss at the O2 since falling to countryman Tipsarevic in final RR match in 2011. His last indoor loss came to Querrey in 2R at ATP Masters 1000 Paris in 2012
- Making his 9th consecutive season finale appearance and trying to become first player in tournament history to win four titles in a row. The reigning 3-time champion also won '08 title in Shanghai (d. Davydenko). Last player to win 3 straight year-end titles was Ivan Lendl from 1985-87. Ilie Nastase also won three in a row (1971-73)
- Overall has a 26-10 match record and 1 of 5 players to win 4-more titles in tournament history (only 4-time winner unbeaten in finals). There have been 3 players with 5-more titles (Federer-6, Lendl-5, Sampras-5)
- The Serb has finished No. 1 in Emirates ATP Rankings for 4th time in past 5 years (2011-12, '14-15). Has held top spot since July 7, 2014 after capturing his 2nd Wimbledon crown (d. Federer in 5 sets). He is first player to rank No. 1 every week during year since Federer in 2007. His 173 weeks at No. 1 (as of Nov. 16) in career is 5th-most in history of Emirates ATP Rankings, behind Federer (302), Sampras (286), Lendl (270) and Connors (268)
- Enters final with 81-6 match record (58-5 on hard courts) and his 23-match winning streak ended to Federer, who also was last player to beat Serb in Cincinnati final on Aug. 23. First player to win 80 matches in a season on ATP World Tour since Nadal (82-11) in 2008
- Leader on ATP World Tour with 10 titles (also in 2011) and has reached a record 15 consecutive finals in a season. Won a record 6 ATP Masters 1000 titles in Indian Wells, Miami, Monte-Carlo, Rome, Shanghai, and Paris, compiling a 39-2 record. His 26 career ATP Masters 1000 titles are second-most (Nadal 27). He is first player to reach 10-more straight finals in a season since Federer (11 in '06, 17 dating back to '05)
- Also won his 6th Beijing and 3rd Shanghai titles without dropping a set (20-0) and overall is 38-1 in China since 2012. Has a 10-0 career record in finals in China
- Won 8th, 9th and 10th Grand Slam titles at Australian Open (d. Murray), Wimbledon (d. Federer) and US Open (d. Federer) respectively. Fell short of calendar Grand Slam with 3rd runner-up in 4 years at Roland Garros (l. to Wawrinka), which ended his 28-match winning streak. 1st player to reach all 4 Slams in a season since Federer in 2009. Federer also accomplished feat in 2005-06 and Rod Laver in 1969 (Open Era)
- Since becoming a father on Oct. 21, 2014 with birth of son, Stefan, has compiled a 90-6 match record, winning 12 titles in 16 finals (this is 17th final)
- In Grand Slam play compiled a 27-1 record and has streak of 26 consecutive QF-better since 3R exit at '09 Roland Garros going into 2016. His season-high 28-match winning streak ended with final loss to Wawrinka at Roland Garros

- Has surpassed a record \$16 million in earnings and guaranteed to reach \$20 million mark if he wins title

- The 34-year-old Swiss native is appearing in his 10th final (6-3). Here is a look at his road to the final:

- He is playing in a record 14th straight year-end championship and with Agassi has qualified most (14 times) . Oldest player to qualify for year-end finale since Andre Agassi (35) in 2005 and comes in ranked in Top 3 for 11th time in 14 years. Last year was No. 2 and withdrew from final (vs. Djokovic) due to back injury. Went 4-0 coming into final. Has won his last eight matches at The O2 since last loss to Nadal in SF two years ago
- Has captured most titles (6), won most matches (52-11) and prize money (\$13,433,000). Also tournament leader in tie-breaks won (16)
- The Swiss superstar will finish as oldest player (34) in Top 10 Emirates ATP Rankings since No. 7 Agassi (35) in 2005 and for 14th consecutive year. Will finish in Top 3 for 12th time in last 13 years (No. 6 in '13)
- He is 2nd on ATP World Tour in titles won (6) behind Djokovic (10) and 3rd in matches won (63) behind Djokovic (81) and Murray (69). Also No. 2 with 15-5 record vs. Top 10 opponents (4 losses to Djokovic)
- His 88 career titles on ATP World Tour is No. 3 in Open Era behind Connors (109) and Lendl (94)
- Compiled a 6-4 record in finals with all 4 losses to Djokovic. Won 24th career ATP Masters 1000 title in Cincinnati (d. Djokovic) and also captured maiden titles in Brisbane (d. Raonic) and Istanbul (d. Cuevas) along with 7th time in Dubai (d. Djokovic), 8th time in Halle (d. Seppi) and 7th time in Basel (d. Nadal). First time he's won titles on all 3 surfaces and 6 titles since 2012
- Overall, has reached final in 11 of 17 tournaments and compiled an 18-4 record in Grand Slam tournaments, highlighted by runner-up efforts at Wimbledon and US Open (l. to Djokovic in both). At US Open, became oldest Grand Slam finalist since Andre Agassi (35) at '05 US Open. Entered US Open final having won 28 straight sets overall, tied for 3rd-longest streak of career
- Has played in a record 27 Grand Slam singles finals (17-10). Also QF at Roland Garros (l. to Wawrinka) and 3R at Australian Open (l. to Seppi), his earliest exit in Melbourne since 3R in 2001

- Has won a record 297 Grand Slam matches and only player to record 60+ wins at each Slam tournament and has 70+ wins at 3 of 4 (except Roland Garros). Enters next year having played in a record 64 consecutive Grand Slam tournaments (only player in this century to play in every Slam singles tournament)
- In ATP Masters 1000 play, compiled a 16-6 record, highlighted by title in Cincinnati where he beat No. 2 Murray in SF and No. 1 Djokovic in final (did not lose serve). Also 1st time in career he beat No. 1 & 2 players in same tournament. His 24 career titles is 3rd-most behind Nadal (27) and Djokovic (26). - After winning a career-best 8 titles in 9 finals in 2014, went 2-2 in finals with titles in Rotterdam and Wimbledon (d. J. Murray-Peers in both). Also runner-up in Sydney (l. to Bopanna-Nestor) and Nice (l. to M. Pavic-Venus)
